### **DESIGN CONCEPT**

The intent of the design is to create a modern and distinctive fire station with a strong presence in the neighborhood. As a civic and public facility, it needs to serve its community; Fire Station 5 is both a 'Beacon'; an identifiable place to go to in case of emergency, and as a 'Lookout'; providing security and care by the firemen watching over the community. This duality extends to the relationship between community pride and the practical needs of the facility and also to the relationships of the program's public versus private functions. The facades represent the diverse program with massing shifts and durable, modern materials.

The building design incorporates the required program elements for the fire department to be efficient at their jobs, but also to rest and live. The public entry and machinery functions (apparatus, trucks, and equipment) are located on the first floor, along with the community spaces for the firemen – day room, dining and kitchen, while the second floor contains the more private and quiet sleeping quarters – with the dormitory facing the front and the officers' rooms at the back.
