Dear Tom:

Through initial inquiries to Jill Manton and Susan Pontious about protocol for accepting donations of art, we are making a formal proposal to the San Francisco Arts Commission for an exception, based on the significant artistic and cultural value to the City, for acceptance of the gift of a bronze bust of local Poet Laureate, Lawrence Ferlinghetti, to the Civic Art Collection, to be permanently installed in the Ferlinghetti Reading Room at the new North Beach Library scheduled to officially open on May 10, 2014.

Internationally renown literary legend, mentor and artist, Lawrence Ferlinghetti, just celebrated his 95th birthday and the new North Beach Library will honor him with an eponymous Reading Room when it opens.

For over 60 years his City Lights Book Store has been a North Beach fixture and destination for literary enthusiasts from around the globe. His poems and store helped define the "Beat" generation through thought provoking, boundary challenging, new wave poetry. Mr Ferlinghetti also founded City Lights Press which in 1956, published "Howl," the controversial ground breaking poem. Victory over the legal backlash, established a new broad definition of freedom of speech for the 20th century.

Local well known sculptor, Dina Angel-Wing, has created a bronze sculptural interpretation of him for donation by Friends Honoring Lawrence Ferlinghetti, to the Civic Art Collection as a permanent installation in the Lawrence Ferlinghetti Reading Room of the North Beach Library. Mr Ferlinghetti liked and approved her sculpture.

Edward Melton, Chief of Library Branches, has approved an on-site location suitable for the bust and Dina has designed an appropriate base with the managing contractor and is coordinating a bolt secured mounting in the west side of the building.

For an unveiling at the official opening of the North Beach Library on May 10, it will be temporarily but securely installed at the proposed site until this proposal can be evaluated by the Visual Arts Committee and fully approval by the Arts Commission to authorize a final installation.

Funding for this project is by donations through the gracious participation of the Friends of the SF Public Libraries and through them there will be a contribution for a maintenance endowment fund defined with the help of Ms. Pontious.

Attached is a photograph of the sculpture, installation elevation of the base mount, a letter of Library support, community support and international recognition of Mr. Ferlinghetti by the Consul General of Italy, noting the importance of this commemorative sculpture to honor one of San Francisco's living literary treasures.

It is hoped that this artistic tribute to Lawrence Ferlinghetti will meet with your approval and that it can be a permanent and tangible way to honor his many contributions to the literary and artistic importance of San Francisco.



RE: Staff Report to Visual Arts Committee regarding proposed gift to the City of bronze bust of Lawrence Ferlinghetti

Dear Honorable Members of the Visual Arts Committee:

The Arts Commission has been approached by Mr. Frank Wing on behalf of Ms. Dina Angel-Wing, the sculptor of a proposed gift to the city: a bronze bust (20" x 16"x16") of Lawrence Ferlinghetti, famed beat poet and founder of City Lights Book Store and City Lights Press. The proposed site for the bust is the Ferlinghetti Reading Room at the new North Beach Library. The proposed gift has the support of the Library and other neighborhood organizations.

Although the bust is already on display at the North Beach Library, the Wings have not raised the funds to compensate Ms. Wing for the sculpture, or to contribute to the required maintenance endowment. I have informed Mr. Wing that the Arts Commission cannot consider accepting a gift until the Ms. Wing is ready to give the City clear title to the artwork, and be able to provide a maintenance endowment.

I am therefore proposing that the Commission approve the temporary display of the sculpture at the library for a period of one year. At the end of the display period, the artist would either 1)remove the sculpture, or 2)if the artist is ready to give the City title to the artwork, and has raised the required maintenance endowment, the Commission could be asked to consider gift at that time.

The motion before the Committee is for the approval of the temporary display of the Ferlinghetti bust for a period of one year. I think it would also be prudent to let the prospective donors know of the Committee's disposition regarding the possible acceptance of the Ferlinghetti bust into the City's Civic Art Collection in the future.

About the artist Dina Angel-Wing

Artist and award winning sculptor, Dina Angel-Wing, has been in the Bay Area for over 30 years, and forged her reputation in many media. This includes ceramics, hand cast paper, cast glass, and currently in bronze and steel. Bronze and steel sculpture affords her the artistic flexibility of clay with the permanence of metal and the painterly aspect of controlling the patina.

Her sculpture ranges from figurative, to abstracted figure, from illustrative expression, to interpretive portraits. Experience in clay gives Dina the ability to work in three dimensional "sketching" to craft work that can be elegantly simple to highly detailed. These sculptures then can be refined as a cast wax before being poured into bronze, glass or aluminum. Her patinas are controlled in detail and add to her specific finished appearances that can range from classical French Rodin to delicate brushed modern. Often her sculptures incorporate architectonic elements, gracefully curved stands, planar panels, even a spiral steel staircase.

Dina's interpretive portraits try to capture the cumulative personalities of her subjects taken from a range of photographs from different ages and, when possible, live sketching sessions. Based on input from clients, she has created busts showing a sense of humor, elegance, strength and dignity.

A double bust for an art commissioner was a surprise birthday gift for his wife, created using old photographs as well as live sketches. It interprets the lively sense of fun yet sophistication of the couple.

She unveiled her bronze bust of city administrator, James Jefferson, in the rotunda of the San Francisco City Hall during a memorial ceremony attended by the mayor at the time and previous mayors and dignitaries. Other works include a family of hands, cast in glass, copies of which are presented for an annual obstetrics award. Her bronze figurative pieces and large architectonic figures are found in collections around the world and her knowledge of art media, international arts and historical context often imbues her pieces with intellectual symbolism. She is currently working on a multi-media 75 foot installation with projected images on her sculpture as well as private commissions.
