SAI-LING CHAN-SEW, LCSW

Biography

Since 1995, Sai-Ling Chan-Sew, LCSW, has served as the Director of Child, Youth and Family (CYF) System of Care, Community Behavioral Health Services, San Francisco Department of Public Health. She was promoted to Director after serving as Deputy Director of CYF for two years. In her role as CYF Director, Ms. Chan-Sew is responsible for managing the City and County of San Francisco's behavioral health system which treats over 6,500 children, youth and their families in mental health and substance abuse programs annually and reaches an additional 10,000 families through behavioral health early intervention and prevention programs.

Under her leadership, the CYF budget has more than doubled, growing from \$17 million to \$43 million in Fiscal Year 2006-07. She also is responsible for having recruited and retained a multi-cultural staff of over 150 civil service employees, 120 contractors, and a behavioral health provider network of 380 individuals. In 2003, Ms. Chan-Sew oversaw the CYF integration of children's mental health and substance abuse prevention and treatment services under one behavioral health system. Currently, she is working to integrate behavioral health services within the health care setting.

Ms. Chan-Sew's early vision of a culturally competent, family-driven, youth-guided collaborative service delivery system among major child serving systems led to the creation of the nationally-recognized San Francisco Children's System of Care (CSOC). Since its inception, she has overseen CSOC's expansion of behavioral health services to over a thousand of San Francisco's children and youth through a combination of intensive care management and evidence-based practices, including Multisystemic Therapy, Aggression Replacement Training, and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder Treatment. In addition to expanding treatment services, Ms. Chan-Sew has been active at the national and state levels in promoting the development of prevention and early intervention services especially for young children. In response to a recent escalation in community violence in San Francisco; she was selected to chair a committee that developed a model crisis response protocol between the Public Health and the Police Departments that has increases access to behavioral health services for familes affected by violence. More recently, Ms. Chan-Sew led local efforts to increase outreach and expand

behavioral health service access for Asian and Pacific Islander children, youth and families, as well as homeless and runaway youth. In 2002, she secured an \$8 million Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration System of Care grant to behavioral health services in San Francisco. One of the more innovative initiatives developed under this grant includes the integration of promising family and youth engagement practices within public agencies and behavioral health programs.

Additional CYF accomplishments under Ms. Chan-Sew's leadership include the expansion of school-based behavioral health services through the Wellness and Safe Passages Initiatives; the creation of the Shared Youth Database linking behavioral health, child welfare, juvenile justice and substance abuse systems; and the establishment of one of five Community Treatment Facilities in the State of California to meet the needs of youth with serious emotional challenges in secured residential treatment services. An early advocate of consumer-driven services, she established the CSOC Family Involvement and Youth Development Teams which promote family-driven, youth-guided practices and policies across child serving systems and within the community. In 2007, she created the Evidence-Based Treatment Academy at CYF to expand the introduction of evidence-based practices within the behavioral health system.

Prior to joining the Child, Youth and Family System of Care at Community Behavioral Health Services, Ms. Chan-Sew served as Program Director of the Chinatown Child Development Center where she implemented a community based outpatient and early intervention program for recent Asian immigrants to the United States, expanded the number of families seeking clinical services to more than 300 annually, and created an effective family involvement program targeting recently immigrated parents and grandparents. Ms. Chan-Sew also has served as a psychiatric social worker in private practice and as a guest lecturer for the Department of Social Work at San Francisco State University and as an instructor for the University of California, San Francisco Extension Program.

Fluent in Cantonese and Mandarin, Ms. Chan-Sew holds a Master's Degree from the University of Chicago's School of Social Service Administration and is a licensed clinical social worker. She is the recipient of numerous awards and recognitions and finds time to serve on many national, state and local boards and commissions. A sought after speaker, Ms. Chan-Sew frequently makes presentations at behavioral health conferences across the nation.
