When a troubled family member or concerned observer contacts the program, the family may either arrange to come to the clinic or a crisis team may travel to the home, school or other San Francisco location to evaluate the problem. Evaluation includes assessment for inpatient hospitalization. Provides services for victims of community violence (no fee). Services include debriefings and 10week PTSD treatment. Provides Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) (no fee) for youth and their family. DBT is for youth experiencing chronic suicidal feelings, self-injurious behavior, substance use and truancy. DBT is offered for adolescents between the ages 13 – 17.5 (at the initiation of treatment).

Second Start Program

For people who are or have been diagnosed with disabling HIV or AIDS, are interested in going back to work or school, and are paying more than 50% of their income toward rent each month. Qualified individuals may be eligible for a monthly rental subsidy for up to 18 months. Documentation required: CA State I.D., proof of gross monthly income, letter of diagnosis from San Francisco doctor, proof of rent, proof of employment, job training/school enrollment. Waiting List

CARE Partial Rent Subsidy Program

For those with disabling HIV/AIDS who have been residents of the city & county of San Francisco for at least one year and do not currently live in subsidized housing. Qualified individuals may receive a small monthly subsidy to offset rental expenses. Priority given to those receiving General Assistance.

Documentation required: CA State I.D., proof of gross monthly income (not to exceed \$900), letter of diagnosis from San Francisco doctor (for disabling HIV, the letter must be dated within the last year), proof of San Francisco residency. Must call monthly to maintain name on Waiting List.

HOPWA Rental Subsidy Program

For those with disabling HIV/AIDS who have been on the Housing Waitlist (CHIPS) for at least one year and do not currently live in subsidized housing. In collaboration with the SF Housing Authority, provides a monthly rental subsidy for SF residents who are diagnosed with disabling HIV or AIDS and have a very low income. Recipients of this subsidy pay 30% of their income toward rent and the SF Housing Authority pays the balance of the rent to the property owner.

Documentation required: CA State I.D., proof of gross monthly income (dated within the last 60 days), letter of diagnosis from San Francisco doctor (dated within the last 90 days), proof of San Francisco residency (or intent to reside), birth certificate, bank statements (if applicable). This program only takes referrals form the Housing Wait List (CHIPS). For more information regarding the Housing Wait List call the AIDS Housing Wait List at 415-487-8040.

St. Joseph's Health Fund (SJHF)

Offers assistance to individuals with disabling HIV or AIDS to pay for certain medical expenses. Fund is limited to \$500/year and only covers certain obvious medical expenses or other expenses that are deemed necessary by client's physician. Eligible expenses include: prescription medication, insurance premiums, co-payments, eye exams, eyeglasses/contacts (up to \$250), and dental care. Check with SJHF staff for information about alternative therapies qualifications. Checks are sent directly to providers. Documentation required: CA State I.D., proof of gross monthly income (not to exceed \$1,000), letter of diagnosis from San Francisco doctor (for disabling HIV, the letter must be dated within the last year) proof of San Francisco residency, proof of medical insurance (Medicare, Medical, or private), if applicable. Wait List, must call monthly to maintain place on list.

World is a diverse community of women living with HIV/AIDS and their supporters working together to Provide support and information to women with HIV/AIDS and their families, friends, and loved ones. Educate and inspire women with HIV/AIDS to advocate for themselves, one another, and their communities, promote public awareness of women's HIV/AIDS issues and a compassionate response for all people with HIV/AIDS.

WORLD's current programs and activities include:

HIV University: - A 12-week school for educating women about living with HIV developed by and for women with HIV to learn about treatments and living with HIV. Also includes a session, "Living Longer" that incorporates safer sex information as well as the impact of sexually transmitted diseases on people living with HIV. Over 80% of enrollees have been women of color who take what they learn back to their communities. There are over 100 local graduates and 40 pilot programs nationwide.

Peer Advocates: Women from WORLD do outreach to HIV -positive women and men in Oakland and Berkeley to link them to health care and services (housing, substance treatment, etc.) and to provide one-on-one peer support and education.

Perinatal Peer Advocacy: WORLD has a specialized position within its Peer Advocacy team to provide information to HIV -positive women who are considering pregnancy or are new mothers. This staff person also provides information to care givers and advisory groups regarding the intersection of HIV and perinatal transmission. WORLD has, for example, provided consultation to the National Institutes of Health, Centers for Disease Control, and the Institute of Medicine of issues connected to pregnancy and HIV.

Latina Initiative: WORLD's full-time bilingual Latina Peer Advocate provides peer support, education and advocacy as part of a collaborative Latina Initiative with the Family Care Network, and closely with Project Inform to bring a stronger "prevention with positives" focus to WORLD.

WORLD Newsletter: A quarterly, 8-page newsletter with over 12,000 readers in over 87 countries which has published personal stories of over 300 women living with HIV, in addition to treatment updates, resources, and other information about living with HIV.

Speakers Bureau: Education about HIV and AIDS locally, nationally and internationally primarily about AIDS prevention.

Notification services. Drop in hours listed above. -Retreats for HIV positive women: 3-day retreats that provide 50 women with education, stress management, and support. There have been 24 retreats in 12 years and attendees have come from across the nation and around the world.

The safety net for indigent adults. A cash grant is provided. In exchange, able-bodied recipients are expected to perform Workfare, which is community service or job search. If participating in Workfare, recipients may also receive MUNI fast pass or tokens.

The Food Stamps program provides individuals who meet financial and non-financial guidelines, an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) card which may be used to purchase food items. Amount given to each individual or family vary based on house hold income and dependents.

Eligibility Requirements are as follows: San Francisco resident, citizen of the U.S. or qualifying legal resident alien; or a U.S. Veteran or active military or their spouse or children.

*Individuals on SSI are not eligible for food stamps in California.

College students (age 18-49) may be eligible if working 20 hours per week or in a college work study program, disabled or caring for a child. Individuals 60 years of age or over or disabled may have income somewhat higher than the standards listed above if they have high rent cost and/or medical expenses. You may get Expedited Services if you are otherwise eligible, depending on household gross monthly income and liquid resources.

Medi-Cal is the medical assistance program in California for persons who receive CalWORKs/TANF and SSI and selected other indigent individuals (see eligibility criteria below). Anyone who is low income and does not qualify for Medi-Cal will likely be covered by the MIA Program.

Medi-Cal pays entirely or partially for the following services for its recipients: Office visits to doctors and dentists

Hospital/nursing home care

X-ray services

Mental Health services Prescriptions

Medical supplies

Eligibility

Individuals on SSI and CalWORKs/TANF are automatically eligible for Medi-Cal coverage. SSDI recipients may be eligible for Medi-Cal, but must file a separate application (there is a 24 month waiting period before SSDI recipients get Medicare). Other individuals who are not eligible for CalWORKs/TANF, SSI and SSDI may still be eligible for Medi-Cal if they are: 65 or older; under 21; blind; disabled; pregnant; a refugee; or they receive care in a skilled nursing home and have limited income and resources.

Applications

People receiving CalWORKs/TANF or SSI get Medi-Cal automatically upon approval of these entitlements. Anyone receiving CaIWORKs/TANF or SSI who is not receiving Medi-Cal should contact his/her public assistance caseworker. For people eligible for Medi-Cal who are not receiving Ca1WORKs/TANF or SSI, the San Francisco Department of Human Services screens and certifies applicants for Medi-Cal. Applications may be picked up by seeing an eligibility worker.

Difficulties with Medi-Cal

SSI and CalWORKs/TANF recipients having Medi-Cal problems contact a Social Security caseworker (for SSI) or their CalWORKs/TANF caseworker (for CalWORKs/TANF). Medi-Cal recipients who are not receiving SSI or CalWORKs/TANF should contact the Medi-Cal office. If this doesn't work, or the problem is especially difficult, contact one of the advocacy agencies or contact their Medi-Cal eligibility worker. Generally, Sliding Fee Scale provides any essential medical care the individual needs. Only elective care (e.g. plastic surgery) will be denied. S.F. General: Primary care (outpatient and inpatient), eye exams/surgery, general medicine, immunizations, surgery, pediatrics, obstetrics, gynecology, emergency room services. Specialty Clinics: children's health, family health, refugees, AIDS. Also limited mental health (inpatient/crisis only) and substance abuse treatment.

Health Centers generally provide all or most of the following: immunizations, routine physical examinations, outpatient primary care, women's health, prenatal care/family planning, some dental care, geriatrics, AIDS screening and foreign language clinics. S.E. Health Center provides some general dental care including extractions, filings and emergency care. Other services may be provided; call specific centers for more information.

Who is eligible for Sliding Fee Scale Program?

Any S.F resident between the ages of 21 and 64 who is not eligible for Medi-Cal, and who meets the income guidelines, is eligible for MIA services. These guidelines are as

follows: If the individual is on GA, then there is no fee. If the individual is not on GA, then there is a fee for all services including emergency room visits.

No ID or proof of income is required, even for patients who haven't used the system before - just a personal statement of income. Note: Persons who receive or are eligible for Medi-Cal do not need, and cannot use, MIA.

How to access the Sliding Fee Scale Program system?

The usual method is to call or stop by the Patient Referral desk (415-206-5166) at S.F. General; they will listen to your particular problem and refer you to the department or clinic you need. Tell them as much information about yourself and your situation as you can; you may be eligible for one of the special clinics. If you know that primary or general medical care is what you need, call patient referral at 415-206-5166 to set up an appointment. Go directly to the Emergency Room in an emergency. You can also make an appointment at any of the District health Centers. Call one convenient for you to find out if it offers the services you need and has regular drop-in hours (some are by appointment only). All after- hours or urgent problems should go to the Emergency Room at S.F. General. Remember, you do not need to bring ID or proof of income to get help through MIA. But if you have ID, bring it.

If a client or advocate

HOUSING - SHELTERS / TRANSITIONAL HOUSING

SHELTERS: For most shelters you need to reserve your shelter space by going to one of the Neighborhood Resource Centers listed in this brochure. The first time you reserve a space, you will enroll in the CHANGES computer system giving your name, date and place of birth, gender, ethnicity and a Social Security Number (Social Security Number is Optional). Your photograph will be taken to establish your "unique identity". This is done to ensure that only YOU can claim the shelter space you reserve. If you wish to do so, you may also give your "finger image" so that check-in at shelter will be speedy and automatic.

After enrolling in CHANGES, you can reserve a shelter space any day at any Resource Center listed here.

Reservations are taken from 8:00am throughout the day until all available spaces are filled. Unclaimed spaces will be available for reservation at Resource Centers after 8pm. Additional unclaimed spaces in night shelters will be available at 11:30pm and again at 12:30pm. If you have not provided a finger image during enrollment, your finger will be "read," then shelter staff will also ask you for the "unique identity" information that you provided during enrollment. When this is entered in the CHANGES computer, your photo will appear on the screen, confirming your identity and your reservation. You will then be checked-in.

PROTECTING YOUR PRIVACY

Finger-imaging is NOT the same as finger-printing. When you have your fingers "imaged," the computer uses a mathematical formula to count the ridges of your fingers and produce an identification number. Like a finger printing, no two people will have the same number. This number is stored in the shelter computer system. No picture of the finger printing is stored in the computer system

When you enter shelter, scanners "read" your finger ridges again, and confirm your identification number. This number cannot be matched with any external records and will not be shared with law enforcement or immigration agencies

NO IMMIGRATION PENALTY FOR SHELTER USE

For those concerned that use of the shelter system may affect your eligibility for permanent residency, please note that shelter residency does NOT affect your status and does NOT make you a Public Charge.
