
Astrian Suparak Bio

Astria Suparak has curated exhibitions, screenings, performances and live music events for art institutions and festivals across ten countries, including The Liverpool Biennial, Museo Rufino Tamayo, PS1, The Kitchen, Eyebeam, and Exposition Chicago, as well as for unconventional spaces such as roller-skating rinks, ferry boats, elementary schools, sports bars, and rock clubs.

Suparak co-edited *Sports*, the latest issue of *INCITE Journal of Experimental Media*, which is currently launching with a series of exhibitions, screenings, discussions, and other events at locations including the Wexner Center for the Arts, KADIST, the Gene Siskel Film Center, and Yerba Buena Center for the Arts. Suparak was director and curator of the Pratt Institute Film Series (1997-2000), Syracuse University's Warehouse Gallery (2006-07), and Carnegie Mellon's Miller Gallery (2008-14), with exhibitions including *Keep It Slick: Infiltrating Capitalism with The Yes Men*, the first survey of the internationally renowned culture-jamming group; *Whatever It Takes: Steelers Fan Collections, Rituals, and Obsessions,* which explored sports fanaticism as a significant form of cultural production; and *Alien She*, on the lasting impact of the global punk feminist movement Riot Grrrl, among others.

Described as prescient and "visually and conceptually stunning," Suparak's work has been critically acclaimed by *The New York Times, The Huffington Post, Artforum, Rhizome, The Village Voice* and *LA Weekly* for its innovative curatorial approaches, "savvy political consciousness," unique contribution to local and larger cultural spheres, and ability to bridge diverse audiences.

Narrative for Garden Wall Mural

This mural faces the Paul Revere Community garden. Designed by 7th grade students they wanted their mural to reflect what grows in the garden like carrots, eggplant, flowers, jicama, pumpkins, broccoli, potatoes and corn.

The students also wanted to show what happens in a garden that you can't see in the dirt. Like the roots growing and traveling underneath while ants, earthworms and beetles coexist and create a healthy living garden!

To the right of mural is a tall fruit tree that is also a tree house. This tree grows all different kinds of fruit representing the diversity of the students. There are limes, apples, pineapples, grapes and kiwi. A banana and tomato dance underneath the shade of the tree.

Behind the tree is a large sun shining and providing light and warmth to the students helping to tend to the garden while birds fly high up above.



Narrative for Garden Gate Mural

This mural is designed by 5th grade students at Paul Revere Elementary School located in Bernal Heights, San Francisco. The mural will be on the gate entrance to their community garden. Inspired by their imagination, garden plants and nature the students drew out their ideas and put together the composition. They wanted a bright colorful mural that reflected what they wanted to see.

In the middle of the mural is a big lake with various fish and a treasure chest and swimmers. In the background a waterfall flows water into the lake. Surrounding the lake are flowers and planters growing watermelons, vegetables and strawberries while a student waters the growing plants while ladybugs enjoy the warmth. To the left of the mural are rain clouds watering the new seedlings growing in the ground. Earthworms come out of the ground to enjoy the moisture, while a snail seeks cover from the rain under the apple tree. The wind blows in the night with the stars shining and a bee leads us to the morning flying over a lemon tree that is also a Tree house. Birds fly over the waterfall and colorful Butterflies enjoy the bright sunshine, while a Cactus soaks in the sunrays.

Wrapping from Left to right and throughout the mural is a rainbow tying all the imagery together with a poem by Beatrix Potter that reads:

We have a little garden, A garden of our own, And every day we water there The seeds that we have sown.

We love our little garden, And tend it with such care, You will not find a faded leaf Or blighted blossom there.
