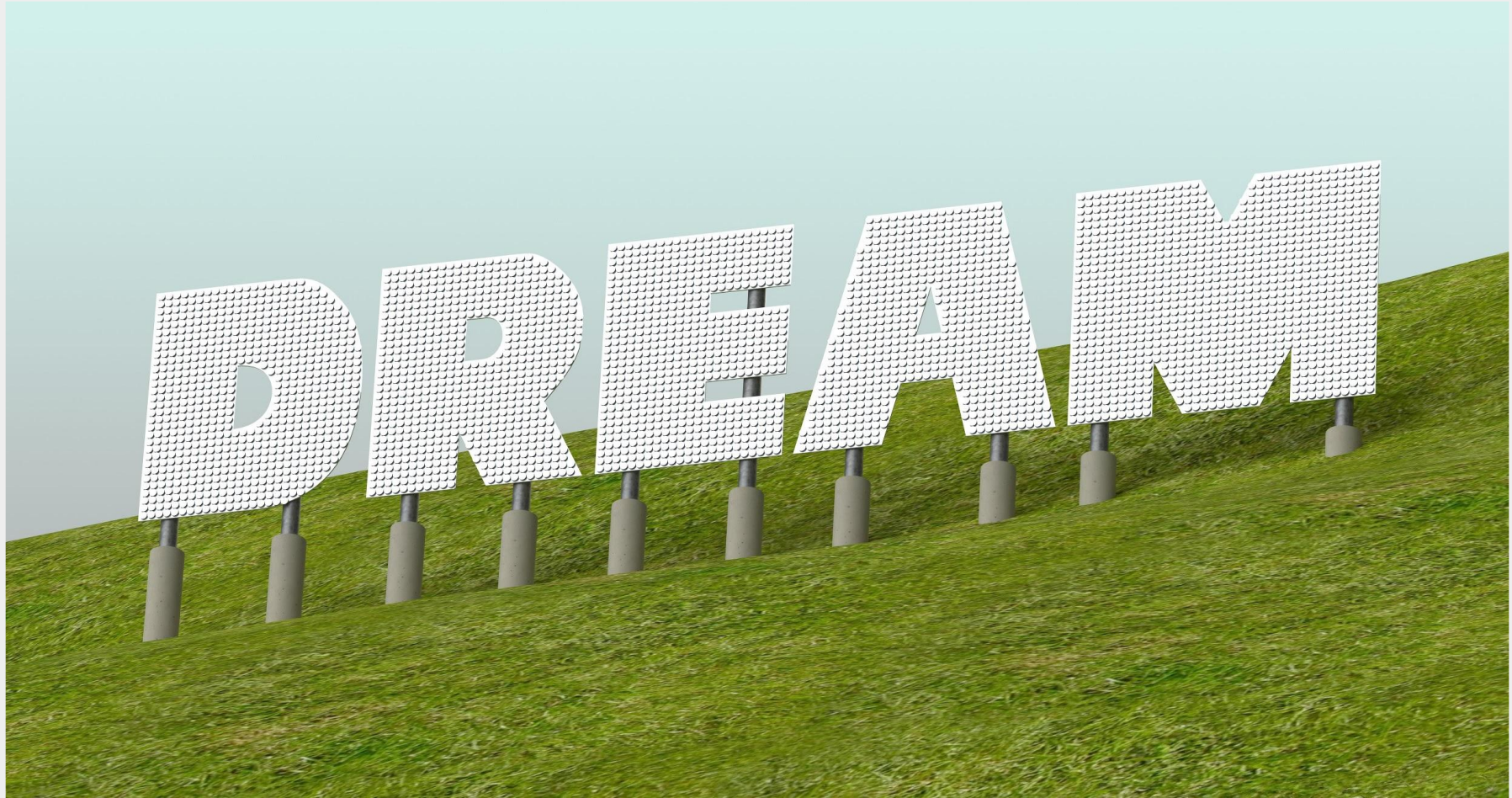

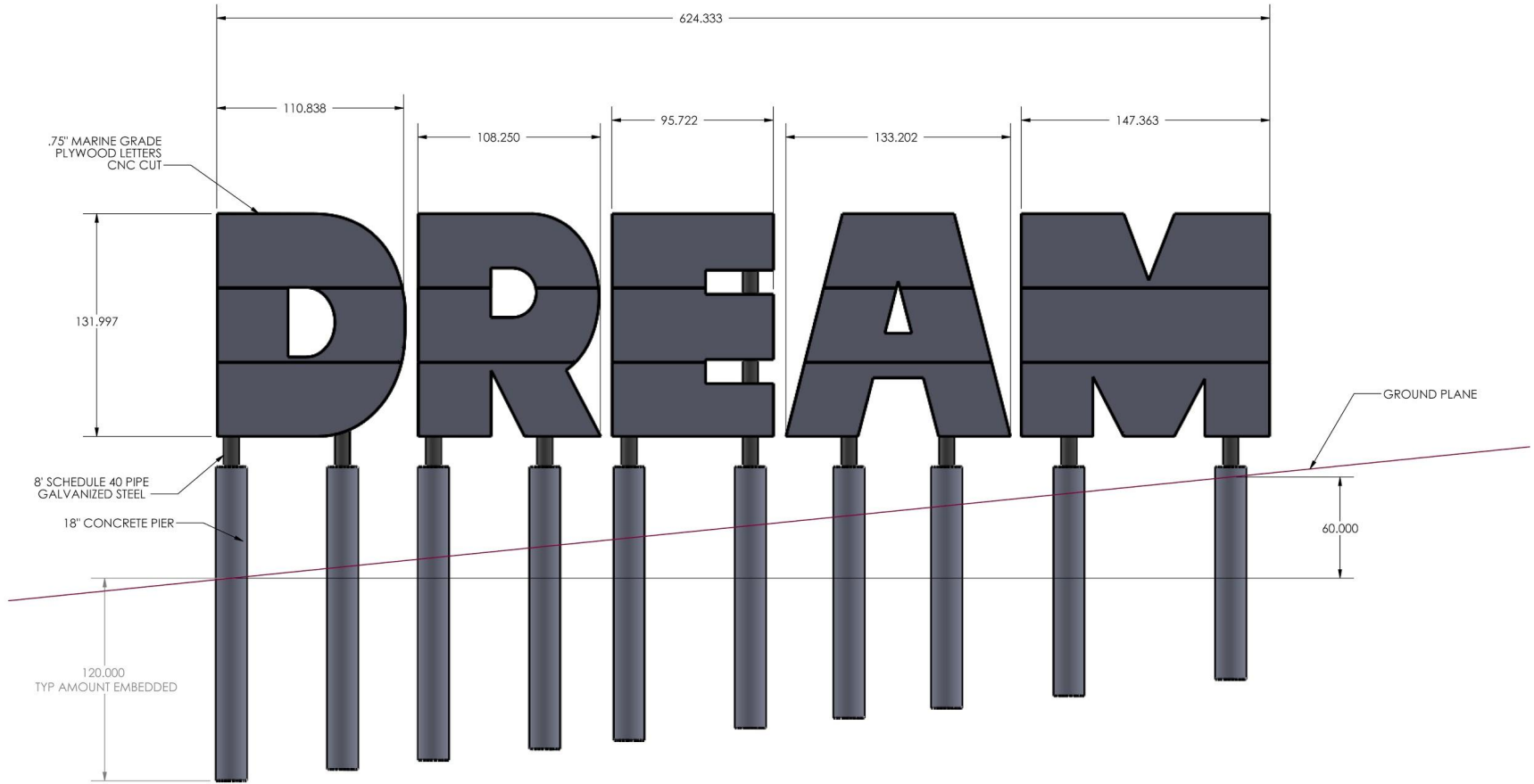




About DREAM

DREAM is a public art and community partnership project led by Yerba Buena Center for the Arts and in collaboration with visual artist Ana Teresa Fernandez, and Martin Luther King Middle School in San Francisco's Excelsior District. The sculpture will be located near the intersection of the unimproved streets of Jarboe and Peralta Streets; the neighborhood partnership is rooted in our commitment to arts and education programs at Martin Luther King Middle School.

The sculpture is made up of 10' high block letters—spelling out the word DREAM—attached to a support system. This façade of this sculpture will consist of metallic disks eliciting a visual sensation of shimmering water. YBCA is an active community partner with Martin Luther King Middle School located less than a mile from the DREAM site, where teaching artists work with students to develop creative and critical responses to their lives. Via multi-week workshops, SFUSD youth have opportunities to build creative, collaborative, and critical thinking skills as leaders and artists. In partnership with SFUSD, YBCA Teaching Artists in Residence are working with students on human centered design projects, art, poetry and music as ways to critically and creatively tell their stories and actively contribute to their own neighborhoods.
