#### **Diana Pang**



## :: Youth Employment Committee

The Youth Employment Committee was small, but packed a punch this term. We researched the youth employment system, or the lack thereof and made specific recommendations about building a sustainable system, not just putting more money into more programs. Specially, we asked for the Mayor to reconstitute the Youth Council, which was also echoed by the Transitional Youth Task Force, hire a youth employment director inside the Mayor's Office of Economic and Workforce Development and have some cultural competency training at the current One-Stop employment centers.

We worked with YouthWorks, a program administered out of Japanese Community Youth Center, that places youth inside city departments. We asked that the Mayor and the Board of Supervisor make a substantive investment in this program so that more youth are introduced to civic service jobs. We found that only a few of the city departments contribute to the program, and we asked that the Mayor ask for a contribution from all departments for at least one youth.

Unfortunately, the majority of our recommendations were not adopted in the 06-07 term, but we look forward to another term advocating to build a system so that all youth can access employment services, get work permits and have to plan to reach their career goals. We look forward to a city where all youth can be supported to find a good job and reach their highest aspirations.

## :: Health and Social Services Committee

Health and Social Services Committee worked to enhance services in violence prevention to reflect a more holistic viewpoint in public health: mental, behavioral health, and related services. Also known as "Hot and Supa Sexy," we conducted presentations to community members ranging from Gay Straight Alliance to Marin Headlands, advised on youth-led policies on minor consent and tobacco mitigation, and proposed budget recommendations on high needs.

Earlier in the year, we analyzed the Mayor's Homeless Connect and made recommendations to its steering committee to better serve transitional aged youth. We advised the Balboa Teen Health Center to advocate for youth knowledge of California minor consent laws.

The crux of Health and Social Services Committee's influence rests in its budget recommendations. The committee worked extensively with the Adolescent Health Working Group and Children's Family and Budget Coalition to win a successful add back of \$320,000 for full staffing of four new wellness centers. Our other community support wins also included advocacy in partnership with LGBTQ Community Partnership and Improving Transition Outcomes for Youth with Disabilities (ITOP), that secured queer youth employment and funding for a youth summit for the disabled community.

#### :: Recreation and Services Committee

The Recreation and Services Committee focused on pressing forward efforts to create a dedicated multi-service and accessible citywide youth center. Its committee highlights included the thorough investigation of several of the city's underutilized recreation centers as well as the effectiveness of the Mayor's RecConnect program as an alternative.

The Recreations and Services committee made recommendation to high level staff at the Recreation and Parks department about specific recreation centers that were severely underutilized. They also made recommendation directly to the Mayor for an expansion of RecConnect programs in the under served neighborhoods of Tenderloin and SOMA. The Recreation and Services also examined site locations for citywide youth centers including the brown building at Turk and Fillmore as well as the Geneva building near the Balboa BART station. The committee worked directly with aides from Supervisor Sandoval's office (Geneva building) as well as lead staff at DCYF's RecConnect to advocate for these respective programs.

Much of this year's committee focused on information gathering and gaining an understanding of the unique challenges faced by the city's Recreation and Parks department as well as toward the goal of creating a city wide Recreation Center. In order to expand on these efforts, the committee would like to make the following suggestions:

- ...help foster a unified youth advocacy effort with a specific location for a youth center. Some ideas include Geneva building, SOMA efforts, building at Turk and Fillmore, or even collaborating with the Ports commission to utilize their property.
- address some of the political issues being faced by community based organizations funded through RecConnect and the parks and recreation workers union.
- ... develop a strategy to promote recreation by engaging the athletic community. Find out more about how to enhance local sports, involve professional sports, as well as their community service efforts.

#### :: Youth Justice Committee

The Youth Justice committee developed and acted upon various issues dealing with youth and justice. Its committee highlights included new partnerships (Girls Initiative, Peer Court, and the Larkin YMCA), conducting presentations within San Francisco's Juvenile Justice center, lobbying for budget recommendations to the Mayor's Office, enhancing the Juvenile Advisory Council, and ensuring adequate services for all youth within the Juvenile Justice center. Furthermore, the Youth Justice committee held an event in respect of Black History Month and has been working closely with the Student Advisory Council on YouthVote.

However, its cornerstone this term was the budget recommendation dealing with youth cultural competency training for police officers. Conceived and realized by Youth Commission policy and advocacy in previous years, Youth Justice will have the privilege to develop and present the budget recommendation in front of the BOS Public Safety Committee this summer 2007. The Youth Cultural Competency training consists of retraining San Francisco police officers to improve interactions with youth especially of color.

The Passion of the Youth Commissioners and political climate of San Francisco to ensure that this committee's work will be valued and continued" In the forecast ahead, Commissioners would like their successors to:

- Pay attention to youth incarcerated in within Juvenile Justice Center, such as job opportunities, education opportunities, and reduced recidivism rates and out of home placements.
- 2. Also to expand services to transitional aged youth within the systems
- 3. Furthermore, to pay close attention to the relationship between youth and the San Francisco police officers.

It was an enticing and rigorous experience.

## :: Advocacy for the 07-08 Budget

Violence prevention was the Commision's top budget priority for the year. With the majority of homicide victims being youth under 25 and the rate of homicides at a historic high, each committee sought to advocate for funding priorities that addressed this issue.

Violence prevention means youth employment, strong relationships, primary and mental health care, safe stable home lives, positive communities and educational options. We believe that any and all programs, interventions, and community-building efforts that begin before violence occurs are invaluable to be funded.

We submitted our budget recommendations to the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor. Most importantly, our top five budget asks were identified under the Budget for Youth and Families Coalition, which helped community win approximately four million in the add-back process.

## :: Operations and Vice Chair Officer Report

Just one glance on the Youth Commission's website on "Calendar," "News and Announcements" and their archive sections would tell you how much internal communication was invaluable to us this year. Commissioner Carvalho served as the operations and vice chair, and she kept the Commission afloat by ensuring that communication was open and dynamic -- she worked with staff to coordinate save the date events.

In meetings, operations presided over the roll call and kept an active eye on the attendance for retention purposes. This year's full Commission status is attributed to Luciana's work in strengthening communication. She acted as a direct liaison and support for Commissioners who raised concerns.

Still, the Commission's social and retention activities would have been impossible without her. She was instrumental in organizing our yearly events, from our mid-year retreat to our Christmas party, to our summer picnic and Commissioner community building.

## :: Community Affairs Officer Report

Commissioner James stepped in as our community affairs officer this year. Under her direction, the Commission sponsored a series of community events that bridged people together. Commissioner James helped organize CLAER Project's Peace March and Rally: Bringing Forth Light from Darkness that aimed to stop violence locally and abroad. She and Commissioners Franklin and Shamonda coordinated the Youth Commission Black History Month celebration, which drew elders and youth audiences for a night of celebration and empowerment.

The commission drew greater awareness this term. Due to her heavy involvement, our visibility increased. Commissioner James and Commissioner Gong performed and policy workshops that the Youth Commission designed as an outreach tool for youth groups. It is no wonder that her activities earned her a Youth Warrior Award and at this year's Youth Empowerment Conference.

# :: Media and Public Relations Officer Report

Commissioner Elkarra served as our Media and Public Relations Officer. From MUNI to housing, to individual Commissioner star power, to co-sponsorship of events, we gained greater momentum and broke new grounds this year.

2/15/07	The fantastic collaboration between the Dept. of Park and Recreation, SFUSD, and SF youth is made in an article by Peter Lauterborn on www.beyondchron.org. Commissioner Anthony Albert gets quoted! See for yourself one idea of how different entities striving for the betterment of SF citizens can work together.
3/07	Commissioners Rubin and Carvalho attend the Mayor's Townhall on Youth. After much community recognition on the importance of the Youth Commission, Carvalho garners GavinWatch.com supporters attention when she questioned Mayor Newsom on his affordable housing stance, and Commissioner Rubin was approached by Chief Heather Fong for his position in advocating for youth competency training for police.



## :: Transitional Youth Task Force

This Youth Commission supported the work of the Transitional Youth Task Force (TYTF). The task force formed in March 2006 was driven from legislation that the Youth Commission wrote in April 2005 asking the Mayor to create an interagency group of adults and young people to address the diverse and underrepresented needs of 16-24 year olds. Commissioners Rubin and James served as the liaisons to the Young Adult Team and Rachel Antrobus staffed. Over the term, the task force created comprehensive recommendations around career development, educational needs and community support focused specifically for disconnected transitional aged youth. Young people exiting public systems were targeted, as many services drop off after 18 and young people can be lost as to where they can go for continued support.

Among the TYTF recommendations, these were the recommendations that overlapped with the Youth Commission:

- Getting young people to the decision-making table and creating ways to involve youth in the decisions that effect them;
- Reforming the Workforce Investment San Francisco Youth Council so that it can serve as a central hub for funding and advocacy for youth workforce development;
- Creating citywide minimum quality standards for youth services and providing better outreach to make sure youth know where good services are located;
- Building centers where young people can access services and expanding the places where youth can hang out, play sports and get support;
- Expanding healthcare for all young people in the City, not just those exiting systems.

We would like to thank Marlo Simmons (DCYF staff) and the Young Adult Team members--Kat Casela, Carlos Cortez, Perry Jones, Oscar Pena, Victor Peterson, Rocio Quijano, Angela Rosales and Jeremiah Wright for their tireless work on developing these recommendations, along with the 20+ adult members of TYTF. We would like the City to develop more adult-youth partnership like TYTF to ensure youth are involved and heard in the process of developing plans that effect them and commend Mayor Newsom for this thoughtful and comprehensive effort.

# :: Youth Empowerment Fund Advisory Board

The Youth Empowerment Fund Advisory Board (YEFAB) provides leadership and oversight to the Youth Empowerment Fund that designates approximately \$1,000,000 for youth-initiated projects each year. This year, YEFAB funded youth entrepreneurship and continued to oversee the youth organizing grantees from previous years. YEFAB partners with the Youth Commission, where Commissioners Gramlich, Albert, Kwong, and Elkarra participate to ensure that the youth voice is incorporated at every decision-making level.

YEFAB's roles and responsibilities include grant-making, documenting and assessing the work of youth programs, facilitating ways for youth in the city to get together, learn from each other, and celebrate each other's work, and provide feedback on the overall design and implementation of the Youth Empowerment Fund Initiative. We are indebted to the efforts of Alicia Yang, the coordinator of the Youth Empowerment Fund.

Out of the Youth Empowerment Fund, the Youth Commission also came out in full force to participate and sponsor the Youth Empowerment Conference that convened young people from all over the City to celebrate and connect to local youth-led change. Cohosted by Mayor Newsom and the Department of Children, Youth, and their Families, the free event featured youth-run panels and workshops, a resource fair, an awards ceremony, films, and cultural dances to inspire collective action and illustrate youth victories. Commissioners Iqra Anjum and Shadi Elkarra address the State of the Youth in SF; Commissioner James gets honored with a Youth Warrior Award. ABC 7 and other news report.

## :: YouthVOTE, Joint Education Committee, and Prop H

The Youth Commission (of the City and County of San Francisco), in partnership with the Student Advisory Council (of the SF Unified School District) and community-based Youth Leadership Institute coordinated the 2007 YouthVOTE project. YouthVOTE serves as a civic engagement education tool in which SFUSD high school students can actively exercise their political voices by voting in mock elections.

This year, 8000 high school results responded and results were:

- 65 percent of students vote "NO" on Proposition 85 Waiting Period and Parental Notification before Termination of Minor's Pregnancy.
- **69 percent of students vote "YES"** on **Proposition A** School Bond and Tax Rate
- 77 percent of students vote "YES" on Proposition F Paid Sick Leave
- Students vote Dr. James Calloway, Jane Kim, and Bayard Fong as their top three candidates for the San Francisco Board of Education.
- Elected student delegate to the Board of Education Lea Elliott.

As a result of the longstanding history between the Youth Commission and the Student Advisory Council (SAC) in collaborating on YouthVOTE, an ad-hoc education committee was continued.

Both groups worked on legislation to institutionalize YouthVOTE as a broader civic engagement tool that would provide voter education curricula and voter registration days for SFUSD.

The Youth Commission also joined the SAC and collaborated in a focus group to ensure student voices would be represented in the Proposition H – Public Education Enrichment Fund, where the city was allocating \$30 million to schools for enhanced needs. The top recommendations asked for more 1) violence prevention/school climate funding, 2) afterschool programming, and 3)college and career counselors.

As a result, approximately \$1.5M in school-based violence prevention funding was won! Youth Commissioners and representatives from Coleman Advocates/Youth Making a Change, CHALK, providers from the Asian Youth Advocacy Network (AYAN), and Peer Resources came out in full force to support violence prevention funding.
