The Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco met via videoconference at 5:39 p.m.

PRESENT: Commissioners Cohen, Elias, DeJesus, Hamasaki, Brookter

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Ben Tong, Wealth & Disparities, thanked President Cohen for acknowledging their work. He went on to talk of DPA's recommendations about collecting statements from officers when there's an OIS and how the DPA plays an advisory role when there's an OIS and how the Chief said no to the recommendations and hopes that SFPD will enact best practice recommendations by DPA.

Kit Hodge, Wealth & Disparities, spoke of shootings in the Bayview and concerns of how city officials have not made this a priority and concerns of over policing in the Bayview would like a written plan from SFPD for reduction of racial disparities and would like funds be invested in Black communities.

Cheryl Thornton, SF Health Department, spoke of vaccination resolution passed by the Commission spoke of how officers were turned away from the Southeast Community Center for vaccination because they did not live in the district. She asked for a follow-up because officers keep the city safe and needs to be vaccinated.

David Aaronson, Wealth & Disparities, thanked Commissioner Cohen for mentioning their work and spoke of shootings in the Bayview and lack of partnership between city officials, the Department, and the community. He spoke of lack of community policing and talked about SFPD placing a mobile outpost on 3rd Street & Quesada as if SFPD is an outside military force occupying the community instead of a taxpayer funded local force to protect and serve the community.

Paul called to ask SFPD not to respond with militarized force to community gatherings and defund the SFPD.

Adam called in support of Commissioner Hamasaki for speaking up in regard to gun violence from attacks of SF Supervisors.

Chief's Request

Chief Scott gave brief update on vaccinations for officers and stated that it is happening and officers are signing up and are getting vaccinated.

Chief Scott reported on crime trends: Homicide, up 75 percent; down across the board on part 1 violence crimes; property crimes: burglaries up 56 percent; motor vehicle theft up 18 percent; arson is up; larceny theft down 51 percent; gun violence strategy: increased deployment in the Bayview with command post vehicle for people to see and serves as a mobile substation for officers to check in, write reports, and gives the Department the ability to be seen. The Chief stated that it makes a difference in the number of shootings. The Chief also spoke of a community meeting with both Captains Dangerfield and Maron in attendance and the community asked to see more cops out in their community engaging and enforcing where enforcing is appropriate. The Chief also talked about Community Liaison Officer to engage in community safety walks to kick off in the Tenderloin and it about community engagement officers walking with cadets and volunteers to engage with the community. The Chief talked about a shooting in the Southern District, at 6th and Harrison, where an individual was shot after an attempted robbery. Plainclothes unit were placed in that area where evidence were recovered, and one person detained. The Chief also talked about domestic terrorism and stated that there was a joint intelligence bulletin that came out from the FBI and the DHS in regard to the possibility of more violence in the Capitol.

Director Henderson gave an update on year-to-date stats: 131 cases opened cases and closed 118 cases year to date; 351 pending cases; 9 cases sustained; 30 cases past 270 days; 2 cases mediated; 41 cases pending with the Chief; 14 cases pending with the Commission. Outreach: Can be found on the community calendar on the DPA's website and posted on Tweeter, Facebook, Instagram and on DHR's website. February 18th, presentation with Mayor's Office staff for Transgender Initiative about DPA's mission and services; February 18th, hosted a panel with youth groups and school organizations about DPA process and internship program; also, engagement with Mega Black meetings with outside agencies; February 19th, hosted a Black History Month panel with SF Human Resources diversity recruitment leaders addressing Black History; February 23rd, collaborated with Racial Equity Law Enforcement collaboration team for a presentation of Black History Month and a Black History Month celebration in the office where Commissioner DJ Brookter was honored along with Supervisor Shaman Walton and Commander Steve Ford; February 26th, attended the USF Resource Fair with the Mayor's Office and SF Housing Authority. Director Henderson talked about his meeting with Felicia Jones and Wealth and Disparities to address concerns that they've raised and to talk about proactive partnership with their agency to highlight their own initiatives and ideas that they will be presenting to the Commission.

Commissioner DeJesus spoke of the community plan to compassionate alternative response to homelessness request to do a presentation before the Commission. Contact person to follow.

Ms. Paulette Brown spoke in regard to her son Aubrey Abrakasa and how she is still seeking justice for him and how she has not heard about unsolved homicides and how families are still grieving.

He stated that the details of the new system are important and that it is important for the Chief to report to the Commission on what type of system the Department intends to choose to keep the public informed and give the Commission a chance to provide some measure of oversight.

REMOTE MEETING VIA VIDEOCONFERENCE

The Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco met via videoconference at 5:39 p.m.

PRESENT: Commissioners Cohen, Elias, DeJesus, Hamasaki, Brookter, Yee

Commissioner Cohen welcomed newly appointed Commissioner Larry Yee.

Commissioner Cohen recognized International Women's Month and acknowledged women in service and in the Department. Thank you for your service.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

Ben Paul, Wealth & Disparities in the Black Community, invited everyone to a community meeting on Friday at 1 p.m. at Mendell Plaza in regard to violence in the community and discussed concerns about SFPD's lack of community policing and of SFPD placing a mobile outpost in the Bayview.

Jean Bridges, Wealth & Disparities, spoke in regards California Partnership's presentation addressing gun violence which disproportionately affects Black San Franciscans. She also spoke of gaps in services as contributing factors to the violence experienced by District 10 residents and hopes for discussions about moving funds from the Police Department and the Sheriff's Department and other agencies toward quality of life services toward the Black community.

Susan Buckman, Wealth & Disparities, invited the commissioners to attend the Friday community meeting to address recent Bayview shootings. She also spoke of over policing in arrests, traffic stops and use of force incidents.

Kit Hodge, Wealth & Disparities, spoke regarding the Bayview community and how there is disproportionate over policing in the Bayview and invited the Commissioners to Friday's meeting in Mendell Plaza.

Brenda spoke of how her friend's son was murdered by the police and what is the Department going to do with the way her friend was treated by the Department.

Maesha called in regard to having two African-American sons and spoke of harassment from undercover gang task force officers by searching and taunting and what is being done as she is very concerned for her sons' safety.

Ben Saunders, Wealth & Disparities, talked about how the Bayview is in crisis and is getting worse and what intervention is provided to the community.

Karen, Public Defender's Office, looking forward to seeing the reports tonight and hoped to learn what the next steps are.

Ms. Paulette Brown called in regard to her son, Aubry Abrakasa, whose murder is still outstanding and spoke of the stereotyping of her son as being a gang member. She went on to name the people responsible for her son's murder.

David Aronson, Wealth & Disparities, hopes that everyone will join the community meeting on Friday at Mendell Plaza. He went on to talk about recent shootings in the Bayview and hopes that funds from the Department, Sheriff's Department, and other departments be moved for the Black communities.

Unidentified spoke to inquire of DPA and to schedule another mediation, if needed, as well as the protocol that follows when a mediated agreement is not met or complied with.

Cheryl Thornton spoke of funding from the Police Department and other city departments to re-invest in Black communities.

Commissioner Cohen acknowledged Supervisor President Shaman Walton who is also the District Supervisor for District 10.

Chief's Request

Chief Scott reported on crime trends: Part 1 Violent Crimes: Homicides are up 75 percent; robbery, down 32 percent. Property Crimes: burglary, up 57 percent; auto burglary, up 18 percent. The Chief spoke of community policing and getting the public involved in community policing, increasing awareness and increasing resiliency. The Chief also spoke of a fatal traffic collision at Mission and Geneva on March 2nd, a vehicle versus a pedestrian where an elderly sustained head trauma and succumbed to her injuries. Armed robberies: Decreased in armed robberies and the Chief spoke of increasing visibility and deployment at Twin Peaks. He spoke of local news crew who

was robbed of camera equipment in the Twin Peaks area on March 3rd. The camera equipment was recovered, and investigation is ongoing. Major event: The Chief stated that the Department will be involved in the meeting at Mendel Plaza and is working with Supervisor Walton's on his safety plan. The Chief talked about the Community Liaison Officers and what they do. They reach out to families, offer support, and year-to-date, have been involved and reached out to family of 37 families. The Chief also talked about outreach to the Asian Pacific Islander communities like the safety walk. The Chief reported on Stunt Driving and three incidents that occurred over the weekend. The Stunt Driving Unit responded and were able to diffuse the incident very quickly. The Chief also reported on vaccinations of officers and stated that over 150 members have been vaccinated.

Commissioner Cohen asked if the Chief could survey the officers if they have received their vaccinations.

Commissioner Yee asked the Chief to contact him in regard to outreach to the Asian Pacific Islander communities.

Commissioner Hamasaki asked if there is a report that the public can see on Community Policing. The Chief explained that the Department does have a Community Policing Strategic Plan and it can be found on the Department's website.

Commissioner Brookter asked about uptick of gun violence and what is the strategy to get guns off the streets. The Chief stated that gun buybacks is one way to get a large number of guns off the street and enforcement is also a part of it along with community policing.

Arturo Carrillo, Program Director, along with Robert Newt, Bayview Supervisor, and Guy Hudson, Crisis Response Manager, presented the SF Street Violence Intervention Program Report.

Chief Scott thanked SVIP for the work that they do and stated that SFPD appreciates the work that they do and hopes that the City of San Francisco appreciates the work that they do because they save lives.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Ben Saunders, Wealth & Disparities in the Black Community, expressed appreciation for SVIP for the work they are doing in the community. He went on to expressed concerns regarding the California Partnership report and focusing on just putting everything on a number of individuals attracting violence and not on personal individual situations.

Francisco Dacosta asked the Commission to look into two cases and spoke how there are no groups in the Bayview but there are sects and spoke of how he has not seen officers in the trenches and spoke of how there are homeowners who do not want to live in the Bayview and spoke of community violence.

REMOTE MEETING VIA VIDEOCONFERENCE

The Police Commission of the City and County of San Francisco met via videoconference at 5:39 p.m.

PRESENT: Commissioners Cohen, Elias, DeJesus, Hamasaki, Brookter, Yee

Commissioner Cohen acknowledged the eight victims in Atlanta and publicly affirmed that the members of the Police Commission stand firmly with all members of the community but this particular evening, the Police Commission stand with Asian, API community members that are feeling victimized and are feeling alone.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT

David Aaronson, Wealth & Disparities, spoke on the California Partnership presentation and spoke of contradictions in the presentation's talking points and spoke systemic issues within and around the Black San Franciscans community in San Francisco and how it is not improving. He spoke placing people in gang lists based on where they live.

Kit Hodge, Wealth & Disparities, spoke of areas in need of reform including racially biased policing and lack of community policing. She spoke of SFPD's mobile outpost in the Bayview as if SFPD is an outside military force occupying the community.

Susan Buxton, Wealth & Disparities, spoke of request by supervisors regarding per capita racial disparities and stated that the results are alarming. She stated that SFPD's own data showed since 2018 Black residence are over six times more likely to be stopped than White residence; since 2016, Black residence are 10 times more likely to be arrested than White residence and stated that these are appalling statistics on SFPD's ongoing racial disparities in its policing and that Black San Franciscans are underserved and over policed.

Brian Cox spoke of Officer Nicholas Buckley's testimony in 2016 federal gun case and spoke perjury and that SFPD has no records of dishonesty against Officer Buckley and that if there is a gap in the system, it should be fixed.

Paul asked the Commissioners to allow music in the city and that he is frustrated by the reality that we dispatch armed and militarized thugs to disperse communities of color and asked for reduction of police response and defund the police.

Ms. Paulette Brown spoke of her son Aubrey Abrakasa who was murdered and up to this date his case is still outstanding. She went on to name the perpetrators who shot her son. She went on to talk about her son being called a gang member and talked about stereotyping of people of color as gang members.

Yulanda Williams, OFJ President, spoke of what District 10 needs now and talked about the need for foot beats on the 3rd Street corridor to get to know the young people in order to make a change and that everyone should work hand-in-hand together and to stop placing blame on one another.

Cheryl Thornton echoed what Yulanda Williams said and that there should be officers that know the community and stated officers serving at District 10 are not connected to the community.

Chief's Request

Chief Scott reported on crime trends: Part 1 Violent Crimes: Homicide, up 17 percent; rape, down 56 percent; robbery, down 30 percent; assault, down 15 percent. Part 1 Property Crimes: Burglary, up 54 percent; motor vehicle theft, up 16 percent; arson, up 47 percent; larceny theft, down 48 percent. The Chief spoke of strong-armed robberies in high traffic corridors. The Chief spoke of clearing 100 percent of the homicides. He spoke of gun violence being up significantly with 55 gun violence victims. Significant events: On March 9th, officers responded to the 600 block of Eddy regarding an unresponsive 14-year-old. The 14-year-old was pronounced deceased at the scene by paramedics due to an overdose of an unknown type of narcotic. The medical examiner deemed this to be a suspicious death. Homicide investigation is ongoing. The Chief reported that there were no fatal accidents or traffic collisions this past week. There was a hate crime incident at Plymouth Avenue and Ocean on March 13th at 3:54 p.m. The victim was sitting in a bus stop and was called racial epithets by the suspect who also stated, "Get out of my country. Go back to where you came from." The suspect then battered the victim. An arrest was made and charges are pending. There was a demonstration on the year anniversary of Briana Taylor. There was an individual who pointed a laser-type devices at officers and that individual was arrested. The Chief stated that there were two use of force with no major injuries during the demonstration. Strategies: The Chief talked about the Bayview. One of the strategy that is ongoing in the Bayview is the foot beat strategy. There are foot beat patrols on Third Street between Palou and Quesada, on Third Street between McKinnon and Oakdale, and on Third Street between McKinnon and Revere. These foot beats are in place until further notice. The officers are in place and are given instructions to engage with the community. The Chief stated that this is not about enforcement. This is about community engagement and letting the community know the officers are out there and are willing to work with the community. Robbery strategy is to increase visibility in those corridors and increased visibility in Chinatown and AAPI community. The Chief stated that we stand with them and will do everything to prevent these crimes from happening. The Chief also talked about community walks in the Bayview and Ingleside and handed out informational and crime prevention flyers. The Chief thanked Commissioner Yee for participating in the Ingleside walk. Covid update: 442 officers responded to survey and out of those 336 have received their first vaccine, 23 said there were issues in receiving the vaccine.

Director Henderson gave an update on year-to-date stats: 165 cases opened cases and closed 145 cases year to date; 334 pending cases; 11 cases sustained; 37 cases past 270 days; 5 cases mediated; 33 cases pending with the Chief; 13 cases pending with the Commission. Outreach: Can be found on community calendar on the DPA's website and posted on Tweeter, Facebook, Instagram and on DHR's website. March 10th worked and finished with trifold youth know your rights cards; March 11th, participated with Mega Black presentation along with Commissioner Brookter; March 15th, DPA hosted a virtual language access panel and participated with Wealth & Disparities community meeting.

Commissioner Brookter thanked Director Henderson for providing his stats to the Commissioners. He went on to thank the Commission staff for ensuring the documentations are provided to the Commission.

Commissioner Cohen thanked the Chief for providing the vaccination stats and thanked Director Henderson and his staff for the work that they do.

Commissioner Hamasaki thanked Commissioner Cohen for her opening remarks and support for the Asian American Community as well as Chief Scott for his comments. He spoke of increased in violence against the community and thanked Commissioner Yee for being out front and present for the community. He stated that he will coordinate with Commissioners Cohen and Yee to find ways for the Commission to be more visible in this issue.

Commissioner Yee thanked Commissioner Cohen for inviting him to the Friday's event with the Wealth and Disparities meeting and thanked the Chief and staff for sending him the invites for the zoom calls for stations' community meetings. He announced that there will be a Public Safety meeting in Chinatown tomorrow along with Commander Fong and Captain Ng and invited Commissioner Hamasaki and everyone else who want to join to talk about strategies and to hear from the community. It will be tomorrow at 11 a.m. at 843 Stockton Street.

Commissioner Cohen talked about attending the rally to denounce crime and is hopeful that Wealth and Disparities will be able to provide support and alliedship for the Asian American community and that we should all be working collectively to denounce hatred, crime, and violence and spoke of 3,800 crimes against the Asian American community this year alone and publicly denounced the hate against Asians, hate against African-American community, hate against the Trans and LGBT community.
