# Options for Secure Youth Treatment Facility Site(s)

## ***Potential vote options for the subcommittee:***

1. Vote to use Juvenile Hall as SF's interim SYTF and to revise plan once City leadership makes decisions re: SF's place of detention.
2. Vote to use Juvenile Hall as SF's interim SYTF; and to recommend to City leadership that SYTF are housed in SF's place of detention going forward.
3. Vote to use Juvenile Hall as SF's interim SYTF; and to develop a new separate SYTF (either new construction or renovation).
4. ~~Vote to send all secure commits to Out Of County SYTFs (once contracts are executed).~~

## ***In addition, the group needs to consider whether to offer Out Of County SYTFs as a choice to SF youth:***

- ~~• SF could be the only option;~~
- SF could be the default/primary option with Out Of County SYTFs as possible alternatives;
- SF could be one of a menu of options.

## ***Finally, the group needs to consider whether to offer SF's SYTF to other jurisdictions.***

# Requirements of DJJ Realignment Plan (WIC 1995)

The Plan must include:

1. List of subcommittee membership
2. A description of the realignment target population
3. A description of the facilities, programs, placements, services and service providers, supervision, and other responses
4. **A description of how grant funds will be applied to address each of the following areas:**
  - a) Mental health, sex offender treatment, or related behavioral or trauma-based needs
  - b) Support programs or services that promote the healthy adolescent development
  - c) Family engagement in programs
  - d) Reentry, including planning and linkages to support employment, housing, and continuing education
  - e) Evidence-based, promising, trauma-informed, and culturally responsive
  - f) Whether and how the plan will include services or programs for realigned youth that are provided by nongovernmental or community-based providers
5. A detailed facility plan indicating which facilities will be used to house or confine realigned youth at varying levels of offense severity and treatment need, **and improvements to accommodate long-term commitments.**
6. A description of how the plan will incentivize or facilitate the retention of realigned youth within the juvenile justice system in lieu of transfers to the adult criminal justice system
7. A description of any regional agreements or arrangements
8. A description of how data will be collected on the youth served and outcomes for youth served by the block grant program

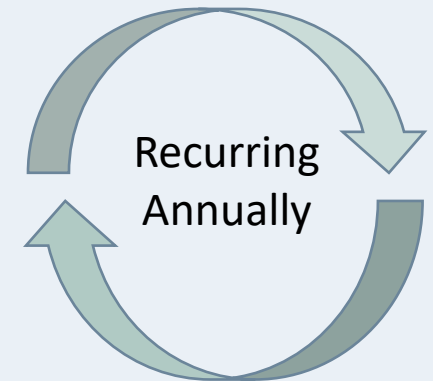

# Determining Possible Investments

Process to prepare for today's meeting:

1. Compiled all identified possible solutions for each topic area
2. Color coded each solution
  - **Yellow** for communication, coordination, process-based solutions
  - **Green** for solutions that require funding

- Define family members as who the young person identifies as family members, not defined by the system
- Use unrestricted, flexible funds to directly support young people and families of young people on probation, in OOHP, or in a SYTF
- Incorporate more credible messengers for young people and for families as both young people and adults need healing – create mentorship opportunities for families so that they have the support to support their loved one
- Families should be involved in creation of young person's case plans



# Determining Possible Investments

3. Pulled out all the **funding-based solutions**
4. Given that we are submitting a plan for Year One, for some solutions:
  - a) the cost is too high to meet with Year One funding
  - b) the timeline is too long to achieve in Year One

- Incentivize and create independent, relational, supportive housing provided by providers who are building specifically for this population and create portal for housing throughout the Bay Area specifically for this population
- Create and fund justice-involved TAY-specific housing options
- Create and incorporate alternative, indigenous, mindfulness practices, programs, and services for young people and their families
- Create and distribute incentives for families to encourage their participation in therapy, activities, bonding experiences, etc.

# Determining Possible Investments

5. Grouped those solutions that were similar together
  - For example: credible messengers were mentioned 12 separate times; direct funding was mentioned 10 times; and whole family support was mentioned in a multitude of ways over 50 times
6. Created a table with the solutions that were mentioned repeatedly and which could also be funded and implemented in Year One
7. We will review this table together – any solutions that are missing, let's add them!

# Request For Proposals (RFP) Process

- Most of the JJRBG funding will be allocated through competitive solicitations
- In order to be eligible for that funding, organizations will have to apply through a competitive application process, called a “Request for Proposals”:
  - The subcommittee informs the RFP that outlines the kind of programming needed, desired outcomes, desired qualifications of the provider, etc.
  - Organizations apply for these funds to deliver the programs as described in the RFP
  - A diverse panel reviews and scores the applications
- Subcommittee members from organizations that intend to apply for funds will play a more limited role in the above process
