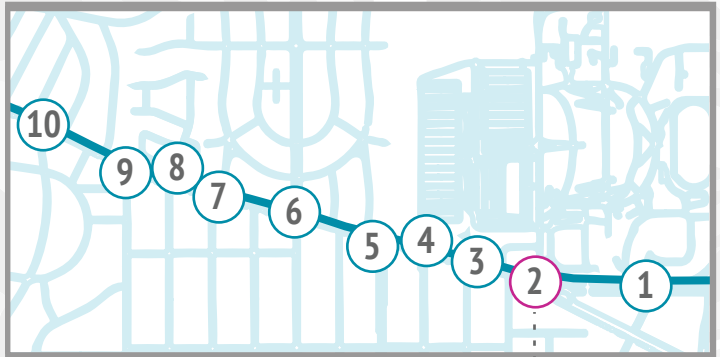

YAX faculty artists in printmaking and photography have worked with public high school students to develop community-driven digital print installations on a series of 10 utility boxes, allowing youth to showcase their work in the city and to engage community members with the arts where they live.

For this project, our printmaking and photography faculty artists and student artists have collaborated in the creation of a concept for an interdisciplinary visual art series, and research on native plants and flowers of the area to understand the history of Ocean Avenue. Photography students took portraits with black and white film along Ocean Avenue with community members of all ages and backgrounds and developed them at Rayko Photo Center. Printmaking students translated those portraits to silk screened pieces, collaging them with native plants to reflect Ocean Avenue “then and now.” Finally, the images were digitally transformed to 3D to install on this series of 10 “editions” along Ocean Avenue SFMTA boxes.

This project is possible through support from Supervisor Yee’s Participatory Budget Process, the Ocean Avenue Association, the San Francisco Arts Commission, and SF Municipal Transportation Authority.

Youth Art Exchange Student/Faculty Artist Overview

We boast a diverse faculty of Professional Artists who live and work in the Bay Area with a passion for engaging and mentoring youth in a shared creative process. The relationship of artist-to-emerging high school artists is at the core of the Youth Art Exchange experience, creating access points to the Bay Area arts community and a broader knowledge of contemporary arts practices. For this project, our printmaking and photography faculty and student artists have collaborated since Fall 2017 in the development of a concept for an interdisciplinary utility box project. Under the mentorship of our faculty artists, printmaking and photography students developed the pieces for review.

We focus our youth services on public high school students and their families, with majority of qualifying for free/reduced lunch (83%) and representing 7 different first languages. Our youth population is 33% Latinx, 30% Asian American, 12% Black, 10% multiracial, 11% white, and 4% other. Approximately 15% identify as LGBTQ. Our programs are free in order to broaden our reach and reduce economic barriers to participation. Our faculty artists are reflective of the youth that we serve, modeling contemporary arts practices for our students, and their engagement is central to our mission. Faculty artists are interviewed and selected by youth program participants and our Youth Advisory Board.

She has taught at YAX since 2014.



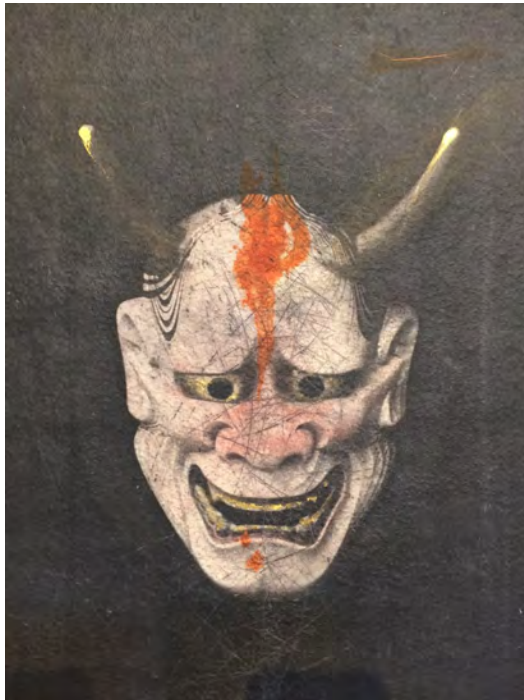
Hyeyoon Song, Printmaker

HyeYoon Song is a Korean born artist who works and resides in San Francisco Bay area. She was raised in Auckland, New Zealand and came to the States in 2003. She has received her BFA at the School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2011 with emphasis in Painting and Print-media and is currently finishing her MFA at California College of the Arts. Her work combines figuration of natural environment accompanied by abstraction, expanding the tradition of abstract expressionism. She holds a teaching position at Mission Grafica as an Etching instructor and also a Printmaking instructor at the MAS Youth program during the summer sessions. She has taught at YAX since 2015.

Paul Mallowney, Master Printer, runs Mallowney Printing in the Mission District of San Francisco. A multi-faceted print studio, Mallowney Printing focuses on publishing and printing etchings, woodcut, photogravure, direct gravure, screen print, and letterpress editions by leading contemporary artists. The studio also runs community workshops, internships, and public exhibitions. After becoming a Master Printer at Crown Point Press in San Francisco, California, Mallowney went on to run studios in Japan and Maui, Hawaii. He has taught at Pacific Northwest College of Art and San Francisco Art Institute, as well as numerous printmaking workshops in America and Japan. He has taught workshops with YAX since 2015.
