Suggested Police Department Changes (short of complete defunding)

- 1) Complete transparency of all individual officer files, from all police forces, after a short holding period to allow adequate study. A file should include: all uses of force comments and must remain open nearly forever.
- 2) Exhaustive study of all officer files before hiring a new officer, Easy dismissal of any officer with a bad file whenever discovered. Definition of bad: One substantiated act of serious excessive use of force; or Two substantiated acts of minor excessive use of force. Dismissal should require loss of all retirement benefits.
- 3) Separate policing into three divisions, with appropriate training: Peace Officers to enforce against criminal acts and walk beats; Parking and Traffic Officers to enforce these laws and investigate collisions; and Social Officers to respond when requested to deal with family and schools disturbances and serve on Muni etc.
- 4) Require new Peace Officers to first serve as Social Officers for two years. Withhold lethal weapons from all new Peace Officers for five years. Social and Parking and Traffic Officers should not have lethal weapons.
- 5) Require all officers to wear and operate cameras during all calls. Officer's numbers should be displayed in large print and be prefixed by a letter to minimize the number of digits to make them easy to see and remember.
- 6) Maximum retirement benefits should be based on the risk of an officer being a casualty ie. No greater than based on the salary of a sergeant, Captains and higher certainly have less risk than front line officers.



Dear Mayor Breed, District Attorney Boudin, and Police Chief William Scott,

My name is Jade Fogle and I am a resident of San Francisco, California.

As your constituent I cannot accept belonging to a community in which the safety of each resident is not guaranteed.

In light of the recent deaths of George Floyd, Breonna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, Tony McDade, Sean Reade, as well as the history of the murder of citizens across the country, it is clear to me the harm that the police has enacted nationwide and globally outweigh any positive propaganda that you and the government want to promote.

As a member of the electorate, I ask you to take action now. I have seen mention of a redirection of funds. However, that is not enough. The police system was built on white supremacy and is inherently a violent system.

The proposal so far is a broad gesture, similar to Mayor Breed's broad gestures to help the homeless citizens of our city. Your inaction and empty gestures regarding the homeless have not gone unnoticed by me or others, and neither will this empty "assurance of a collaborative process."

It is not enough to consider Campaign Zero's "8 Can't-Wait" initiative as many of their points are listed in police Use of Force and De-Escalation policies that I have read from all over the Bay Area.

At the very minimum, the least you could all do is attempt to be good at your jobs instead of remaining ineffective.

Some suggestions would be to:

- 1) Start with passing legislation to prevent the continuing employment and re-employment of officers removed from duty for misconduct.
- 2) That there is further investigation into officers involved in shootings of persons, primarily if those shootings result in death.
- 3) Instead of protecting those responsible for killing others, releasing their information and bodycam footage, and not just placing them on administrative leave, which is paid and benefited.
- 4) Ending pursuing jail time for offenses unrelated to public safety, such as Curfew Violations, Disorderly Conduct, Public Urination, Bicycles on the Sidewalk, Trespassing, and Failure to Comply with Parking Signs, etc.

I'm sure it must be a challenging time for all of you to be continually hearing how poorly you are doing at your jobs, especially now. I wonder if any of you have considered being good at your jobs and how "serving and protecting the community" actually means just that and not acting in self-interest or for re-electability.

Mayor Breed, I did not vote for when you were on the ballot, and you have disappointed me in the way I knew you would. At least you're an easy person to read.

However, I refuse to remain silent during this pivotal moment of change in our nation's history.

I ask you and your colleagues, that if you won't defund the police, you will take responsibility for bridging the gap between law enforcement and the communities they're supposed to protect. Take responsibility for dismantling the white supremacy that imbues all systems of this country. Start with the undertrained trigger happy fraternity you call a police department. One officer involved shooting is one too many.

The other night I saw a man stopped for what I believe to be a traffic violation by three police cars. All six officers stepped out of their vehicles and surrounded the man in the car. I watched for twenty minutes as different officers took turns, asking him questions before letting him go.

I felt more unsafe with their policing. What is the purpose of its exaggerated presence? How was that moment keeping my community safe? Just another boys club meeting?

You signed up to be public servants. Act like it. Serve the public.




