New Café In City Hall



Noticed any new activity in the North Light Court lately? That would be City Hall's new café setting up here in the building. After a lengthy Request for Proposals process, the Mint Café has been chosen as the new Café Operator for City Hall.

You might recognize Reem Nasra and her staff from the café in the Superior Courts building, or their outlet in the Main Library. If not, now is your chance to get to know them and get acquainted with the delicious food they will be serving in both the North Light Court and the Ground Floor Café space.

Mint Café has set up the first phase of their operation in the North Light Court with freshly brewed coffee, scrumptious pastries, and a variety of freshly prepared salads, soups, and sandwiches. This location will serve as the Mint Café's main outlet in City Hall while the Ground Floor Café location undergoes a welcome renovation. The North Light Court Café will remain in operation after the Ground Floor Café is re-opened.

The Ground Floor Cafe is expected to be open for business in the first quarter of 2011. At that time, the NLC location will be reprogrammed with an emphasis on additional retail services, such as floral and gift items, newsstand services, books and cards.

The Mint Café operates weekdays, from 7:30AM to 4:00PM. They accept all major credit cards and are a future Clipper Retailer. Free Wi-Fi is available in the North Light Court. The café's main number is 415-255-9500.

GIANTS TROPHY TOUR CONTINUES TO SPREAD GIANT'S FEVER!



On Wednesday, December 15, 2010, City Hall became filled with jubilant Giants fans crowding in to see the championship trophy, which was in town to kick-off of a five-state tour that will stretch over the next few months. The San Francisco Giants have launched a public tour of the World Champions trophy,

which returned once again to City Hall on January 4th and 5th on its first official stop of a 30-stop tour around Northern California, Oregon, Nevada, Arizona, and New York.

In the months leading up to the opening of the 2011 baseball season, the World Champions Trophy Tour presented by Visa, will travel throughout northern and central California, southern Oregon and western Nevada. The Trophy Tour

will make a few detours when it travels to the Giants Spring Training Facility in Scottsdale, Arizona and to New York City to pay tribute to those New York/San Francisco Giants baseball fans residing on the east coast. It will also make a trip to Troy, New York - where the team was originally founded - and a visit to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

"For more than 52 years, our dedicated fans have supported us through thick and thin," said Giants Managing General Partner and CEO Bill Neukom. "The trophy belongs to them as much as it belongs to us, and we want to thank our fans by extending the World Champions celebration throughout Giants country."

"It's great news that the Giants have decided to share this

trophy with Giants fans all over America," said Mayor Newsom. "We're honored to join the Giants in kicking off this tour, and thank them for being such an excellent civic partner over the years. Congratulations again to the entire Giants organization on a magical 2010 season."



Fans can view the trophy in person at each stop

during the specified times on a first-come, first-served basis. The viewings are free to the public. Fans will have the opportunity to have a professional photo taken and can purchase those photos on-line.

The trophy will tour the neighborhoods of San Francisco eventually making its way to AT&T Park for the home opener on April 8, 2011.

Profile: Four New Supervisors

Four new members of the Board of Supervisors have moved into City Hall.

Let's take a look at our newly elected officials:



District 2- Mark Farrell

Born and raised in San Francisco, Mark Farrell attended Stuart Hall and Saint Ignatius. After graduating from both Loyola Marymount and the University of Pennsylvania Law School, he returned to San Francisco.

As an attorney, Mark consistently represented pro bono clients - assisting both 501(c)(3) non-profit organizations as well as representing political asylum applicants in front of the Department of Homeland Security. As an investment banker, he founded his firm's first internship program for inner-city high school students. Today, Mark is involved with the Jordan Park Improvement Association and serves on the Board of Directors at San Francisco SAFE and Plan C. He also serves on the Advisory Board of the Marina Earthquake Monument.



District 6- Jane Kim

Jane Kim's family immigrated to the United States in the early 1970's. She received her undergraduate degree from Stanford University, where she studied Political Science and Asian American Studies. She then received her law degree from U.C. Berkeley School of Law, Boalt Hall.

Jane is currently the President of the SF Board of Education and a civil rights attorney at Lawyers Committee for Civil Rights of the San Francisco Bay Area. She also was a fellow at the Greenlining Institute, and worked as a Senior Community Organizer for the Chinatown Community Development Center in SF. Jane was elected to serve as President of the San Francisco People's Organization, she is a co-founder and co-director of Locus Arts in the North Mission and SOMA, and also served on the Board of Directors for the Asian American Theater.



District 8- Scott Weiner

Scott Wiener was born in Philadelphia and grew up in southern New Jersey. He attended college at Duke University, studied on a Fulbright Scholarship in Chile, and attended Harvard Law School. Scott has lived in San Francisco's Castro neighborhood since 1997. He worked as a Deputy City Attorney in the San Francisco City Attorney's Office where he supervised a team of attorneys on the Trial Team and represented San Francisco in court.

Scott served as President of the Eureka Valley Promotion Association, chairman of the SF Democratic Party, and co-chaired the Alice B. Toklas Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender Democratic Club. He is currently an elected member of the SF Democratic County Central Committee and continues to serve on the Alice B. Toklas board of directors. He served as treasurer and then co-chair of the board of directors of the SF LGBT Community Center. He served for four years on the board of directors of Bay Area Lawyers for Individual Freedom (BALIF), which is the Bay Area's LGBT bar association, and co-chaired the organization. He served for almost a decade on the national board of directors of the Human Rights Campaign, the nation's largest LGBT advocacy organization.



District 10- Malia Cohen

Malia Cohen, was born in San Francisco and is a Managing Partner with Power Forward Consulting, a public affairs, media and policy consulting firm.

Prior to establishing Power Forward Consulting, Malia was a member of the Corporate Strategy and Communications team for the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, which conducts the Nation's monetary policy, supervises and regulates banking institutions and maintains the stability of the financial system.

In addition, Malia served as Assistant Executive Director of the Hunters Point Youth Park Foundation and as a delegate to the California State Democratic Party Convention.

Malia earned a Bachelor's degree in Political Science, with honors, from Fisk University, was awarded the prestigious Coro Fellowship in 2001, and recently completed a Masters degree in Public Policy and Management from Carnegie Mellon University.

Wind and Solar-Powered Hybrid Streetlights

Installed in Civic Center Plaza

Four state-of-the-art wind and solar powered hybrid LED streetlights have been installed in Civic Center Plaza as part of a pilot demonstration project by the SF Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC). The hybrid streetlight demonstration project is another step towards realizing the Civic Center Sustainability District announced by Mayor Newsom and former President Bill Clinton in 2008.

"The Civic Center Sustainability District seeks to showcase cutting-edge environmental technologies, energy efficiency and renewable energy projects all within the context of our historic Civic Center Plaza," said Mayor Newsom. "This new hybrid streetlight pilot project is another step towards achieving our vision of a model, sustainable public square that harnesses the power of the wind and sun to deliver an essential government service."

The new hybrid LED streetlights will reduce energy consumption at Civic Center Plaza by 1400 kilowatt hours per year and offset the equivalent of 1516 lbs of CO2 per year. The lights are comprised of a 600 watt vertical axis wind turbine, along with an 80 watt photovoltaic solar generation module, both of which are mounted on the light pole. The power produced by the operation of the wind turbine and the solar module will be used to charge a battery pack, which will then power the streetlight during its dusk and nighttime operation. The renewable power is stored in a battery, with a 5 or 7 day storage capacity.

The installation of the hybrid streetlights at Civic Center Plaza will also complement the upcoming citywide LED Streetlight Conversion Program. Beginning in the spring of 2011, the SFPUC will replace approximately 18,500 high-pressure sodium streetlights in San Francisco

with dimmable LED streetlights. The LED conversion program will provide substantial environmental, financial and economic benefits to the entire City, reducing energy and maintenance costs by \$900,000 annually and saving 5,800 megawatt hours/year – the equivalent of taking approximately 950 houses off the grid.

Chinese New Year starts with the New Moon on the first day of the new year and ends on the full moon 15 days later. The 15th day of the new year is called the Lantern Festival, which is celebrated at night with lantern displays and children carrying lanterns in a parade. The Chinese calendar is based on a combination of lunar and solar movements. The lunar cycle is about 29.5 days. In order to "catch up" with the solar calendar the Chinese insert an extra month once every few years (seven years out of a 19-yearcycle). This is the same as adding an extra day on leap year. This is why, according to the solar calendar, the Chinese New Year falls on a different date each year. New Year's Eve and New Year's Day are celebrated as a family affair, a time of reunion and thanksgiving.

Parade highlights include elaborate floats, lion dancers, folk dancers, costumed elementary school groups, marching bands, stilt walkers, Chinese acrobats, and a 250 foot long Golden dragon, ("Gum Lung.")

SFMTA TO ENFORCE **PARKING METER FEES** FOR CITY VEHICLES



On November 16, 2010, the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA) Board of Directors approved revisions to the Transportation Code required to implement certain changes to parking management for City vehicles. SFMTA has implemented these changes for the purpose of improving the management of parking availability, reducing traffic congestion, and encouraging the use of alternate transportation by City employees.

Effective February 1, 2011, City vehicles will no longer be allowed to park at parking meters in San Francisco for free. Beginning February 1st, any City-owned vehicle parked at a meter on official City business will be required to display an SFMTA issued parking permit or deposit sufficient funds into the meter for the time required.

Chinese New Year is February 3rd

City Departments can purchase an annual Official City Business Parking Permit through SFMTA. permits are designed to be transferable among multiple vehicles and may only be used by employees in the course of their official job duties. Agencies may also choose to purchase pre-paid parking meter cards from the SFMTA.
