Curb Ramp Identification

- Curb ramp was recently built and should be useable by most, if not all, people with disabilities.
- Curb ramp is older. Many, but not all, wheelchair users can use it.
- Curb ramp is old and does not meet our construction standards. If you use this ramp, please do so carefully.

- MUNI Rail Key Stop
- Water
- Park

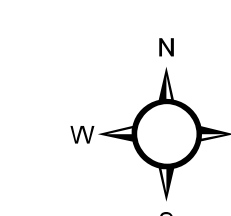
If there is no dot on a corner, the corner either does not have a pedestrian crossing, or it has no curb ramp. In planning a route, that corner should not be included.

These maps are intended to help wheelchair users and others navigate our public streets. We prioritize curb ramp construction according to the needs of wheelchair users who use that corner routinely.
