Supervisor Melgar: first time coming in front of the YC. Was previous director of Jamestown Community Center, which was very involved with Free Muni for Youth campaign back in 2012. In 2013 there was a compromise to do free muni for free muni for low income youth which served 40k youth a year. Saw that requirements for this was cumbersome regarding having to have parents apply/literacy issues and so only about 70% of youth who could participate did. Access issues were a barrier to entry.

Not able to implement Free Muni for everyone this year and cuts are happening still, even in D7. However, youth are back to school and she is working with the MO and other Supes and able to put in the funding for the program for the entire year, so Muni will be free to ALL youth starting August 15th and no one has to submit any documentation or apply, you just have to get on public transportation. It will coincide with the start of school so youth will have the freedom to get on transportation around the same time that routes are expanding post pandemic.

Youth access and freedom, as well as data, to make sure we can prove that opening access to youth will increase ridership and have youth be the riders of tomorrow. Evidence shows that when you start taking muni earlier, riders become lifelong riders.

Kudos to SFYC for pushing this issue, and kudos to CPA, Coleman, and Power for over a decade. She promises to work hard and this is sustainable and keep this going and make it a permanent feature.

Thank you all for your advocacy, the SFYC was crucial in getting us over the finish line and pushing this issue. You have my commitment to keep this going past this year.

Questions:

Commissioner Zhang: thank you for presenting, SFYC does have a long history of supporting Free Muni for Youth

Commissioner Quick: Thank you for coming to present and support for Free Muni for All Youth. A few questions about implementation:

- When is this gonna roll out?
- When we think about MTA's process of implementation, how will they advertise this from Day 1

Answer: From what I know, the program starts 8/15 which is great because schools start that day. The expansion of the program will include parochial and independent schools. The MTA already has a relationship with SFUSD, these relationships will be mobilized and they will inform students. SFMTA will work with the archdiocese. We will do a big push through media and social media. I think it would be great to work with the YC to advertise this work.

SFMTA Diana Hammons has a presentation to share regarding implementation. Communication and Outreach Plan:

- direct mail to current Free Muni for Youth Participants
- posters/flyers to SFUSD, City College, private and religious school orgs and CBOS
- social media campaign
- emails to all registered clipper card holders
- in vehicle/shelter advertisements



Supervisor Melgar: the SFYC has a strong Twitter game- SFMTA can send out the marketing materials. Commissioners Asfaw and Zhang will be in touch about outreach possibilities.

Commissioner Asfaw: Does SFMTA think of ways to address how a young person looks.

Supervisor Melgar: goal was to do everything to increase ridership and didn't want to put any hard protocols because that's not the point. The goal is different for the Supes which is as flexible as possible and does not even ask about age. Diana Hammons: complete overhaul on fare compliance and staff use best discretion to be sensitive to age verification and is not a focus for them. Less than .03% of citations were issued to youth and says this low engagement will continue. In the case of someone being 21/21

Supervisor Melgar: it'd be great for us to come back to the YC as implementation goes through to get feedback and more ideas.

Commissioner Quick: I have a question about the subway - how will this work with the subway gates?

Diana: We already have this process for our lifeline participants. The gate closest to the station is on open mode. It will automatically open regardless of staffing. It works very well and there's stickers for fare gates. These will be the instructions for this messaging.

Commissioner Quick: so is there an open mode on every exit?

Diana: Yes, they are all left on open mode. The one gate closest to the station.

Discussion: Commissioner Quick: this is really exciting to see this finally coming to fruition after a decade of advocacy the SFYC has been involved in; especially HLU in the last 1.5 years to eliminate the youth fare. One of the main reasons why this is happening!

Commissioner Asfaw: I echo what you're saying and happy we can meet some of the needs of youth in San Francisco.

Public Comment:

Hayden Miller, SF Resident: Lives in D1, youth, strong support in favor of this. Went to Santa Rosa and they have fare free transit for under 18. A lot of the people were just finding out about it, so outreach is important, and hearing it from the driver is also helpful. Encouraging lifelong ridership and the habits. Really great program and hope it will be marketed and implemented well. Thanks to SFYC for its advocacy for this.

Alexander Hirji: former YCer, strongly supports this program. Has been a crucial equity issue for a long time because of deficiencies that were a part of the previous Free Muni program. Applications were hard to find. Goal of YC to get this done for a very long time and urges the SFYC to support this. Opens the door to having this be a possible permanent program.

Malena Leon-Farrera, part of the SF Planning Department presenting. Land acknowledgement that we are on Ramaytush land. We benefit and wish to pay respects to the Ramaytush people.

Housing element:

- City's housing plan prepared by Planning Dept with other city agencies
- legislated document adopted by BOS and signed into Ordinance
- required eligibility criteria for state affordable housing funds
- updates required by the state every 8 years
- does not change land use controls or zoning and does not allocate budget would guide and direct those decisions.

SF housing problem is a racial and social equity problem; disparate outcomes rooted in long history with institutional racism and discriminatory programs.

Data shows that American Indian and Black population dropped significantly and are more likely to be rent burdened than white households.

SF housing problem is also an economic problem. Increase price to own a home.

Need structural changes to address root causes. First time this plan will be centered on racial and economic issues.

Key policy shifts under consideration:

- for who?: American Indian, Black and other communities of color; unhoused or at risk of being unhoused, vulnerable populations, moderate and middle income households
- recognizing right to housing for vulnerable groups, expand programs to bring back displaced communities, priority geographies, high opportunity areas



Outreach: held 15 listening sessions, 7 presentations to CBOs, 118 online platform participants, etc.

-Community led Strategy: pay CBOs and participants

Commissioner Asfaw: no action needed on this item. Any input you want to give, please speak now.

Commissioner Quick: very interesting and thank you for coming back and walking us through these updates. Please go more in depth on Planning Department approaching the concentration of new development of housing production in that the city's strategy is doing area plans in low income neighborhoods which has furthered displaced Black and American Indian communities, while not producing enough housing, talk more about how we are planning to open up areas that have not had any affordable housing built in them. How is the Planning Department approaching this?

Answer: I want to begin by saying that the state passed a housing law that says we have to address segregated areas and racially concentrated areas of affluence. In order to do this, we need to check access and look into areas of concentrated poverty. This means opening up the areas highlighted in the map (slides). The way we can do this is with areas with improved transit and targeting these areas for housing development. Another way we are thinking is small and mid rise buildings, right now these new developments are for families. We can remove some of these restrictions to allow more units to be built in one lot. At least 50% of our affordable housing funds will be used in these areas. Our approach is that the state mandates that we plan for these units. We are trying to replace this growth and spread it equivocally across the city, this needs to be a more equitable process. We have different strategies that respond to the need and adhere to state law.

Commissioner Quick: a related point, the funding mechanism for affordable housing that we are going to rely on for the next 8 years. Is the PD in conjunction with the Housing Element, thinking about the money that is available. Is the money enough?

Kimia: Thank you. As you mentioned, our funding has not been sufficient. The affordable housing funding given to regional areas isn't enough, the main reason we've fallen behind. We are trying to piece together different sources of funding. The city has incorporated housing into the capital planning process. The gap is huge and how

Malena: We are incorporating strategies that we hope will reduce the cost of building homes. We have funding and also reduce costs.

Commissioner Quick: Can you go into detail about the ideas for cost reduction?

Malena: using new materials, reimagining permitting and removing uncertainty.

Commissioner Tanaka: represent D1, which you noticed as a rich area and a dead spot. What are your conversations from the westside like and with Sup. Chan? What has been the response?



Kimia: We noticed there is a general understanding for more housing, but we have heard concerns about the type of people moving in. There has been capacity building amongst CBOs to hear more about their input regarding our policies.

Malena: I want to acknowledge Sup. Mar's initiative Sunset Forward doing a needs assessment for the Sunset. I did sit through these conversations and it was evident there are a lot of concerns about their children not being able to live there. We have a need for affordable housing and need flexibility for housing choices for youth, seniors, and families.

Kimia: We are working on a youth focus group and would love to come back with the commission with updates in November. Feel free to give us feedback on our policies that are on our website.

RESOLUTION NO. 2021-AL-16

[San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency - Transit Service Restoration]

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1     **Resolution urging the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency to commit to**  
2     **100% restoration of pre-pandemic service levels by the end of 2021, and to ensure**  
3     **frequent and efficient transit options for students returning to school in Fall 2021.**  
4

5             WHEREAS, On April 8, 2020 the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency  
6     ("SFMTA") implemented the Core Service Plan, which cut service on a large number of Muni  
7     lines to accommodate various changes to operations protocol due to the Covid-19 pandemic,  
8     while increasing frequency on a few core lines such as the 14-Mission; and

9             WHEREAS, While the SFMTA has a structural deficit and revenues were additionally  
10    reduced during the pandemic, the agency has received \$715 million in federal stimulus aid  
11    through June 2021, with at least \$400 million more estimated to be distributed over the next  
12    months, leaving the agency in a better financial position than it began the pandemic in; and

13            WHEREAS, The SFMTA has additionally indicated its intent to pursue a ballot measure  
14    in 2022 to close its long-term structural deficit; and

15            WHEREAS, However, as of July 2021, the SFMTA has no plans to restore transit  
16    service to more than 85% of pre-pandemic levels; and

17            WHEREAS, Low-income and non-white communities have disproportionately relied on  
18    public transportation throughout the pandemic, all while having to endure frequently worse  
19    wait-times and transit coverage, and are the most impacted by the SFMTA's lack of plan to  
20    restore service to pre-pandemic levels; and

21            WHEREAS, Public school students—in particular high school students, a majority of  
22    whom commute on Muni—have been almost completely left behind in planning for service  
23    restoration, with uncertain options for students returning to in-person learning in the fall; and

1           WHEREAS, The SFMTA has a duty to provide quality public transit for San Francisco  
2 residents, both for those who rely on it as their primary means of transportation and as a  
3 broad public policy goal in the face of the climate crisis; and

4           WHEREAS, Refusing to outline an aggressive timetable for full restoration of service—  
5 which other Bay Area transit agencies including BART and AC Transit have done—is counter-  
6 productive to the goal of getting riders back on transit; and

7           WHEREAS, Restoring 100% of pre-pandemic service levels is a prerequisite to  
8 building on 2019 frequencies and coverage, without which communities that have not been  
9 adequately served by transit during the pandemic are liable to be left out of future coverage;  
10 and

11           WHEREAS, In vetoing legislation that would have allocated reserve funding for a three-  
12 month Free Muni for All pilot, the Mayor indicated that the SFMTA’s goal should rather be  
13 restoring service; and

14           WHEREAS, Although the implied premise—that treating transit like a universal good  
15 and improving service on said transit are incompatible—is false, the City should nonetheless  
16 plan to realize the goals it commits to, namely restoring Muni service; now, therefore, be it

17           RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the SFMTA to publicly commit to 100%  
18 restoration of routes and pre-pandemic service levels by the end of 2021; and, be it

19           FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the SFMTA to listen to  
20 underserved communities when planning service restoration; and, be it

21           FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the SFMTA to restore  
22 supplemental school service on all school-serving lines to frequent and efficient operation in  
23 time for back-to-school in the fall.
