- The first All-Star Game was initiated at the insistence of Arch Ward, a sports editor for the Chicago Tribune, to coincide with the celebration of Chicago's Century of Progress Exposition.
- From 1959 to 1962, two All-Star Games were held each Summer.
- Candlestick Park in San Francisco hosted one of the two 1961 All-Star Games. With the windy reputation of Candlestick, it was fitting that Giants pitcher Stu Miller was actually blown off the pitching mound.
- In 1971, in his first career All-Star Game at-bat, Reggie Jackson hit a spectacular 520 foot home run which struck a light tower on the right field roof of Tigers Stadium in Detroit.
- In 1977, New York Yankee Manager Billy Martin asked Nolan Ryan to start the game after the original starting pitcher Frank Tanana was sidelined due to injury. Ryan, frustrated that he wasn't selected to start originally, refused the assignment. Martin fumed to the press that he would never select Nolan Ryan in an All-Star Game again.
- In 1982, the first All-Star Game to be held outside of the United States was played in Montreal's Olympic Stadium.
- Fred Lynn hit the first grand slam home run in All-Star Game history in 1983, 50 years after the first game was played.
- Major League Baseball announced that beginning with the 2003 All-Star Game at U.S. Cellular Field in Chicago, the winning league would earn home field advantage in the World Series, adding the slogan "this time it counts" to promote interest and excitement.
- San Francisco Giants legend and Hall of Fame member Willie Mays was selected as an All-Star 24 times.
- Based on recent statistics from other host cities, it is estimated that the overall economic impact of the 2007 All-Star Game at AT&T Park will be between 60 and 65 million dollars.



## Baseball's biggest stars are on their way to San Francisco!

The Major League Baseball All-Star Game is coming to San Francisco for the first time since 1984, and to beautiful AT&T Park for the first time ever.

Once again, the city will host a world-class event in the national spotlight, and the city, the Giants, and the fans are ready. San Francisco also hosted one of two All-Star Games held in 1961, making this the third time this prestigious event has graced the city by the bay.

The All-Star Game will be played on July 10th, featuring the top performers from the American League matched up against the best of the National League. The game has a rich history, with memorable moments dating back to the very first All-Star Game held at Comiskey Park in Chicago in 1933. Since then, the game has become part of the fabric of the sport each Summer, with fans looking forward to casting their votes for the best players in each league.

Although the All-Star Game is the feature attraction, "All-Star Week" encompasses 5 days of events. Over 100,000 fans are expected to attend the DHL All-Star Fanfest at Moscone West from July 6th-10th. All-Star Fanfest is an interactive "baseball theme


park", with baseball-related attractions, games, souvenirs, and exhibits for all ages.

On July 8th, the Taco Bell All-Star Sunday features both the XM All-Star Futures Game and the Taco Bell Legends & Celebrity Softball Game. The Futures Game features the brightest rising stars throughout baseball competing in a U.S. vs. World format.

The Gatorade All-Star Workout Day on Monday the 9th culminates with the Home Run Derby. This competition of baseball's power hitters is always a crowd pleaser, and draws a sellout crowd.

Although tickets are scarce and demand is high, the week will also feature an event which does not require a ticket. On July 10th at 12:00pm, Major League Baseball, the Giants and the City and County of San Francisco will host the "All-Star Game Red Carpet Show Presented by Chevrolet," during which the members of the American and National League All-Star Teams will ride to AT&T Park via a gala celebration along the streets of San Francisco in open-air vehicles. This event is free to all fans.

Whether you're partial to the National League, the American League, or just being introduced to the game, this is a great opportunity to celebrate Major League Baseball in San Francisco!


## The History of **Independence Day**

As relations between Great Britain and its American colonies became increasingly strained, the Americans set up a shadow government in each colony, with a Continental Congress and Committees of Correspondence linking these shadow governments. As soon as fighting broke out in April 1775, these shadow governments took control of each colony and ousted all the royal officials. That marked the beginning of the American Revolutionary War. Sentiment for outright independence grew rapidly in response to British actions; the options were clarified by Thomas Paine's pamphlet Common Sense, released in January 1776.

In June of 1776, a committee of the Second Continental Congress consisting of John Adams of Massachusetts, Benjamin Franklin of Pennsylvania, Thomas Jefferson of Virginia, Robert R. Livingston of New York, and Roger Sherman of Connecticut (the "Committee of Five"), was formed to draft a suitable declaration to frame this resolution. The committee decided that Jefferson would write the draft, which he showed to Franklin and Adams. Franklin himself made at least 48 corrections. Jefferson then produced another copy incorporating these changes, and the committee presented this copy to the Continental Congress on June 28, 1776.

A formal declaration for independence was delayed on July 2, 1776, pursuant to the "Lee Resolution" presented by Richard Henry Lee of Virginia on June 7, 1776, which read (in part): "Resolved: That these united Colonies are, and of right ought to be, free and independent States, that they are absolved from all allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain is, and ought to be, totally dissolved."

Jefferson's draft statement on July 4, approved it, and sent it to a printer.

Although signing of the Declaration by the Continental Congress was not completed until August of 1776, the 4th of July has been accepted as the official anniversary of United States independence and is celebrated in all U.S. states and territories.

Celebration of the holiday began immediately in the Colonies in 1776, although it was not officially declared a legal holiday until 1941.

It was first observed in Philadelphia on July 8, 1776, at which time the Declaration of Independence was read aloud, bells rang, and bands played. Nowadays, the 4th of July is celebrated both publicly and privately with parades, bar-b-ques, baseball games, and fireworks displays.

Locally, you can commemorate the holiday by attending any of the Bay Area's several public events or San Francisco's 4th of July Waterfront Festival and Fireworks at the Pier.



- San Francisco's Fourth of July Waterfront Festival at Ghirardelli Square and The Cannery's Del Monte Courtyard features arts & crafts, live entertainment, food and fun from 2pm-9pm.
- Party at Pier 39 with Double Funk Crunch 1:30–4:30pm, followed by Tainted Love 6-9:30pm.
- Top it off with a Spectacular Fireworks extravaganza, launched from barges off Pier 39 and the Municipal Pier, begins at approximately 9:30pm. Fireworks can be seen from Aquatic Park and mid-bay near Alcatraz, between Pier 39 and Fisherman's Wharf.



### **ART IN CITY HALL**

The San Francisco Arts Commission Gallery and PhotoAlliance present *Our World*, an exhibition of over 100 photographic works by 31 Bay Area artists. This exhibition is the result of an open call for submissions that was juried by a panel of experts. The final selections represent many perspectives of our world today, and range from beautiful sunset to images of war. This dynamic exhibition will begin July 12 and continue through September 21. A reception for the artists that is open to the public will be held on Tuesday, July 31, 5:30 - 7:30 on the Ground Floor.

Also, we are very pleased to announce that a new set of banners will be gracing the walls of the North Light Court this summer. The SFAC Gallery and PhotoAlliance has commissioned photographer and educator Lonnie Graham to continue his *Conversations with the World* series here in San Francisco. Since 1985 Graham has been photographing and interviewing people across the globe. His work has been widely exhibited and published. Lonnie's banner project consists of photographs of San Francisco residents and quotes from interviews with them about their lives here. In addition to the North Light Court banners, Graham's project will extend to a series of Decaux kiosks across the city, and you can find lengthier versions of each interview on our web site (www.sfacgallery.org) later this summer. We are thrilled to be working with Graham to represent the diversity of our local residents on the walls of historic City Hall. The banners are set to hang 6 - 8 months.
