

Canopy Mural Project

Iowa St, Dogpatch, San Francisco December 6. 2021

The Dogpatch & NW Potrero Hill Green Benefit District (GBD) is requesting the help of the San Francisco Arts Commission (SFAC) to apply for a Clean California grant for the purpose of creating murals on the HWY 280 freeway pylons along lowa Street at 22nd and 23rd Streets. (Only government entities may apply for the grant.) Grant applications are due February 1, 2023.

The proposed design is an initial concept for the purpose of applying for the grant. If the grant application is successful, the design will be subject to additional community and SFAC review and input.

If the application is successful, the GBD will supervise installation, manage finances, be responsible for maintenance and be the point of contact for communication with and permissions from Caltrans, Public Works and SFMTA.

The columns are located in the public right of way, under jurisdiction of the Department of Public Works. Relevant staff are aware and supportive of the project.

The columns are freeway infrastructure owned by the CA Department of Transportation. The GBD has been in communication with David Eng of Caltrans. We hope that SFAC support for the project will increase the likelihood of Caltrans approval.

Originally from a small town of the south of France, Antoine learned graphic design, visual art and advertising in Toulouse, France and Brussels, Belgium before moving to the USA and becoming a mural artist. Over the years, he developed a large range of techniques that gives him the abilities to create distinct mural styles. Antoine's latest body of work is rooted in abstract and conceptual paintings on large scale walls. His latest community murals are now part of the San Francisco landscape.

To Whom It May Concern:

The Potrero Boosters Neighborhood Association has long supported the efforts of those who seek to beautify our public realm, particularly when that beautification remediates the blight of the Caltrans infrastructure that separates our community. In this tradition, we support the efforts of the Dogpatch and Northwest Potrero Hill Green Benefit District ("GBD") to develop artwork on the freeway columns supporting 280 along Iowa Street at the border of the Potrero Hill and Dogpatch neighborhoods.

We are excited that the State has made grant funding available through the Clean California program for rapidly deployable projects that clean and enhance public space. The GBD's freeway column art project is perfectly within the guidelines of the Clean California grant criteria, and will serve to beautify what has traditionally been a dark and featureless concrete moat between neighborhoods.

Dogpatch Neighborhood Association strongly supports the proposed mural project on the Iowa Street I-280 Pylons.

This stretch commands the entire west side of our community and has the potential to transform what is now a blighted three block long dumping ground into a grand artwork visible from all points in the neighborhood.

This north-south passage is a regular route for everyone coming and going from our neighborhood as well as for commuters catching the Caltrain at the 22nd street station. Our community and the City currently abate graffiti on a constant basis on the pylons which line this stretch.

In its current state, the site is an unwelcome concrete jungle. 










Canopy Project Site Map



The site of the proposed Canopy project is adjacent to the 22nd St Caltrain station and Dogpatch's commercial corridor. The bounding cross streets lead to Pier 70 (22nd St) and the Power Station (23rd St).

Almost 2,000 units of housing have been built within 6 blocks of the project site in the last 5 years.

As the central waterfront is developed, travel through Dogpatch will increase.

Dogpatch was the original site of Burning Man Decompression. Today the neighborhood is home to the Minnesota Street Project, the new Institute of Contemporary Art and hundreds of maker businesses.

Iowa Street Site Conditions





At the ground plane, 280 is a forest of massive columns.





Ground plane conditions divide neighborhoods as much as the freeways themselves.





Even from blocks away, the mass of columns dominates the view.





The area has not yet evolved from its industrial past (SFMTA photos 1974)





The area is a magnet for camping, dumping. Graffiti.





Untreated stormwater runs onto neighborhood streets.

GBD Iowa Rehabilitation Projects

Neighbors have consistently designated improvements to the area around 280 as a top priority. The GBD has undertaken a series of projects in a step-by-step effort to mitigate blight and create amenities.

Code §§987 and 989) ("CAPA"), or any other local, state, foreign or international law, as currently drafted or as may be hereafter amended, that conveys the same or similar rights ("Moral Rights Laws"), with respect to the Work, its display, removal from display, exhibition, installation, conservation, storage, study, alteration and any other activities conducted by the City, its officers, employees, agents, contractors, licensees, successors or assigns. If the Work is incorporated into a building such that the Work cannot be removed from the building without physical defacement, mutilation, alternation, distortion, destruction, or other modification (collectively, "Modification") of the Work, artist waives any and all such claims under any Moral Rights Laws arising out of or against any current or future owners of the site, and its agents, officers and employees, for Modification of the Work.

The City has the absolute right to change, modify, destroy, remove, relocate, move, replace, transport, repair or restore the Work, in whole or in part, in City's sole discretion.

The City has no obligation to pursue claims against third parties for modifications or damage to the Work done without the City's authorization. However, the City may pursue claims against third parties for modifications or damage or to restore the Work if the work has been modified without the City's authorization. In the event that the Cit5 pursues such a claim, it shall notify the Artist, and Artist shall cooperate with the City's efforts to prosecute such claims.

If the City modifies the Artwork without the Artist's consent in a manner that is prejudicial to Artist's reputation, Artist retains the right to disclaim authorship of the Artwork in accordance with 17 U.S.C. § 106A (a) (2).

Artist bears the sole responsibility for providing the City with any changes to the Artist's Address for Notice. Notice of changes must be mailed to the Arts Commission, 401 Van Ness Avenue, Suite 325, San Francisco, CA 94102 AND to the City Agency with jurisdiction over the property.
