Two parts: main wall 626 sq. ft; retaining walls 250 sq. ft. (See schematic in attachments.)

ESTIMATED SCHEDULE (start and completion dates) Wall preparation March, 2022 and completion June 15, 2022

1. Proposal (describe proposed design, site and theme. Attach a separate document if needed).

The mural will celebrate the Glen Park neighborhood, focusing on key aspects of its history and Glen Canyon. It will especially recognize the women (known as the "Gum Tree Girls" for the eucalyptus in the canyon) who successfully campaigned against a freeway that would have destroyed sections of the neighborhood and canyon.

The site is a cul de sac, located at the end of the Glen Park Greenway and is along section two of the Crosstown Trail. It will provide a perfect "pause" to appreciate the history and beauty of the area.

- 2. Materials and processes to be used for wall preparation, mural creation and anti-graffiti treatment.
- -The mural will be painted directly on the wall.
- The wall will Power washed and scrubbed with TSP and water. Then primed with Sherwin- Williams Elastomeric primer.
- The paint is highly pigmented acrylic and is environmentally safe. The V.O.C (Volatile Organic Compounds) in NOVA acrylic paint is in compliance with the SCAQMD Rule 1113 for graphic arts. Wastewater from cleaning brushes will be disposed of properly and not in the storm drains.
- Twin Walls Mural Company will apply 4 coats of anti- graffiti coating and UV protection
- **3.** List individuals and groups involved in the mural design, preparation and implementation.
- 1. Project is led by four long-time Glen Park residents. Renee Berger, Mary Szczepanik, Allison Arieff, and Anne Wintroub.
- 2. There's been significant community input including interviews with the families of the Gum Tree Girls, a community survey (120+ responses), and a history walk with the founder of the Glen Park Neighborhood History Project.
- 3. DPW has done a structural review and followed with minor patching
- 4. Twin Walls Mural Company will do the wall preparation and implementation.

On behalf of San Francisco Public Works, I am pleased to strongly support Glen Park neighbors in their planning of a mural on the retaining wall at the end of Burnside Avenue, backing up onto the Glen Park Greenway. This mural is in the public right of way under Public Works' jurisdiction.

The Burnside Mural is a Glen Park residents-led beautification initiative that aims to celebrate the history of the neighborhood. This project promises to be not only a wonderful addition to Glen Park, but also to the City of San Francisco. The site is at the end point of the Glen Park Greenway on Burnside Avenue and on the path of the popular Crosstown Trail. This mural will deepen a public understanding and appreciation of the neighborhood's people, events and history, as well as feature aspects of its spectacular canyon. One theme of the mural is celebrating three neighborhood women, known as the Gum Tree Girls, whose activism stopped the proposed cross-town freeway from decimating the area.

The mural design fully reflects an extensive process of community outreach, including interviews with the families of the Gum Tree Girls, a survey distributed to various community groups (we received more than 120 responses) and "walkabouts" with a neighborhood historian. Feedback has been overwhelmingly positive, with the proposed mural described as "incredible," "gorgeous" and "stunning." Specific comments from the Gum Tree Girls' families include, "There is so much joy and life in this," and "Better than anything I could have imagined. The whole city should be proud."

The idea of the Burnside Mural was presented to the Glen Park Association in December 2019 by Renee Berger, a 25-year resident of Glen Park, and quickly became a project of the Glen Park Greenway through which it has the fiscal sponsorship of the San Francisco Parks Alliance. Berger later was joined by several other long-time Glen Park residents to form a core team that has taken on the task of raising the funds and guiding this project to its completion. The project has been welcomed by the homeowners next to the wall, residents along Burnside Avenue, St. John School (located at Burnside and Chenery streets) and the Glen Park Neighborhood History Project.

The community already has shown strong support with nearly \$23,000 raised (including pledges) – more than half of the projected budget. Pending successful fundraising, the mural should be completed by summer 2022.

This is a model collaboration between neighborhood residents and Public Works to beautify our public right of way.

Maintenance Plan



Mural Maintenance Plan

The homeowner of 50 Burnside Avenue, which is situated next to the wall where the mural is planned, will assume responsibility for its maintenance. The homeowner, Anne Wintroub, is a member of the Burnside Mural+ leadership team.

Maintenance will include removing graffiti, cutting back ivy and debris removal in the area.

The Department of Public Works has reviewed the wall's structure and completed minor patching. The artists will use elastomeric paint for priming the wall and at its completion will use an anti-graffiti protective coating. If graffiti appears, given the preparation and coating, cleaning should be minor. We've set aside \$500 in the budget for ongoing needs.

Mural Design

Glen Park has a beautiful, rich and diverse history that is shaped by its geography, Islais Creek that runs through it, and the people that call it home. We want the mural to celebrate the history and people of Glen Park while also honoring the land that we live on and the canyon that make this neighborhood so special and unique.

Our mural begins at the top of the retaining wall stairs. Islais Creek is represented as water flowing down the stairs. We love the idea that water retains memories and that the history of Glen Park continues to flow through the creek, adapting but staying true to its essence. In the water are vignettes of Glen Park history starting with Minnie Straub Baxter and the Gum Tree girls (Zoanne Theriault, Joan Seiwald and Geri Arkush), who helped preserve and save Glen Park and its canyon from being destroy by a freeway.

There are also current Glen Park favorites like Bird and Beckett, the Glenda the Cow, street signs, Canyon Market, and the historic Glen Park BART station. As the water flows downward, we depict parts of Glen Park past, old trolley cars, Crocker real estate advertisement, aeronauts, Alfred Noble, a Moorish castle, the first suffrage march led by Johanna Pinther and an old train. At the beginning of the wall are Yelamu homes honoring the original inhabitants of this land that we live on. The homes symbolize that this was their home too. The water then flows into the main wall then into Glen Canyon and eucalyptus trees.

The largest main wall opens into a peaceful scene of the canyon from past to present (black and white landscape to color), as we imagine it in its true natural beauty. Glen Canyon is so unique and special to San Franciscans, a hidden treasure of nature and wildlife right in the city. It still is home to wildlife like coyotes, red tailed hawks, great horned owls and many more species. We wanted to also depict the animals that roamed the canyon before the land was developed, like grizzly bears, mountain lions, deer, elk and pronghorn antelope.

Wildflowers and medicinal plants that the Ohlone used grow throughout the mural. A wild holly leaf cherry branch on the bottom right corner provided a food staple for the Ohlone/ Yelamu when the trees used to grow along the creek. Also, Islais is a word from the Ohlone language and means tree (Is-lay). We also depict monarch butterflies, yellow swallowtail, mission blue butterflies and damselflies. Colorful garter snakes and voles make their homes in the rich ground. A great horned owl and her babies nest in the eucalyptus trees while a western scrub jay flies by and a Bewick's wren looks beyond.

We placed Anna's and Allen's hummingbirds larger in the foreground of the mural because they represent healing and wisdom, but they also remind us that the impossible is possible and we can transform our lives with courage, determination and joy. They represent the spirit and fire that the Glen Park community has shown throughout history from the bold women fighting for women's rights to the Gum Tree Girls fighting to preserve the neighborhood they love so much.
