Project Summary

Anne Bluethenthal & Dancers is seeking support for the expansion of *Skywatchers*, an engagement project that brings formerly homeless residents of the Tenderloin District together with professional artists for the creation of multi-disciplinary, site-specific performance installations that reflect the complex stories and life experiences of the community participants. ABD will develop and present installation performances – incorporating movement, lighting, sound, and improvisational choral singing – at four different Community Housing Partnership facilities in the neighborhood in 2014/15.

Through a series of meetings, CounterPULSE and TNDC will determine the feasibility of a program plan that offers residents of the Dalt Hotel opportunities to engage in social artistic activities, in partnership with CounterPULSE artists and constituencies.

Elizabeth Gjelten

\$10,000

Project Summary

"Home/Cooking" is a community-based theater project bringing together artists, activists, and women living in Single Residence Occupancy (SRO) hotels in the Tenderloin and Central City to address the lack of access to healthy food and cooking facilities. Through small-scale public events involving communal meals, story-sharing, visual art and live performance, participants will engage with the project and each other, and share stories that will become source material for an eventual full-scale theater piece.

Emelle Sonh

\$10,000

Project Summary

Artist Emelle Sonh and San Francisco Senior Center (SFSC) will partner to clarify roles and processes for a project to address ageism. Ageism excludes and isolates and will be addressed by engaging 50+ SFSC members to explore aging, ageism, and a sense of literal and metaphoric place. A prototype deck of Question and Image Cards with photographic images created by the artist will reflect constituent experience and be a tool for expanded conversations about ageism.

Hospitality House

Project Summary

Hospitality House is collaborating with Urbanstreet Films and Archive Production in "Oral NowStories," a film/video project drawing attention to the issues of displacement and gentrification as a consequence of the revitalization efforts in Mid-Market, Tenderloin, and South-of-Market neighborhoods. Oral NowStories will collect voices of the often under represented people impacted by their changing neighborhood and will utilize new media strategies to distribute the footage. The project commences with free Storytelling & Technical workshops for residents.

Jerome Reyes

\$10,000

Project Summary

SOMCAN Echoes, pairs San Francisco native artist Jerome Reyes with South of Market Community Action network to develop new functional art installations, text-based ephemera, and workshops that engage their immigrant membership's everyday concerns of urban life in San Francisco. Reyes and staff will interview members towards ideas that will influence new onsite activities (installations), circulate text in the neighborhood, invite new members, and continue immigrant

services (both existing and newly designed workshops.)

Kulintang Arts Inc.

\$25,000

Project Summary

Kwentóhan is a participatory cultural arts engagement project exploring the personal histories of Pilipinos in San Francisco. Using photography and storytelling, community members and professional artists will unearth the stories behind vintage family photos, creating artful homages with staged contemporary photos, poetry, and prose. A series of photography and storytelling workshops will culminate in a public exhibition in October 2015, giving visual presence to the Filipino community and contextualizing the Pilipino American narrative.

Navarette x Kajiyama Dance Theater

Project Summary

Navarrete x Kajiyama Dance Theater (NAKA) will conduct a nine-month investigation of the intersection of racial equity principles and the making of socially-conscious art. We will partner with Racial Equity educator Tammy Johnson, Joanna Haigood/ZACCHO Dance Theater, and two college-aged artists from BayviewHunter's Point: Nathanael Armstrong and Michael Turner.

Out of Site: Center for Arts Education \$25,000

Project Summary

Out of Site requests \$25,000 to realize a public art & architecture project in the Persia Triangle, the anticipated hub of activity in the Excelsior neighborhood where Persia, Ocean, and Mission meet. Out of Site has been working closely with the Excelsior Action Group to realize a community driven look-and-feel to the space, which will be enhanced and implemented through this project.

Queer Cultural Center

Project Summary

This proposal requests \$25,000 to promote social justice and build a healthy LGBT community by presenting 20 original literature, performance, visual arts and film programs as well as community conversations about LGBT health and wellness issues. Awarded funds will underwrite personnel fees of leadership, artists and technical production fees as well as venue rental, production expenses and marketing.

Project Summary

Root Division requests support to extend/enhance our partnership with Mission Education Center (a K-5 Latino immigrant/newcomer school). In utilizing the Latino Teaching-Artist Fellowship (LTAF), we will train & place 2 Spanish/English bilingual artists to be Artists-in Residence at MEC for the fiscal year. The LTAF will develop & teach the My Two Homes curriculum to 60+ students, helping them build a visual arts language to creatively express their immigration experiences & new life in the U.S.

Cristal Fiel Program Associate, Community Arts and Education San Francisco Arts Commission

Cristal currently serves as Community Arts and Education Program Associate with the San Francisco Arts Commission. She holds bachelor degrees in Sociology and Ethnic Studies from the University of California, Berkeley. During her stint at Berkeley, she was Editor in Chief of the literary and arts organization, Maganda Magazine, where she discovered her calling to work in the arts field. She has served as administrative coordinator and later board member of the Asian American Women Artists Association, and has volunteered with a number of Bay Area arts and cultural organizations including the San Francisco Film Society, Manilatown Heritage Foundation, and Bindlestiff Studio. Cristal was born and raised in San Francisco and currently resides in Oakland.

Beth Rubenstein

Nonprofit and Arts Consultant

Beth is passionate about the intersection of the arts, community development and youth. She is the co-founder of the Out of Site Youth Arts Center in San Francisco. Her work there as the long-time executive director was driven by a two-fold aspiration: to put the arts at the forefront of community change and health, where it is both the core and catalyst for the neighborhood, and to empower youth to be articulate, engaged community members. She is also an architect, and has taught at the high school and college level (Yale College and RISD). After 13 years at Out of Site, she is now a nonprofit and arts consultant. She has a Master of Architecture from Yale University, and a B. A. in art history from Barnard College, Columbia University. Her architectural practice has focused on design/build projects, and she has led community development projects in Nicaragua.



Raissa Simpson Artistic Director

Push Dance Company

Raissa began training in San Jose, California at Dance Art Studio and later continued onto San Jose Dance Theatre, Cleveland Ballet, Central Pennsylvania Youth Ballet, Dance Theatre of Harlem, and the Paul Taylor School. After receiving her BFA from the Conservatory of Dance at SUNY Purchase, Simpson had an extensive performance career in the San Francisco Bay Area dancing with Robert Moses' Kin and Joanna Haigood's Zaccho Dance Theatre, among others. As a freelance artist, she danced with Lucas Films, Tori Quinn at BAPC, Alleluia Panis Dance Theater, Capacitor, Flyaway Productions, Liberation Dance Theater, Michael Mayes, and Peninsula Ballet. Along with serving as Assistant to the Director at Zaccho Dance Theatre, she is featured as a dancer in the film "Never Stand Still," at Jacob's Pillow. Seamlessly integrating multimedia with cuttingedge choreography, Simpson's pieces do not reside merely on stage—they are also site-specific installations in public spaces like museums and city centers. Her work is sweeping, vibrant, multilayered, and socially relevant often involving multiple aspects such as video projection, live music, and Aerial Dance. She currently teaches and guest choreographs her unique style of movement to all types of movers.

Robynn Takayama Program Manager, Community Arts and Education San Francisco Arts Commission

Robynn Takayama is a community artist whose work has been presented through video, web, and gallery installation in San Francisco, Berkeley, Los Angeles, and Chicago. A graduate of the KPFA First Voice Apprenticeship, she has contributed to national and local public radio programs and the Peabody-awarded documentary on Asian American history, Crossing East. Robynn produced Apex Express on KPFA and served on the CPB-funded Makers Quest Talent Committee, charged with finding the most imaginative producers, reporters, and sound artists and urging them to take public radio beyond its traditional airwaves.



Weston Teruya Program Associate, Cultural Equity Grants San Francisco Arts Commission

Weston is a Program Associate with the Cultural Equity Grants program of the San Francisco Arts Commission. He is also a member of the Berkeley Civic Arts Commission where he serves on the Grants Committee. Weston has been a grant panelist and juror for institutions including the Center for Cultural Innovation, Headlands Center for the Arts, Southern Exposure's Alternative Exposure, and California College of the Arts. He has curated exhibitions for Southern Exposure, Berkeley Art Center, and Kearny Street Workshop and written for Hyphen Magazine. Weston has facilitated youth and community arts projects for the Youth Justice Coalition, Asian Pacific American Legal Center and Public Allies-Los Angeles and created murals for Little Tokyo Service Center and Strategic Actions for a Just Economy.

Weston has had solo exhibitions at Intersection for the Arts and Patricia Sweetow Gallery in San Francisco and Pro Arts in Oakland. He has also exhibited at Southern Exposure, the Atlanta Contemporary Art Center, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts and the Palo Alto Art Center. Weston was an Irvine Fellow at the Lucas Artist Residency of the Montalvo Arts Center and was a recipient of a 2009 Artadia grant. Weston received an MFA in Painting and Drawing and MA in Visual & Critical Studies from California College of the Arts.

Tyese M. Wortham Program Associate, Cultural Equity Grants San Francisco Arts Commission

Tyese currently serves as a Cultural Equity Grants (CEG) Program Associate with the San Francisco Arts Commission. Prior to CEG, Tyese served as Program Manager with the San Francisco Ethnic Dance Festival producing and presenting culturally-specific artist populations. Tyese is highly committed to advancing cultural equity in San Francisco Bay Area's arts landscape by serving underrepresented and under-resourced communities.
