3	Resolution urging the adoption of the Shelter Monitoring Committee's
4	recommendations for amending the Human Services Agency's Imminent Danger policy
5	as it pertains to victims of domestic violence.
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7	WHEREAS, Under the existing Human Services Agency's (HSA) Imminent Danger
8	policy, families are not eligible for shelter placement or to remain in shelter for thirty days if
9	they are in an imminently dangerous situation that might cause harm to themselves, shelter
10	families, or shelter staff; and
11	WHEREAS, Recently, HSA reduced the denial of service period from thirty days to
12	fifteen days, but this is insufficient in assisting victims of domestic violence; and
13	WHEREAS, In most cases of imminent danger, all members of the family will be
14	required to leave immediately; and
15	WHEREAS, An example of imminent danger includes domestic violence incidents that
16	have occurred between people in intimate relationships – either at the shelter or up to thirty
17	days prior to the family being placed in the shelter; and
18	WHEREAS, Nine families received Denials of Service (DOS) from February 2014 –
19	June 2015; and
20	WHEREAS, Emergency Shelter and Transitional Housing constitute a critical service
21	for families fleeing from domestic violence. In Fiscal Year 2013-2014, city-funded emergency
22	shelters provided 3,591 bed nights to women and their children escaping domestic violence,
23	while three transitional housing programs and one permanent supportive housing program
24	provided 11,659 bed nights to women seeking longer-term stability. Sadly, 1,893 individuals
25	were turned away due to lack of space; and

1	WHEREAS, The work of city agencies, community organizations and advocates, such
2	as the San Francisco Department on the Status of Women, the Domestic Violence
3	Consortium, and the Family Violence Council have led to ground-breaking programs and
4	policies supporting domestic violence victims and reducing domestic violence-related crime;
5	and
6	WHEREAS, Prohibiting victims of domestic violence and their families from shelter
7	goes against these ground-breaking programs and policies; and
8	WHEREAS, Domestic violence is a significant and pervasive problem affecting
9	thousands of San Francisco residents and is one of the most chronically underreported
10	crimes; now, therefore, be it
11	WHEREAS, On, the Shelter Monitoring Committee unanimously
12	approved policy recommendations to amend HSA's Imminent Danger policy as it pertains to
13	victims of domestic violence; now, therefore, be it
14	RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors urges the adoption of the Shelter
15	Monitoring Committee's policy recommendations to the Human Services Agency's Imminent
16	Danger policy as it relates to victims of domestic violence, including the following:
17	a. Prohibition of a denial of service on the basis of being a victim of domestic violence;
18	b. Prohibition of a denial of service based on self-disclosure of domestic violence;
19	c. Requirement of the use of lethality assessments upon intake to assess all families
20	for the risk of domestic violence;
21	d. Establishment of procedures in which shelters contact law enforcement for the
22	provision of emergency protective orders in cases of domestic violence;
23	e. An update to the shelter training manual for shelter staff on how to handle domestic
24	violence and other crisis situations; and

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1	f. The inclusion of these policies in contracts upon renewal or establishment of new
2	contracts with shelter providers; and, be it
3	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Board of Supervisors reinforces its commitment to
4	protecting and supporting victims of domestic violence in all aspects.
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
