## ORDER OF DETERMINATION October 5, 2022

DATE DECISION ISSUED September 7, 2022

CASE TITLE - File No. 22014

Complaint filed by Sergei Severinov against Lt. Lynn Reilly and the Police Department for allegedly violating Administrative Code (Sunshine Ordinance), Section(s) 67.21(b), by failing to respond to a public records request in a timely and/or complete manner.

#### HEARING AND ACTION ON THE COMPLAINT

On April 19, 2022, the Complaint Committee acting in its capacity to hear petitions/complaints heard the matter.

Moved by Chair Schmidt, seconded by Member Stein, to find that the Sunshine Ordinance Task Force (SOTF) has jurisdiction, find that the requested records are public and to refer the matter to the SOTF for hearing and requested the SOTF determine if there is a violation of Administrative Code, Sunshine Ordinance, Sections 67.21(b) by failing to provide the requested records in a complete and timely manner and 67.21(c) by failing to assist the requestor in obtaining their records.

On September 7, 2022, the SOTF held a hearing to review the recommendation form committee and/or to review the merits of the petition/complaint.

Moved by Chair Yankee, seconded by Member Wolfe, to find that the Police Department violated Administrative Code, Sunshine Ordinance Section(s) 67.21(c) by failing to provide assistance in finding the records and 67.27 by failing to provide an explicit justification in writing for withholding records.

The SOTF ordered the Police Department to provide more extensive assistance in locating the requested records and further orders the Police Department to provide a justification or location of the existence of records for each of the 25 separate requests in the Complainant's overall request. The SOTF referred the matter to the Compliance and Amendments Committee for monitoring.

Complaint regarding lack of disclosure and incomplete disclosure of records by Department of Police Accountability:

SOTF File No. 22014 scheduled for hearing on April 19, 2022

Honorable Members of the Committee of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

We are an immigrant family in San Francisco. Myself, my wife and my children have been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and New York Times attached).

Having been repeatedly vicitmized by SFPD racism, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and all records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

Accordingly, I have submitted a request for records to SFPD (attached) on February 15, 2022.

In response (attached), SFPD had refused to release any records.

Their response reveals that SFPD had refused to search for any records.

To justify their refusal, SFPD had impermissively narrowed down the interpretation of my request stating that ``SFPD interprets your request for criminal history records on the above-referenced individuals."

SFPD has not right no narrow my request, in which I have demanded all records dealing and/or related to myself, Sergei Severinov, my wife, Olga Tikhonnova and my children, Vera and Ivan Severinov, with me. They have also have an obligation to keep redactions and withholdings to a minimum.

San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records law presume all records to be public. SFPD is obligated under these law to search for all records, examine them and disclose all public information. It is unlawful for them to conclude that a record or records are exempt from disclosure without examining the records.

Their failure to do a search is the most egregious violation of the law.

It is also unlawful for SFPD to refuse to search and release records, such as Incident reports, by stating that they have established a different procedure for release of such records. San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records require SFPD to release all records to me in response to my request, as long as I have submitted it to an address or fax or SFPD portal and it had reached them. SFPD had no right to deny my request by referring to an additional procedure.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been disclosed by SFPD but had not been disclosed, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

(1) My complaint 22014 is based on Sunshins Ordinance Section(s) 67.21(b).

The letter ``b" is missing in your agenda. It is important since to add this to distinguish this complaint from my complaint 22020 which is based on section (c).

- (2) My complaint 22020 has a different allegation from the one that you have listed. AS I have stated on my original intake form, my allegations in this complaint are:

Complaint regarding lack of disclosure and incomplete disclosure of records by Department of Police Accountability:

Honorable Members of the Committee of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

We are an immigrant family in San Francisco. Myself, my wife and my children have been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and New York Times attached).

Having been repeatedly vicitmized by SFPD racism, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and all records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

Accordingly, I have submitted a request for records to SFPD (attached) on February 15, 2022.

In response (attached), SFPD had refused to release any records.

Their response reveals that SFPD had refused to search for any records.

To justify their refusal, SFPD had impermissively narrowed down the interpretation of my request stating that ``SFPD interprets your request for criminal history records on the above-referenced individuals."

SFPD has not right no narrow my request, in which I have demanded all records dealing and/or related to myself, Sergei Severinov, my wife, Olga Tikhonnova and my children, Vera and Ivan Severinov, with me. They have also have an obligation to keep redactions and withholdings to a minimum.

San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records law presume all records to be public. SFPD is obligated under these law to search for all records, examine them and disclose all public information. It is unlawful for them to conclude that a record or records are exempt from disclosure without examining the records.

Their failure to do a search is the most egregious violation of the law.

It is also unlawful for SFPD to refuse to search and release records, such as Incident reports, by stating that they have established a different procedure for release of such records. San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records require SFPD to release all records to me in response to my request, as long as I have submitted it to an address or fax or SFPD portal and it had reached them. SFPD had no right to deny my request by referring to an additional procedure.

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
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

# RELATED: Top L.A. County sheriff's official sent emails mocking Muslims, blacks, Latinos and women

The messages were discovered during a recent internal affairs investigation and add to a growing list of racist emails and texts traded among department officers. Already, the racist communications have resulted in the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases.

"When we're talking about bias policing and racial profiling, there is a direct connection to these associations being made by officers," Adachi said. "That's the kind of mentality that tells you it's OK to shoot, OK to kill, OK to arrest" people of color.





The department said the latest texts were uncovered during a department investigation into allegations that an officer had committed a sexual assault while off-duty. The officer, Jason Lai, has been charged with misdemeanor counts of unlawful access and use of criminal and motor vehicle databases.

Police Chief Greg Suhr said the three officers mentioned at Tuesday's news conference have left the department. A fourth officer is also facing discipline, officials said.

In addition to the other slurs, Lai also used a derogatory term in Chinese to refer to black people and followed that up with a text message referring to them as "a pack of wild animals on the loose."

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"Anytime an officer presents him or herself to be this way, they will be gone," Suhr said. "We will not have this in the San Francisco police force."

Suhr pledged to have all officers undergo training for implicit bias -- the theory that they are unconsciously treating or viewing a certain population differently without realizing it. Adachi said that responsibility in changing the department's culture starts with its officers, not its chief.

"You can have the chief say 'We need officers themselves," Adachi said. "I'r

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The texts were the second time an investigation has unearthed blatant racism among San Francisco police officers. A court filing by federal prosecutors last year revealed that 14 other officers had either sent or received <u>text messages</u> in previous years.

The previous scandal led to the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases and a <u>review of 3,000</u> more. Suhr tried to fire several of the 14 officers, but a judge ruled that the department had waited too long to discipline them. That ruling is now on appeal.

Adachi said Tuesday that the recent texts will require at least 207 criminal cases to be reviewed.

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

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

# San Francisco Police Chief Releases Officers' Racist Texts

April 29, 2016

SAN FRANCISCO — Police Chief Gregory P. Suhr on Friday announced that all officers on the San Francisco force would be required to complete anti-bias training as he released nine pages of racist text messages between three officers that further tarnished the image of a department under federal investigation.

"We have nothing to hide," said Chief Suhr. "These are the actions of a few."

But the city's public defender and experts on criminal justice said the texts appeared to reveal a deep culture of bias in the 2,000member force that contradicts the city's image of tolerance and liberalism.

"These texts evidence a deep culture of racial hatred and animus against blacks, Latinos, gays and even South Asians," Jeff Adachi, the public defender, said in an interview. "It can no longer be said to be an isolated problem."

A number of police departments, including those in Miami and Los Angeles, have had problems with racist messages sent by their officers. Experts in criminal justice have debated how to address bias, both conscious and unconscious.

The text messages released Friday use crude and strongly disparaging language against blacks and other minorities and were discovered as part of an investigation into a rape charge against one of the officers.

They come a year after a scandal involving 14 officers who also exchanged racist messages. An attempt to fire some of the 14 was rejected by a Superior Court judge, who said the statute of limitation had expired. Most of those officers remain on the force. Of the three officers whose messages were released Friday, one has retired and two have resigned.

Some of the messages released Friday had been previously made public by the public defender's office, which is reopening the files on 207 cases that were handled by the three officers who sent the messages.

Mr. Adachi said the messages were highly consequential.

"These are people who have the power to arrest and the power to kill somebody," he said. "If you're thinking, 'This is a wild animal or this is a crazed black man who's going to hurt me,' that's when you might pull the trigger. That's where it becomes scary."

Chief Suhr also announced measures on Friday that would re-evaluate the use of force by officers. Two men wielding knives, an African-American and a Latino, have been fatally shot by the police since December in what critics say was unnecessary use of force.

Among other things, the chief said the department would now require officers to document any time they point their weapons at someone. He also announced measures requiring officers to carry helmets, long batons and gloves in their vehicles "to create time and distance from a person with a weapon short of a firearm."

Eugene O'Donnell, a former New York City police officer who is now a professor at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, said that racist texts in San Francisco were a marker of more complex and multicultural times. Two of the three officers are Asian-Americans.

"The traditional black/white narrative is changing," he said.

Mr. O'Donnell said that firing racist officers is the "easy part" but that changing the mentality of officers is much harder. He is skeptical that lectures on diversity and tolerance are effective.

"Lecturing officers is not going to work," he said. "If you tell the cops, 'Don't tell us what you really think,' that fuels a backlash."

The text messages released Friday had names and dates redacted. But in what appears to be a measure of the seriousness of the problem within the police force, the texts were sent last year, just as the scandal of the 14 officers exchanging racist messages was raging.

One text message released on Friday featured the image of a badly burned turkey and the words "Is that a Ferguson turkey," an apparent reference to the St. Louis suburb where Michael Brown, a black teenager, was killed by a white police officer.

The Los Angeles Times on Wednesday published emails mocking blacks, Latinos and Muslims that were sent by Tom Angel, now the chief of staff for the sheriff of Los Angeles County. The emails were sent when Mr. Angel was an officer in Burbank.

The texting scandal in San Francisco comes as the federal government is conducting an overall review of the Police Department after the fatal shooting in December of an African-American man, Mario Woods.

After video of the shooting was posted online, prompting an outcry, Mayor Edwin M. Lee requested the federal investigation, which is being carried out by the Justice Department.

Complaint regarding denial to disclose records and refusal to search for records and refusal to assist in search

by San Francisco Police Department (SFPD):

SOTF File No. 22014 scheduled for hearing on September 7, 2022

Honorable Members of the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force:

We –myself, my wife and out two kids- are an immigrant family in San Francisco. Myself, my wife and two of my children have all been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism, anti-immigrant bigotry and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and the New York Times are attached).

SFPD is headed by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Chief William Scott and its racists and bigoted anti-immigrant policies and practices are implemented, in particular, by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Lieutenant.

Having been repeatedly victimized by SFPD, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and all records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

Accordingly, I have submitted a request for records to SFPD (attached) on February 15, 2022.

In response (attached), SFPD had refused to release any records.

Their response reveals that SFPD had refused to search for any records.

To justify their refusal, SFPD had impermissively narrowed down the interpretation of my request stating that "SFPD interprets your request for criminal history records on the above-referenced individuals."

SFPD has not right no narrow my request, in which I have demanded all records dealing and/or related to myself, Sergei Severinov, my wife, Olga Tikhonnova and my children, Vera and Ivan Severinov, with me. They also have an obligation to keep redactions and withholdings to a minimum.

SFPD justifies its refusal to do any search for records and release any records by

Referring to section 11105 of California Penal Code. However, this section does not apply to records held by SFPD at all. Specifically, section 11105 of California Penal Code refers and applies only to records kept by the Department of Justice of California and only such records that are included in "state summary history information." Moreover, Section 11105 of California explicitly states in part (B):

"State summary criminal history information" does not refer to records and data compiled by criminal justice agencies other than the Attorney General, nor does it refer to records of complaints to or investigations conducted by, or records of intelligence information or security procedures of, the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice."

San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records law presume all records to be public. SFPD is obligated under these law to search for all records, examine them and disclose all public information. It is unlawful for them to conclude that a record or records are exempt from disclosure without examining the records.

Their failure to do a search is the most egregious violation of the law.

It is also unlawful for SFPD to refuse to search and release records, such as Incident reports, by stating that they have established a different procedure for release of such records. San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records require SFPD to release all records to me in response to my request, as long as I have submitted it to an address or fax or SFPD portal and it had reached them. SFPD had no right to deny my request by referring to an additional procedure.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been disclosed by SFPD but had not been disclosed, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

SFPD should be found in violation of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and compelled to do a search for all responsive records, assist me in search by providing a detailed list and description of all records, exempt and non-exempt, and disclose all responsive records.

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

The messages were discovered during a recent internal affairs investigation and add to a growing list of racist emails and texts traded among department officers. Already, the racist communications have resulted in the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases.

"When we're talking about bias policing and racial profiling, there is a direct connection to these associations being made by officers," Adachi said. "That's the kind of mentality that tells you it's OK to shoot, OK to kill, OK to arrest" people of color.

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The department said the latest texts were uncovered during a department investigation into allegations that an officer had committed a sexual assault while off-duty. The officer, Jason Lai, has been charged with misdemeanor counts of unlawful access and use of criminal and motor vehicle databases.

Police Chief Greg Suhr said the three officers mentioned at Tuesday's news conference have left the department. A fourth officer is also facing discipline, officials said.

In addition to the other slurs, Lai also used a derogatory term in Chinese to refer to black people and followed that up with a text message referring to them as "a pack of wild animals on the loose."

"Anytime an officer presents him or herself to be this way, they will be gone," Suhr said. "We will not have this in the San Francisco police force."

Suhr pledged to have all officers undergo training for implicit bias -- the theory that they are unconsciously treating or viewing a certain population differently without realizing it. Adachi said that responsibility in changing the department's culture starts with its officers, not its chief.

"You can have the chief say 'We need officers themselves," Adachi said. "I'r

The texts were the second time an investigation has unearthed blatant racism among San Francisco police officers. A court filing by federal prosecutors last year revealed that 14 other officers had either sent or received <u>text messages</u> in previous years.

The previous scandal led to the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases and a <u>review of 3,000</u> more. Suhr tried to fire several of the 14 officers, but a judge ruled that the department had waited too long to discipline them. That ruling is now on appeal.

Adachi said Tuesday that the recent texts will require at least 207 criminal cases to be reviewed.

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



## San Francisco Police Chief Releases Officers' Racist Texts

April 29, 2016

SAN FRANCISCO — Police Chief Gregory P. Suhr on Friday announced that all officers on the San Francisco force would be required to complete anti-bias training as he released nine pages of racist text messages between three officers that further tarnished the image of a department under federal investigation.

"We have nothing to hide," said Chief Suhr. "These are the actions of a few."

But the city's public defender and experts on criminal justice said the texts appeared to reveal a deep culture of bias in the 2,000member force that contradicts the city's image of tolerance and liberalism.

"These texts evidence a deep culture of racial hatred and animus against blacks, Latinos, gays and even South Asians," Jeff Adachi, the public defender, said in an interview. "It can no longer be said to be an isolated problem."

A number of police departments, including those in Miami and Los Angeles, have had problems with racist messages sent by their officers. Experts in criminal justice have debated how to address bias, both conscious and unconscious.

The text messages released Friday use crude and strongly disparaging language against blacks and other minorities and were discovered as part of an investigation into a rape charge against one of the officers.

They come a year after a scandal involving 14 officers who also exchanged racist messages. An attempt to fire some of the 14 was rejected by a Superior Court judge, who said the statute of limitation had expired. Most of those officers remain on the force. Of the three officers whose messages were released Friday, one has retired and two have resigned.

Some of the messages released Friday had been previously made public by the public defender's office, which is reopening the files on 207 cases that were handled by the three officers who sent the messages.

Mr. Adachi said the messages were highly consequential.

"These are people who have the power to arrest and the power to kill somebody," he said. "If you're thinking, 'This is a wild animal or this is a crazed black man who's going to hurt me,' that's when you might pull the trigger. That's where it becomes scary."

Chief Suhr also announced measures on Friday that would re-evaluate the use of force by officers. Two men wielding knives, an African-American and a Latino, have been fatally shot by the police since December in what critics say was unnecessary use of force.

Among other things, the chief said the department would now require officers to document any time they point their weapons at someone. He also announced measures requiring officers to carry helmets, long batons and gloves in their vehicles "to create time and distance from a person with a weapon short of a firearm."

Eugene O'Donnell, a former New York City police officer who is now a professor at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, said that racist texts in San Francisco were a marker of more complex and multicultural times. Two of the three officers are Asian-Americans.

"The traditional black/white narrative is changing," he said.

Mr. O'Donnell said that firing racist officers is the "easy part" but that changing the mentality of officers is much harder. He is skeptical that lectures on diversity and tolerance are effective.

"Lecturing officers is not going to work," he said. "If you tell the cops, 'Don't tell us what you really think,' that fuels a backlash."

The text messages released Friday had names and dates redacted. But in what appears to be a measure of the seriousness of the problem within the police force, the texts were sent last year, just as the scandal of the 14 officers exchanging racist messages was raging.

One text message released on Friday featured the image of a badly burned turkey and the words "Is that a Ferguson turkey," an apparent reference to the St. Louis suburb where Michael Brown, a black teenager, was killed by a white police officer.

The Los Angeles Times on Wednesday published emails mocking blacks, Latinos and Muslims that were sent by Tom Angel, now the chief of staff for the sheriff of Los Angeles County. The emails were sent when Mr. Angel was an officer in Burbank.

The texting scandal in San Francisco comes as the federal government is conducting an overall review of the Police Department after the fatal shooting in December of an African-American man, Mario Woods.

After video of the shooting was posted online, prompting an outcry, Mayor Edwin M. Lee requested the federal investigation, which is being carried out by the Justice Department.

Members of the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force:

My complaint 22014 is based on sections 67.21(b) and 67.21(c) of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and was heard by SOTF on Sept 7, 2022.

On the substance of the matter, SFPD has refused and continue to refuse to disclose any records that I have requested and has refused to do any search for responsive records.

Also, they have refused to provide in provide in a written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my requests for records. I have requested such written statement from SFPD in request to them of February 28, 2022.

I have received an attached response from SFPD dated Sept 13, 2022, apparently in response to SOTF hearing on Sept 7,2022. IN the said response, SFPD still denies to disclose any records and does not provide the required written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my requests for records. In the said response, SFPD still unlawfully interprets my request ``...that SFPD provide all records about, and/or related to, and/or pertaining to, and/or mentioning, and/or concerning, and/or dealing with the following ''. SFPD interprets this request narrowly as ``request for incident report''

In their letter dated Sept 13, 2022, SFPD also states that they have found responsive records (see Response to item nos. 19 through 23) but refuse to disclose them, stating in particular:

SFPD was able to locate responsive information for item 22. Please contact DEM for responsive records.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been disclosed by SFPD but had not been disclosed, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

In their letter dated Sept 13, 2022 SFPD still falsely claims that disclosure of records is barred Penal Code § 11105.

In fact, section 11105 of Penal code does not prohibit disclosure of requested records. Section 11105 of California Penal Code refers and applies only to records kept by the Department of Justice of California and only such records that are included in ``state summary history information.'' Moreover, Section 11105 of California explicitly states in part (B):

"State summary criminal history information" does not refer to records and data compiled by criminal justice agencies other than the Attorney General, nor does it refer to records of complaints to or investigations conducted by, or records of intelligence information or security procedures of, the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice."

Moreover parag (h) of section 11105:

It is not a violation of this section to include information obtained from a record in (1) a transcript or record of a judicial or administrative proceeding or (2) any other public record if the inclusion of the information in the public record is authorized by a court, statute, or decisional law.

The reason why SDPD refuses to disclose records is their base and vicious racism and hatred of immigrants. We –myself, my wife and out two kids- are an immigrant family in San Francisco, and have all been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD multiple times. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism, anti-immigrant bigotry and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and the New York Times are attached).

SFPD is headed by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Chief William Scott and its racists and bigoted anti-immigrant policies and practices are implemented, in particular, by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Lieutenant Riley.

As many immigrants in this city, we live in constant fear of SFPD, and are subject to their never ending harassment.

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More racist text messages uncovered among San Francisco police officers

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

The messages were discovered during a recent internal affairs investigation and add to a growing list of racist emails and texts traded among department officers. Already, the racist communications have resulted in the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases.

"When we're talking about bias policing and racial profiling, there is a direct connection to these associations being made by officers," Adachi said. "That's the kind of mentality that tells you it's OK to shoot, OK to kill, OK to arrest" people of color.

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The department said the latest texts were uncovered during a department investigation into allegations that an officer had committed a sexual assault while off-duty. The officer, Jason Lai, has been charged with misdemeanor counts of unlawful access and use of criminal and motor vehicle databases.

Police Chief Greg Suhr said the three officers mentioned at Tuesday's news conference have left the department. A fourth officer is also facing discipline, officials said.

In addition to the other slurs, Lai also used a derogatory term in Chinese to refer to black people and followed that up with a text message referring to them as "a pack of wild animals on the loose."

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"Anytime an officer presents him or herself to be this way, they will be gone," Suhr said. "We will not have this in the San Francisco police force."

Suhr pledged to have all officers undergo training for implicit bias -- the theory that they are unconsciously treating or viewing a certain population differently without realizing it. Adachi said that responsibility in changing the department's culture starts with its officers, not its chief.

"You can have the chief say 'We need officers themselves," Adachi said. "I'r

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The texts were the second time an investigation has unearthed blatant racism among San Francisco police officers. A court filing by federal prosecutors last year revealed that 14 other officers had either sent or received <u>text messages</u> in previous years.

The previous scandal led to the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases and a <u>review of 3,000</u> more. Suhr tried to fire several of the 14 officers, but a judge ruled that the department had waited too long to discipline them. That ruling is now on appeal.

Adachi said Tuesday that the recent texts will require at least 207 criminal cases to be reviewed.

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

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

# San Francisco Police Chief Releases Officers' Racist Texts

SAN FRANCISCO — Police Chief Gregory P. Suhr on Friday announced that all officers on the San Francisco force would be required to complete anti-bias training as he released nine pages of racist text messages between three officers that further tarnished the image of a department under federal investigation.

"We have nothing to hide," said Chief Suhr. "These are the actions of a few."

But the city's public defender and experts on criminal justice said the texts appeared to reveal a deep culture of bias in the 2,000member force that contradicts the city's image of tolerance and liberalism.

"These texts evidence a deep culture of racial hatred and animus against blacks, Latinos, gays and even South Asians," Jeff Adachi, the public defender, said in an interview. "It can no longer be said to be an isolated problem."

A number of police departments, including those in Miami and Los Angeles, have had problems with racist messages sent by their officers. Experts in criminal justice have debated how to address bias, both conscious and unconscious.

The text messages released Friday use crude and strongly disparaging language against blacks and other minorities and were discovered as part of an investigation into a rape charge against one of the officers.

They come a year after a scandal involving 14 officers who also exchanged racist messages. An attempt to fire some of the 14 was rejected by a Superior Court judge, who said the statute of limitation had expired. Most of those officers remain on the force. Of the three officers whose messages were released Friday, one has retired and two have resigned.

Some of the messages released Friday had been previously made public by the public defender's office, which is reopening the files on 207 cases that were handled by the three officers who sent the messages.

Mr. Adachi said the messages were highly consequential.

"These are people who have the power to arrest and the power to kill somebody," he said. "If you're thinking, 'This is a wild animal or this is a crazed black man who's going to hurt me,' that's when you might pull the trigger. That's where it becomes scary."

Chief Suhr also announced measures on Friday that would re-evaluate the use of force by officers. Two men wielding knives, an African-American and a Latino, have been fatally shot by the police since December in what critics say was unnecessary use of force.

Among other things, the chief said the department would now require officers to document any time they point their weapons at someone. He also announced measures requiring officers to carry helmets, long batons and gloves in their vehicles "to create time and distance from a person with a weapon short of a firearm."

Eugene O'Donnell, a former New York City police officer who is now a professor at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, said that racist texts in San Francisco were a marker of more complex and multicultural times. Two of the three officers are Asian-Americans.

"The traditional black/white narrative is changing," he said.

Mr. O'Donnell said that firing racist officers is the "easy part" but that changing the mentality of officers is much harder. He is skeptical that lectures on diversity and tolerance are effective.

"Lecturing officers is not going to work," he said. "If you tell the cops, 'Don't tell us what you really think,' that fuels a backlash."

The text messages released Friday had names and dates redacted. But in what appears to be a measure of the seriousness of the problem within the police force, the texts were sent last year, just as the scandal of the 14 officers exchanging racist messages was raging.

One text message released on Friday featured the image of a badly burned turkey and the words "Is that a Ferguson turkey," an apparent reference to the St. Louis suburb where Michael Brown, a black teenager, was killed by a white police officer.

The Los Angeles Times on Wednesday published emails mocking blacks, Latinos and Muslims that were sent by Tom Angel, now the chief of staff for the sheriff of Los Angeles County. The emails were sent when Mr. Angel was an officer in Burbank.

The texting scandal in San Francisco comes as the federal government is conducting an overall review of the Police Department after the fatal shooting in December of an African-American man, Mario Woods.

After video of the shooting was posted online, prompting an outcry, Mayor Edwin M. Lee requested the federal investigation, which is being carried out by the Justice Department.

#### 11105.

- (a) (1) The Department of Justice shall maintain state summary criminal history information.
  - (2) As used in this section:
    - (A) "State summary criminal history information" means the master record of information compiled by the Attorney General pertaining to the identification and criminal history of a person, such as name, date of birth, physical description, fingerprints, photographs, dates of arrests, arresting agencies and booking numbers, charges, dispositions, sentencing information, and similar data about the person.
    - (B) "State summary criminal history information" does not refer to records and data compiled by criminal justice agencies other than the Attorney General, nor does it refer to records of complaints to or investigations conducted by, or records of intelligence information or security procedures of, the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice.
- (b) The Attorney General shall furnish state summary criminal history information to the following, if needed in the course of their duties, provided that when information is furnished to assist an agency, officer, or official of state or local government, a public utility, or any other entity, in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, Chapter 1321 of the Statutes of 1974 and Section 432.7 of the Labor Code shall apply:
  - (1) The courts of the state.
  - (2) Peace officers of the state, as defined in Section 830.1, subdivisions (a) and (e) of Section 830.2, subdivision (a) of Section 830.3, subdivision (a) of Section 830.31, and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 830.5.

- (3) District attorneys of the state.
- (4) Prosecuting city attorneys or city prosecutors of a city within the state.
- (5) City attorneys pursuing civil gang injunctions pursuant to Section 186.22a, or drug abatement actions pursuant to Section 3479 or 3480 of the Civil Code, or Section 11571 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (6) Probation officers of the state.
- (7) Parole officers of the state.
- (8) A public defender or attorney of record when representing a person in proceedings upon a petition for a certificate of rehabilitation and pardon pursuant to Section 4852.08.
- (9) A public defender or attorney of record when representing a person in a criminal case or a juvenile delinquency proceeding, including all appeals and postconviction motions, or a parole, mandatory supervision pursuant to paragraph (5) of subdivision (h) of Section 1170, or postrelease community supervision revocation or revocation extension proceeding, if the information is requested in the course of representation.
- (10) An agency, officer, or official of the state if the state summary criminal history information is required to implement a statute or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct. The agency, officer, or official of the state authorized by this paragraph to receive state summary criminal history information may perform state and federal criminal history information checks as provided for in subdivision (u). The Department of Justice shall provide a state or federal response to the agency, officer, or official pursuant to subdivision (p).
- (11) A city, county, city and county, or district, or an officer or official thereof, if access is needed in order to assist that agency, officer, or official in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, and if the access is specifically authorized by the city council, board of supervisors, or governing board of the city, county, or district if the state summary criminal history information is required to implement a statute, ordinance, or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct. The city, county, city and county, district, or the officer or official thereof authorized by this paragraph may also transmit fingerprint images and related information to the Department of Justice to be transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
- (12) The subject of the state summary criminal history information under procedures established under Article 5 (commencing with Section 11120).

- (13) A person or entity when access is expressly authorized by statute if the criminal history information is required to implement a statute or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct.
- (14) Health officers of a city, county, city and county, or district when in the performance of their official duties enforcing Section 120175 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (15) A managing or supervising correctional officer of a county jail or other county correctional facility.
- (16) A humane society, or society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, for the specific purpose of complying with Section 14502 of the Corporations Code for the appointment of humane officers.
- (17) Local child support agencies established by Section 17304 of the Family Code. When a local child support agency closes a support enforcement case containing state summary criminal history information, the agency shall delete or purge from the file and destroy documents or information concerning or arising from offenses for or of which the parent has been arrested, charged, or convicted, other than for offenses related to the parent's having failed to provide support for minor children, consistent with the requirements of Section 17531 of the Family Code.
- (18) County child welfare agency personnel who have been delegated the authority of county probation officers to access state summary criminal history information pursuant to Section 272 of the Welfare and Institutions Code for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. Information from criminal history records provided pursuant to this subdivision shall not be used for a purpose other than those specified in this section and Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. When an agency obtains records both on the basis of name checks and fingerprint checks, final placement decisions shall be based only on the records obtained pursuant to the fingerprint check.
- (19) The court of a tribe, or court of a consortium of tribes, that has entered into an agreement with the state pursuant to Section 10553.1 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. This information may be used only for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and for tribal approval or tribal licensing of foster care or adoptive homes. Article 6 (commencing with Section 11140) shall apply to officers, members, and employees of a tribal court receiving state summary criminal history information pursuant to this section.
- (20) Child welfare agency personnel of a tribe or consortium of tribes that has entered into an agreement with the state pursuant to Section 10553.1 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and to whom the state has delegated duties under paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 272 of the Welfare and Institutions

Code. The purposes for use of the information shall be for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and for tribal approval or tribal licensing of foster care or adoptive homes. When an agency obtains records on the basis of name checks and fingerprint checks, final placement decisions shall be based only on the records obtained pursuant to the fingerprint check. Article 6 (commencing with Section 11140) shall apply to child welfare agency personnel receiving criminal record offender information pursuant to this section.

- (21) An officer providing conservatorship investigations pursuant to Sections 5351, 5354, and 5356 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
- (22) A court investigator providing investigations or reviews in conservatorships pursuant to Section 1826, 1850, 1851, or 2250.6 of the Probate Code.
- (23) A person authorized to conduct a guardianship investigation pursuant to Section 1513 of the Probate Code.
- (24) A humane officer pursuant to Section 14502 of the Corporations Code for the purposes of performing the officer's duties.
- (25) A public agency described in subdivision (b) of Section 15975 of the Government Code, for the purpose of oversight and enforcement policies with respect to its contracted providers.
- (26) (A) A state entity, or its designee, that receives federal tax information. A state entity or its designee that is authorized by this paragraph to receive state summary criminal history information also may transmit fingerprint images and related information to the Department of Justice to be transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of the state entity or its designee obtaining federal-level criminal offender record information from the Department of Justice. This information shall be used only for the purposes set forth in Section 1044 of the Government Code.
  - (B) For purposes of this paragraph, "federal tax information," "state entity" and "designee" are as defined in paragraphs (1), (2), and (3), respectively, of subdivision (f) of Section 1044 of the Government Code.
- (c) The Attorney General may furnish state summary criminal history information and, when specifically authorized by this subdivision, federal-level criminal history information upon a showing of a compelling need to any of the following, provided that when information is furnished to assist an agency, officer, or official of state or local government, a public utility, or any other entity in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, Chapter 1321 of the Statutes of 1974 and Section 432.7 of the Labor Code shall apply:
  - (1) A public utility, as defined in Section 216 of the Public Utilities Code, that operates a nuclear energy facility when access is needed in order to assist in employing persons to work at the facility, provided that, if the Attorney General

supplies the data, the Attorney General shall furnish a copy of the data to the person to whom the data relates.

- (2) A peace officer of the state other than those included in subdivision (b).
- (3) An illegal dumping enforcement officer as defined in subdivision (i) of Section 830.7.
- (4) A peace officer of another country.
- (5) Public officers, other than peace officers, of the United States, other states, or possessions or territories of the United States, provided that access to records similar to state summary criminal history information is expressly authorized by a statute of the United States, other states, or possessions or territories of the United States if the information is needed for the performance of their official duties.
- (6) A person when disclosure is requested by a probation, parole, or peace officer with the consent of the subject of the state summary criminal history information and for purposes of furthering the rehabilitation of the subject.
- (7) The courts of the United States, other states, or territories or possessions of the United States.
- (8) Peace officers of the United States, other states, or territories or possessions of the United States.
- (9) An individual who is the subject of the record requested if needed in conjunction with an application to enter the United States or a foreign nation.
- (10) (A) (i) A public utility, as defined in Section 216 of the Public Utilities Code, or a cable corporation as defined in subparagraph (B), if receipt of criminal history information is needed in order to assist in employing current or prospective employees, contract employees, or subcontract employees who, in the course of their employment, may be seeking entrance to private residences or adjacent grounds. The information provided shall be limited to the record of convictions and arrests for which the person is released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (ii) If the Attorney General supplies the data pursuant to this paragraph, the Attorney General shall furnish a copy of the data to the current or prospective employee to whom the data relates.
  - (iii) State summary criminal history information is confidential and the receiving public utility or cable corporation shall not disclose its contents, other than for the purpose for which it was acquired. The state summary criminal history information in the possession of the public utility or cable corporation and all copies made from it shall be destroyed not more than 30 days after employment or promotion or transfer is denied or granted,

except for those cases where a current or prospective employee is out on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial, in which case the state summary criminal history information and all copies shall be destroyed not more than 30 days after the case is resolved.

- (iv) A violation of this paragraph is a misdemeanor, and shall give the current or prospective employee who is injured by the violation a cause of action against the public utility or cable corporation to recover damages proximately caused by the violations. A public utility's or cable corporation's request for state summary criminal history information for purposes of employing current or prospective employees who may be seeking entrance to private residences or adjacent grounds in the course of their employment shall be deemed a "compelling need" as required to be shown in this subdivision.
- (v) This section shall not be construed as imposing a duty upon public utilities or cable corporations to request state summary criminal history information on current or prospective employees.
- (B) For purposes of this paragraph, "cable corporation" means a corporation or firm that transmits or provides television, computer, or telephone services by cable, digital, fiber optic, satellite, or comparable technology to subscribers for a fee.
- (C) Requests for federal-level criminal history information received by the Department of Justice from entities authorized pursuant to subparagraph (A) shall be forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by the Department of Justice. Federal-level criminal history information received or compiled by the Department of Justice may then be disseminated to the entities referenced in subparagraph (A), as authorized by law.
- (11) A campus of the California State University or the University of California, or a four-year college or university accredited by a regional accreditation organization approved by the United States Department of Education, if needed in conjunction with an application for admission by a convicted felon to a special education program for convicted felons, including, but not limited to, university alternatives and halfway houses. Only conviction information shall be furnished. The college or university may require the convicted felon to be fingerprinted, and any inquiry to the department under this section shall include the convicted felon's fingerprints and any other information specified by the department.
- (12) A foreign government, if requested by the individual who is the subject of the record requested, if needed in conjunction with the individual's application to adopt a minor child who is a citizen of that foreign nation. Requests for information pursuant to this paragraph shall be in accordance with the process described in Sections 11122 to 11124, inclusive. The response shall be provided to the foreign government or its designee and to the individual who requested the information.

- (d) Whenever an authorized request for state summary criminal history information pertains to a person whose fingerprints are on file with the Department of Justice and the department has no criminal history of that person, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the fingerprint card accompanying the request for information, if any, may be stamped "no criminal record" and returned to the person or entity making the request.
- (e) Whenever state summary criminal history information is furnished as the result of an application and is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the Department of Justice may charge the person or entity making the request a fee that it determines to be sufficient to reimburse the department for the cost of furnishing the information. In addition, the Department of Justice may add a surcharge to the fee to fund maintenance and improvements to the systems from which the information is obtained. Notwithstanding any other law, a person or entity required to pay a fee to the department for information received under this section may charge the applicant a fee sufficient to reimburse the person or entity for this expense. All moneys received by the department pursuant to this section, Sections 11105.3 and 26190, and former Section 13588 of the Education Code shall be deposited in a special account in the General Fund to be available for expenditure by the department to offset costs incurred pursuant to those sections and for maintenance and improvements to the systems from which the information is obtained upon appropriation by the Legislature.
- (f) Whenever there is a conflict, the processing of criminal fingerprints and fingerprints of applicants for security guard or alarm agent registrations or firearms qualification permits submitted pursuant to Section 7583.9, 7583.23, 7596.3, or 7598.4 of the Business and Professions Code shall take priority over the processing of other applicant fingerprints.
- (g) It is not a violation of this section to disseminate statistical or research information obtained from a record, provided that the identity of the subject of the record is not disclosed.
- (h) It is not a violation of this section to include information obtained from a record in (1) a transcript or record of a judicial or administrative proceeding or (2) any other public record if the inclusion of the information in the public record is authorized by a court, statute, or decisional law.
- (i) Notwithstanding any other law, the Department of Justice or a state or local law enforcement agency may require the submission of fingerprints for the purpose of conducting state summary criminal history information checks that are authorized by law.
- (j) The state summary criminal history information shall include any finding of mental incompetence pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 1367) of Title 10 of Part 2 arising out of a complaint charging a felony offense specified in Section 290.
- (k) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization and the information is to be used for peace officer employment or certification purposes. As used in this

subdivision, a peace officer is defined in Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 830) of Title 3 of Part 2.

- (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
  - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
  - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (C) Every arrest or detention, except for an arrest or detention resulting in an exoneration, provided, however, that where the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition for the arrest, the Department of Justice first makes a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest.
  - (D) Every successful diversion.
  - (E) Every date and agency name associated with all retained peace officer or nonsworn law enforcement agency employee preemployment criminal offender record information search requests.
  - (F) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
  - (G) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (I) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by a criminal justice agency or organization as defined in Section 13101, and the information is to be used for criminal justice employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Every arrest for an offense for which the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition or which did not result in a conviction, provided that the Department of Justice first makes a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest. However, information concerning an arrest shall not be disclosed if the records of the Department of Justice

indicate or if the genuine effort reveals that the subject was exonerated, successfully completed a diversion or deferred entry of judgment program, or the arrest was deemed a detention, or the subject was granted relief pursuant to Section 851.91.

- (D) Every date and agency name associated with all retained peace officer or nonsworn law enforcement agency employee preemployment criminal offender record information search requests.
- (E) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
- (F) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (m) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization pursuant to Section 1522, 1568.09, 1569.17, or 1596.871 of the Health and Safety Code, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of any of those sections or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction of an offense rendered against the applicant, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Every arrest for an offense for which the Department of Social Services is required by paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 1522 of the Health and Safety Code to determine if an applicant has been arrested. However, if the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition for an arrest, the Department of Justice shall first make a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest.
    - (D) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (E) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
  - (3) Notwithstanding the requirements of the sections referenced in paragraph (1) of this subdivision, the Department of Justice shall not disseminate information about an arrest subsequently deemed a detention or an arrest that resulted in the successful completion of a diversion program, exoneration, or a grant of relief pursuant to Section 851.91.

- (n) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information, to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency, organization, or individual pursuant to any of the following:
  - (A) Paragraph (10) of subdivision (c), when the information is to be used by a cable corporation.
  - (B) Section 11105.3 or 11105.4.
  - (C) Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
  - (D) A statute that incorporates the criteria of any of the statutory provisions listed in subparagraph (A), (B), or (C), or of this subdivision, by reference.
  - (2) With the exception of applications submitted by transportation companies authorized pursuant to Section 11105.3, and notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49, rendered against the applicant for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in subdivision (a) of Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. However, with the exception of those offenses for which registration is required pursuant to Section 290, the Department of Justice shall not disseminate information pursuant to this subdivision unless the conviction occurred within 10 years of the date of the agency's request for information or the conviction is over 10 years old but the subject of the request was incarcerated within 10 years of the agency's request for information.
    - (B) Every arrest for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in subdivision (a) of Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (D) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (o) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization pursuant to Section 379 or 1300 of the Financial Code, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of either of those sections or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.

- (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
  - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in Section 1300 of the Financial Code, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49.
  - (B) Every arrest for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in Section 1300 of the Financial Code for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (C) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (p) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an agency, organization, or individual not defined in subdivision (k), (l), (m), (n), or (o), or by a transportation company authorized pursuant to Section 11105.3, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of that section or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (D) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (q) All agencies, organizations, or individuals defined in subdivisions (k), (l), (m), (n), (o), and (p) may contract with the Department of Justice for subsequent notification pursuant to Section 11105.2. This subdivision shall not supersede sections that mandate an agency, organization, or individual to contract with the Department of Justice for subsequent notification pursuant to Section 11105.2.
- (r) This section does not require the Department of Justice to cease compliance with any other statutory notification requirements.
- (s) The provisions of Section 50.12 of Title 28 of the Code of Federal Regulations are to be followed in processing federal criminal history information.

- (t) Whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency, organization, or individual defined in subdivisions (k) to (p), inclusive, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the authorized agency, organization, or individual shall expeditiously furnish a copy of the information to the person to whom the information relates if the information is a basis for an adverse employment, licensing, or certification decision. When furnished other than in person, the copy shall be delivered to the last contact information provided by the applicant.
- (u) (1) If a fingerprint-based criminal history information check is required pursuant to any statute, that check shall be requested from the Department of Justice and shall be applicable to the person identified in the referencing statute. The agency or entity identified in the statute shall submit to the Department of Justice fingerprint images and related information required by the Department of Justice of the types of applicants identified in the referencing statute, for the purpose of obtaining information as to the existence and content of a record of state or federal convictions and state or federal arrests and also information as to the existence and content of a record of the state or federal arrests for which the Department of Justice establishes that the person is free on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial or appeal.
  - (2) If requested, the Department of Justice shall transmit fingerprint images and related information received pursuant to this section to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of obtaining a federal criminal history information check. The Department of Justice shall review the information returned from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and compile and disseminate a response or a fitness determination, as appropriate, to the agency or entity identified in the referencing statute.
  - (3) The Department of Justice shall provide a state- or federal-level response or a fitness determination, as appropriate, to the agency or entity identified in the referencing statute, pursuant to the identified subdivision.
  - (4) The agency or entity identified in the referencing statute shall request from the Department of Justice subsequent notification service, as provided pursuant to Section 11105.2, for persons described in the referencing statute.
  - (5) The Department of Justice shall charge a fee sufficient to cover the reasonable cost of processing the request described in this subdivision.
- (v) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2023, and as of that date is repealed.

Honorable Members of the Committee of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

We are an immigrant family in San Francisco. Myself, my wife and my children have been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and New York Times attached).

Having been repeatedly vicitmized by SFPD racism, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and all records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

Accordingly, I have submitted a request for records to SFPD (attached) on February 15, 2022.

In response (attached), SFPD had refused to release any records.

Their response reveals that SFPD had refused to search for any records.

To justify their refusal, SFPD had impermissively narrowed down the interpretation of my request stating that ``SFPD interprets your request for criminal history records on the above-referenced individuals."

SFPD has not right no narrow my request, in which I have demanded all records dealing and/or related to myself, Sergei Severinov, my wife, Olga Tikhonnova and my children, Vera and Ivan Severinov, with me. They have also have an obligation to keep redactions and withholdings to a minimum.

San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records law presume all records to be public. SFPD is obligated under these law to search for all records, examine them and disclose all public information. It is unlawful for them to conclude that a record or records are exempt from disclosure without examining the records.

Their failure to do a search is the most egregious violation of the law.

It is also unlawful for SFPD to refuse to search and release records, such as Incident reports, by stating that they have established a different procedure for release of such records. San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records require SFPD to release all records to me in response to my request, as long as I have submitted it to an address or fax or SFPD portal and it had reached them. SFPD had no right to deny my request by referring to an additional procedure.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been disclosed by SFPD but had not been disclosed, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

Section 67.21 part (c) of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance obliges SFPD to assist me in identifying the responsive records.

As I have requested, SFPD is obliged to provide a written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my request, irrespectively of whether they are exempt or not.

However, SFPD had refused to provide such assistance, had not made a search for records, as follows from their response (attached) and had not provided a written statement regarding the existence, quantity, form and nature of records requested.

This is an egregious violation of the law by SFPD.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been found and described by SFPD but had not been, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

Complaint regarding denial to disclose records and refusal to search for records and refusal to assist in search

Members of the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force:

My complaint 22014 is based on sections 67.21(b) and 67.21(c) of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and was heard by SOTF on Sept 7, 2022.

On the substance of the matter, SFPD has refused and continue to refuse to disclose any records that I have requested and has refused to do any search for responsive records.

Also, they have refused to provide in provide in a written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my requests for records. I have requested such written statement from SFPD in request to them of February 28, 2022.

I have received an attached response from SFPD dated Sept 13, 2022, apparently in response to SOTF hearing on Sept 7,2022. IN the said response, SFPD still denies to disclose any records and does not provide the required written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my requests for records. In the said response, SFPD still unlawfully interprets my request ``...that SFPD provide all records about, and/or related to, and/or pertaining to, and/or mentioning, and/or concerning, and/or dealing with the following ''. SFPD interprets this request narrowly as ``request for incident report''

In their letter dated Sept 13, 2022, SFPD also states that they have found responsive records (see Response to item nos. 19 through 23) but refuse to disclose them, stating in particular:

SFPD was able to locate responsive information for item 22. Please contact DEM for responsive records.

As an example of an existing public record which should have been disclosed by SFPD but had not been disclosed, I am attaching a record that had been created by SFPD: an Office of Citizens' Complaints form filled out by SFPD's officer Apodaca, #303, from Chief of Police Office, on Nov 25, 2009.

In their letter dated Sept 13, 2022 SFPD still falsely claims that disclosure of records is barred Penal Code § 11105.

In fact, section 11105 of Penal code does not prohibit disclosure of requested records. Section 11105 of California Penal Code refers and applies only to records kept by the Department of Justice of California and only such records that are included in ``state summary history information.'' Moreover, Section 11105 of California explicitly states in part (B):

"State summary criminal history information" does not refer to records and data compiled by criminal justice agencies other than the Attorney General, nor does it refer to records of complaints to or investigations conducted by, or records of intelligence information or security procedures of, the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice."

Moreover parag (h) of section 11105:

It is not a violation of this section to include information obtained from a record in (1) a transcript or record of a judicial or administrative proceeding or (2) any other public record if the inclusion of the information in the public record is authorized by a court, statute, or decisional law.

The reason why SDPD refuses to disclose records is their base and vicious racism and hatred of immigrants. We –myself, my wife and out two kids- are an immigrant family in San Francisco, and have all been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD multiple times. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism, anti-immigrant bigotry and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications (articles from Los Angeles Times and the New York Times are attached).

SFPD is headed by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Chief William Scott and its racists and bigoted anti-immigrant policies and practices are implemented, in particular, by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Lieutenant Riley.

As many immigrants in this city, we live in constant fear of SFPD, and are subject to their never ending harassment.

Having been repeatedly victimized by SFPD, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and inspect the records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

SFPD has not right to narrow my request, in which I have demanded all records dealing and/or related to myself, Sergei Severinov, my wife, Olga Tikhonnova and my children, Vera and Ivan Severinov, with me.

They also have an obligation to

San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records law presume all records to be public. SFPD is obligated under these law to search for all records, examine them and disclose all public information. It is unlawful for them to conclude that a record or records are exempt from disclosure without examining the records.

Their failure to do a search is the most egregious violation of the law.

It is also unlawful for SFPD to refuse to search and release records, such as Incident reports, by stating that they have established a different procedure for release of such records. San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records require SFPD to release all records to me in response to my request, as long as I have submitted it to an address or fax or SFPD portal and it had reached them. SFPD had no right to deny my request by referring to an additional procedure.

SFPD should be found in violation of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and of the decisions of SOTF taken September7, 2022. SFPD compelled to do a search for all responsive records, assist me in search by providing a detailed list and description of all records, exempt and non-exempt.

and disclose all responsive records.

SFPD should be referred to District Attorney for their persistent non-compliance with San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance in this matter.

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

The messages were discovered during a recent internal affairs investigation and add to a growing list of racist emails and texts traded among department officers. Already, the racist communications have resulted in the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases.

"When we're talking about bias policing and racial profiling, there is a direct connection to these associations being made by officers," Adachi said. "That's the kind of mentality that tells you it's OK to shoot, OK to kill, OK to arrest" people of color.





The department said the latest texts were uncovered during a department investigation into allegations that an officer had committed a sexual assault while off-duty. The officer, Jason Lai, has been charged with misdemeanor counts of unlawful access and use of criminal and motor vehicle databases.

Police Chief Greg Suhr said the three officers mentioned at Tuesday's news conference have left the department. A fourth officer is also facing discipline, officials said.

In addition to the other slurs, Lai also used a derogatory term in Chinese to refer to black people and followed that up with a text message referring to them as "a pack of wild animals on the loose."

"Anytime an officer presents him or herself to be this way, they will be gone," Suhr said. "We will not have this in the San Francisco police force."

Suhr pledged to have all officers undergo training for implicit bias -- the theory that they are unconsciously treating or viewing a certain population differently without realizing it. Adachi said that responsibility in changing the department's culture starts with its officers, not its chief.

"You can have the chief say 'We need officers themselves," Adachi said. "I'r

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The texts were the second time an investigation has unearthed blatant racism among San Francisco police officers. A court filing by federal prosecutors last year revealed that 14 other officers had either sent or received <u>text messages</u> in previous years.

The previous scandal led to the dismissal of 13 pending criminal cases and a <u>review of 3,000</u> more. Suhr tried to fire several of the 14 officers, but a judge ruled that the department had waited too long to discipline them. That ruling is now on appeal.

Adachi said Tuesday that the recent texts will require at least 207 criminal cases to be reviewed.

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

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

On February 16, SFPD acknowledged and provided a response to your Immediate Disclosure request.

"Your refusal of my request is unlawful. I am demanding a disclosure of all records that you have on myself and my family members, and all interactions between myself and my family members and SFPD. I am also requesting disclosure about specific actions and presence of SFPD on Grove street on Sep t 22, 2021I demand that you provide all responsive records. I will be filing a complaint against you with san francisco sunshine ordinance Task Force if you do not provide full discsloure of Request for Immediate Disclosure."

On February 24, SFPD informed you that we stand by our initial response of February 16. As for your request for records on the above-referenced individuals, SFPD informed you that we interpreted your request for criminal history records. ### San Francisco Police Chief Releases Officers' Racist Texts

SAN FRANCISCO — Police Chief Gregory P. Suhr on Friday announced that all officers on the San Francisco force would be required to complete anti-bias training as he released nine pages of racist text messages between three officers that further tarnished the image of a department under federal investigation.

"We have nothing to hide," said Chief Suhr. "These are the actions of a few."

But the city's public defender and experts on criminal justice said the texts appeared to reveal a deep culture of bias in the 2,000member force that contradicts the city's image of tolerance and liberalism.

"These texts evidence a deep culture of racial hatred and animus against blacks, Latinos, gays and even South Asians," Jeff Adachi, the public defender, said in an interview. "It can no longer be said to be an isolated problem."

A number of police departments, including those in Miami and Los Angeles, have had problems with racist messages sent by their officers. Experts in criminal justice have debated how to address bias, both conscious and unconscious.

The text messages released Friday use crude and strongly disparaging language against blacks and other minorities and were discovered as part of an investigation into a rape charge against one of the officers.

They come a year after a scandal involving 14 officers who also exchanged racist messages. An attempt to fire some of the 14 was rejected by a Superior Court judge, who said the statute of limitation had expired. Most of those officers remain on the force. Of the three officers whose messages were released Friday, one has retired and two have resigned.

Some of the messages released Friday had been previously made public by the public defender's office, which is reopening the files on 207 cases that were handled by the three officers who sent the messages.

Mr. Adachi said the messages were highly consequential.

"These are people who have the power to arrest and the power to kill somebody," he said. "If you're thinking, 'This is a wild animal or this is a crazed black man who's going to hurt me,' that's when you might pull the trigger. That's where it becomes scary."

Chief Suhr also announced measures on Friday that would re-evaluate the use of force by officers. Two men wielding knives, an African-American and a Latino, have been fatally shot by the police since December in what critics say was unnecessary use of force.

Among other things, the chief said the department would now require officers to document any time they point their weapons at someone. He also announced measures requiring officers to carry helmets, long batons and gloves in their vehicles "to create time and distance from a person with a weapon short of a firearm."

Eugene O'Donnell, a former New York City police officer who is now a professor at the John Jay College of Criminal Justice, said that racist texts in San Francisco were a marker of more complex and multicultural times. Two of the three officers are Asian-Americans.

"The traditional black/white narrative is changing," he said.

Mr. O'Donnell said that firing racist officers is the "easy part" but that changing the mentality of officers is much harder. He is skeptical that lectures on diversity and tolerance are effective.

"Lecturing officers is not going to work," he said. "If you tell the cops, 'Don't tell us what you really think,' that fuels a backlash."

The text messages released Friday had names and dates redacted. But in what appears to be a measure of the seriousness of the problem within the police force, the texts were sent last year, just as the scandal of the 14 officers exchanging racist messages was raging.

One text message released on Friday featured the image of a badly burned turkey and the words "Is that a Ferguson turkey," an apparent reference to the St. Louis suburb where Michael Brown, a black teenager, was killed by a white police officer.

The Los Angeles Times on Wednesday published emails mocking blacks, Latinos and Muslims that were sent by Tom Angel, now the chief of staff for the sheriff of Los Angeles County. The emails were sent when Mr. Angel was an officer in Burbank.

The texting scandal in San Francisco comes as the federal government is conducting an overall review of the Police Department after the fatal shooting in December of an African-American man, Mario Woods.

After video of the shooting was posted online, prompting an outcry, Mayor Edwin M. Lee requested the federal investigation, which is being carried out by the Justice Department.

- (a) (1) The Department of Justice shall maintain state summary criminal history information.
  - (2) As used in this section:
    - (A) "State summary criminal history information" means the master record of information compiled by the Attorney General pertaining to the identification and criminal history of a person, such as name, date of birth, physical description, fingerprints, photographs, dates of arrests, arresting agencies and booking numbers, charges, dispositions, sentencing information, and similar data about the person.
    - (B) "State summary criminal history information" does not refer to records and data compiled by criminal justice agencies other than the Attorney General, nor does it refer to records of complaints to or investigations conducted by, or records of intelligence information or security procedures of, the office of the Attorney General and the Department of Justice.
- (b) The Attorney General shall furnish state summary criminal history information to the following, if needed in the course of their duties, provided that when information is furnished to assist an agency, officer, or official of state or local government, a public utility, or any other entity, in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, Chapter 1321 of the Statutes of 1974 and Section 432.7 of the Labor Code shall apply:
  - (1) The courts of the state.
  - (2) Peace officers of the state, as defined in Section 830.1, subdivisions (a) and (e) of Section 830.2, subdivision (a) of Section 830.3, subdivision (a) of Section
  - 830.31, and subdivisions (a) and (b) of Section 830.5.

- (3) District attorneys of the state.
- (4) Prosecuting city attorneys or city prosecutors of a city within the state.
- (5) City attorneys pursuing civil gang injunctions pursuant to Section 186.22a, or drug abatement actions pursuant to Section 3479 or 3480 of the Civil Code, or Section 11571 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (6) Probation officers of the state.
- (7) Parole officers of the state.
- (8) A public defender or attorney of record when representing a person in proceedings upon a petition for a certificate of rehabilitation and pardon pursuant to Section 4852.08.
- (9) A public defender or attorney of record when representing a person in a criminal case or a juvenile delinquency proceeding, including all appeals and postconviction motions, or a parole, mandatory supervision pursuant to paragraph (5) of subdivision (h) of Section 1170, or postrelease community supervision revocation or revocation extension proceeding, if the information is requested in the course of representation.
- (10) An agency, officer, or official of the state if the state summary criminal history information is required to implement a statute or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct. The agency, officer, or official of the state authorized by this paragraph to receive state summary criminal history information may perform state and federal criminal history information checks as provided for in subdivision (u). The Department of Justice shall provide a state or federal response to the agency, officer, or official pursuant to subdivision (p).
- (11) A city, county, city and county, or district, or an officer or official thereof, if access is needed in order to assist that agency, officer, or official in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, and if the access is specifically authorized by the city council, board of supervisors, or governing board of the city, county, or district if the state summary criminal history information is required to implement a statute, ordinance, or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct. The city, county, city and county, district, or the officer or official thereof authorized by this paragraph may also transmit fingerprint images and related information to the Department of Justice to be transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation.
- (12) The subject of the state summary criminal history information under procedures established under Article 5 (commencing with Section 11120).

- (13) A person or entity when access is expressly authorized by statute if the criminal history information is required to implement a statute or regulation that expressly refers to specific criminal conduct applicable to the subject person of the state summary criminal history information, and contains requirements or exclusions, or both, expressly based upon that specified criminal conduct.
- (14) Health officers of a city, county, city and county, or district when in the performance of their official duties enforcing Section 120175 of the Health and Safety Code.
- (15) A managing or supervising correctional officer of a county jail or other county correctional facility.
- (16) A humane society, or society for the prevention of cruelty to animals, for the specific purpose of complying with Section 14502 of the Corporations Code for the appointment of humane officers.
- (17) Local child support agencies established by Section 17304 of the Family Code. When a local child support agency closes a support enforcement case containing state summary criminal history information, the agency shall delete or purge from the file and destroy documents or information concerning or arising from offenses for or of which the parent has been arrested, charged, or convicted, other than for offenses related to the parent's having failed to provide support for minor children, consistent with the requirements of Section 17531 of the Family Code.
- (18) County child welfare agency personnel who have been delegated the authority of county probation officers to access state summary criminal history information pursuant to Section 272 of the Welfare and Institutions Code for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. Information from criminal history records provided pursuant to this subdivision shall not be used for a purpose other than those specified in this section and Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. When an agency obtains records both on the basis of name checks and fingerprint checks, final placement decisions shall be based only on the records obtained pursuant to the fingerprint check.
- (19) The court of a tribe, or court of a consortium of tribes, that has entered into an agreement with the state pursuant to Section 10553.1 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. This information may be used only for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and for tribal approval or tribal licensing of foster care or adoptive homes. Article 6 (commencing with Section 11140) shall apply to officers, members, and employees of a tribal court receiving state summary criminal history information pursuant to this section.
- (20) Child welfare agency personnel of a tribe or consortium of tribes that has entered into an agreement with the state pursuant to Section 10553.1 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and to whom the state has delegated duties under paragraph (2) of subdivision (a) of Section 272 of the Welfare and Institutions

Code. The purposes for use of the information shall be for the purposes specified in Section 16504.5 of the Welfare and Institutions Code and for tribal approval or tribal licensing of foster care or adoptive homes. When an agency obtains records on the basis of name checks and fingerprint checks, final placement decisions shall be based only on the records obtained pursuant to the fingerprint check. Article 6 (commencing with Section 11140) shall apply to child welfare agency personnel receiving criminal record offender information pursuant to this section.

- (21) An officer providing conservatorship investigations pursuant to Sections 5351, 5354, and 5356 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
- (22) A court investigator providing investigations or reviews in conservatorships pursuant to Section 1826, 1850, 1851, or 2250.6 of the Probate Code.
- (23) A person authorized to conduct a guardianship investigation pursuant to Section 1513 of the Probate Code.
- (24) A humane officer pursuant to Section 14502 of the Corporations Code for the purposes of performing the officer's duties.
- (25) A public agency described in subdivision (b) of Section 15975 of the Government Code, for the purpose of oversight and enforcement policies with respect to its contracted providers.
- (26) (A) A state entity, or its designee, that receives federal tax information. A state entity or its designee that is authorized by this paragraph to receive state summary criminal history information also may transmit fingerprint images and related information to the Department of Justice to be transmitted to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of the state entity or its designee obtaining federal-level criminal offender record information from the Department of Justice. This information shall be used only for the purposes set forth in Section 1044 of the Government Code.
  - (B) For purposes of this paragraph, "federal tax information," "state entity" and "designee" are as defined in paragraphs (1), (2), and (3), respectively, of subdivision (f) of Section 1044 of the Government Code.
- (c) The Attorney General may furnish state summary criminal history information and, when specifically authorized by this subdivision, federal-level criminal history information upon a showing of a compelling need to any of the following, provided that when information is furnished to assist an agency, officer, or official of state or local government, a public utility, or any other entity in fulfilling employment, certification, or licensing duties, Chapter 1321 of the Statutes of 1974 and Section 432.7 of the Labor Code shall apply:
  - (1) A public utility, as defined in Section 216 of the Public Utilities Code, that operates a nuclear energy facility when access is needed in order to assist in employing persons to work at the facility, provided that, if the Attorney General

supplies the data, the Attorney General shall furnish a copy of the data to the person to whom the data relates.

- (2) A peace officer of the state other than those included in subdivision (b).
- (3) An illegal dumping enforcement officer as defined in subdivision (i) of Section 830.7.
- (4) A peace officer of another country.
- (5) Public officers, other than peace officers, of the United States, other states, or possessions or territories of the United States, provided that access to records similar to state summary criminal history information is expressly authorized by a statute of the United States, other states, or possessions or territories of the United States if the information is needed for the performance of their official duties.
- (6) A person when disclosure is requested by a probation, parole, or peace officer with the consent of the subject of the state summary criminal history information and for purposes of furthering the rehabilitation of the subject.
- (7) The courts of the United States, other states, or territories or possessions of the United States.
- (8) Peace officers of the United States, other states, or territories or possessions of the United States.
- (9) An individual who is the subject of the record requested if needed in conjunction with an application to enter the United States or a foreign nation.
- (10) (A) (i) A public utility, as defined in Section 216 of the Public Utilities Code, or a cable corporation as defined in subparagraph (B), if receipt of criminal history information is needed in order to assist in employing current or prospective employees, contract employees, or subcontract employees who, in the course of their employment, may be seeking entrance to private residences or adjacent grounds. The information provided shall be limited to the record of convictions and arrests for which the person is released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (ii) If the Attorney General supplies the data pursuant to this paragraph, the Attorney General shall furnish a copy of the data to the current or prospective employee to whom the data relates.
  - (iii) State summary criminal history information is confidential and the receiving public utility or cable corporation shall not disclose its contents, other than for the purpose for which it was acquired. The state summary criminal history information in the possession of the public utility or cable corporation and all copies made from it shall be destroyed not more than 30 days after employment or promotion or transfer is denied or granted,

except for those cases where a current or prospective employee is out on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial, in which case the state summary criminal history information and all copies shall be destroyed not more than 30 days after the case is resolved.

- (iv) A violation of this paragraph is a misdemeanor, and shall give the current or prospective employee who is injured by the violation a cause of action against the public utility or cable corporation to recover damages proximately caused by the violations. A public utility's or cable corporation's request for state summary criminal history information for purposes of employing current or prospective employees who may be seeking entrance to private residences or adjacent grounds in the course of their employment shall be deemed a "compelling need" as required to be shown in this subdivision.
- (v) This section shall not be construed as imposing a duty upon public utilities or cable corporations to request state summary criminal history information on current or prospective employees.
- (B) For purposes of this paragraph, "cable corporation" means a corporation or firm that transmits or provides television, computer, or telephone services by cable, digital, fiber optic, satellite, or comparable technology to subscribers for a fee.
- (C) Requests for federal-level criminal history information received by the Department of Justice from entities authorized pursuant to subparagraph (A) shall be forwarded to the Federal Bureau of Investigation by the Department of Justice. Federal-level criminal history information received or compiled by the Department of Justice may then be disseminated to the entities referenced in subparagraph (A), as authorized by law.
- (11) A campus of the California State University or the University of California, or a four-year college or university accredited by a regional accreditation organization approved by the United States Department of Education, if needed in conjunction with an application for admission by a convicted felon to a special education program for convicted felons, including, but not limited to, university alternatives and halfway houses. Only conviction information shall be furnished. The college or university may require the convicted felon to be fingerprinted, and any inquiry to the department under this section shall include the convicted felon's fingerprints and any other information specified by the department.
- (12) A foreign government, if requested by the individual who is the subject of the record requested, if needed in conjunction with the individual's application to adopt a minor child who is a citizen of that foreign nation. Requests for information pursuant to this paragraph shall be in accordance with the process described in Sections 11122 to 11124, inclusive. The response shall be provided to the foreign government or its designee and to the individual who requested the information.

- (d) Whenever an authorized request for state summary criminal history information pertains to a person whose fingerprints are on file with the Department of Justice and the department has no criminal history of that person, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the fingerprint card accompanying the request for information, if any, may be stamped "no criminal record" and returned to the person or entity making the request.
- (e) Whenever state summary criminal history information is furnished as the result of an application and is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the Department of Justice may charge the person or entity making the request a fee that it determines to be sufficient to reimburse the department for the cost of furnishing the information. In addition, the Department of Justice may add a surcharge to the fee to fund maintenance and improvements to the systems from which the information is obtained. Notwithstanding any other law, a person or entity required to pay a fee to the department for information received under this section may charge the applicant a fee sufficient to reimburse the person or entity for this expense. All moneys received by the department pursuant to this section, Sections 11105.3 and 26190, and former Section 13588 of the Education Code shall be deposited in a special account in the General Fund to be available for expenditure by the department to offset costs incurred pursuant to those sections and for maintenance and improvements to the systems from which the information is obtained upon appropriation by the Legislature.
- (f) Whenever there is a conflict, the processing of criminal fingerprints and fingerprints of applicants for security guard or alarm agent registrations or firearms qualification permits submitted pursuant to Section 7583.9, 7583.23, 7596.3, or 7598.4 of the Business and Professions Code shall take priority over the processing of other applicant fingerprints.
- (g) It is not a violation of this section to disseminate statistical or research information obtained from a record, provided that the identity of the subject of the record is not disclosed.
- (h) It is not a violation of this section to include information obtained from a record in (1) a transcript or record of a judicial or administrative proceeding or (2) any other public record if the inclusion of the information in the public record is authorized by a court, statute, or decisional law.
- (i) Notwithstanding any other law, the Department of Justice or a state or local law enforcement agency may require the submission of fingerprints for the purpose of conducting state summary criminal history information checks that are authorized by law.
- (j) The state summary criminal history information shall include any finding of mental incompetence pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 1367) of Title 10 of Part 2 arising out of a complaint charging a felony offense specified in Section 290.
- (k) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization and the information is to be used for peace officer employment or certification purposes. As used in this

subdivision, a peace officer is defined in Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 830) of Title 3 of Part 2.

- (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
  - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
  - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (C) Every arrest or detention, except for an arrest or detention resulting in an exoneration, provided, however, that where the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition for the arrest, the Department of Justice first makes a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest.
  - (D) Every successful diversion.
  - (E) Every date and agency name associated with all retained peace officer or nonsworn law enforcement agency employee preemployment criminal offender record information search requests.
  - (F) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
  - (G) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (I) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by a criminal justice agency or organization as defined in Section 13101, and the information is to be used for criminal justice employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Every arrest for an offense for which the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition or which did not result in a conviction, provided that the Department of Justice first makes a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest. However, information concerning an arrest shall not be disclosed if the records of the Department of Justice

indicate or if the genuine effort reveals that the subject was exonerated, successfully completed a diversion or deferred entry of judgment program, or the arrest was deemed a detention, or the subject was granted relief pursuant to Section 851.91.

- (D) Every date and agency name associated with all retained peace officer or nonsworn law enforcement agency employee preemployment criminal offender record information search requests.
- (E) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
- (F) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (m) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization pursuant to Section 1522, 1568.09, 1569.17, or 1596.871 of the Health and Safety Code, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of any of those sections or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction of an offense rendered against the applicant, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Every arrest for an offense for which the Department of Social Services is required by paragraph (1) of subdivision (a) of Section 1522 of the Health and Safety Code to determine if an applicant has been arrested. However, if the records of the Department of Justice do not contain a disposition for an arrest, the Department of Justice shall first make a genuine effort to determine the disposition of the arrest.
    - (D) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (E) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
  - (3) Notwithstanding the requirements of the sections referenced in paragraph (1) of this subdivision, the Department of Justice shall not disseminate information about an arrest subsequently deemed a detention or an arrest that resulted in the successful completion of a diversion program, exoneration, or a grant of relief pursuant to Section 851.91.

- (n) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information, to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency, organization, or individual pursuant to any of the following:
  - (A) Paragraph (10) of subdivision (c), when the information is to be used by a cable corporation.
  - (B) Section 11105.3 or 11105.4.
  - (C) Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code.
  - (D) A statute that incorporates the criteria of any of the statutory provisions listed in subparagraph (A), (B), or (C), or of this subdivision, by reference.
  - (2) With the exception of applications submitted by transportation companies authorized pursuant to Section 11105.3, and notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49, rendered against the applicant for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in subdivision (a) of Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. However, with the exception of those offenses for which registration is required pursuant to Section 290, the Department of Justice shall not disseminate information pursuant to this subdivision unless the conviction occurred within 10 years of the date of the agency's request for information or the conviction is over 10 years old but the subject of the request was incarcerated within 10 years of the agency's request for information.
    - (B) Every arrest for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in subdivision (a) of Section 15660 of the Welfare and Institutions Code for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (D) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (o) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency or organization pursuant to Section 379 or 1300 of the Financial Code, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of either of those sections or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.

- (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
  - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in Section 1300 of the Financial Code, except a conviction for which relief has been granted pursuant to Section 1203.49.
  - (B) Every arrest for a violation or attempted violation of an offense specified in Section 1300 of the Financial Code for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
  - (C) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (p) (1) This subdivision shall apply whenever state or federal criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an agency, organization, or individual not defined in subdivision (k), (l), (m), (n), or (o), or by a transportation company authorized pursuant to Section 11105.3, or a statute that incorporates the criteria of that section or this subdivision by reference, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes.
  - (2) Notwithstanding any other law, whenever state summary criminal history information is initially furnished pursuant to paragraph (1), the Department of Justice shall disseminate the following information:
    - (A) Every conviction rendered against the applicant.
    - (B) Every arrest for an offense for which the applicant is presently awaiting trial, whether the applicant is incarcerated or has been released on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial.
    - (C) Sex offender registration status of the applicant.
    - (D) Sentencing information, if present in the department's records at the time of the response.
- (q) All agencies, organizations, or individuals defined in subdivisions (k), (l), (m), (n), (o), and (p) may contract with the Department of Justice for subsequent notification pursuant to Section 11105.2. This subdivision shall not supersede sections that mandate an agency, organization, or individual to contract with the Department of Justice for subsequent notification pursuant to Section 11105.2.
- (r) This section does not require the Department of Justice to cease compliance with any other statutory notification requirements.
- (s) The provisions of Section 50.12 of Title 28 of the Code of Federal Regulations are to be followed in processing federal criminal history information.

- (t) Whenever state or federal summary criminal history information is furnished by the Department of Justice as the result of an application by an authorized agency, organization, or individual defined in subdivisions (k) to (p), inclusive, and the information is to be used for employment, licensing, or certification purposes, the authorized agency, organization, or individual shall expeditiously furnish a copy of the information to the person to whom the information relates if the information is a basis for an adverse employment, licensing, or certification decision. When furnished other than in person, the copy shall be delivered to the last contact information provided by the applicant.
- (u) (1) If a fingerprint-based criminal history information check is required pursuant to any statute, that check shall be requested from the Department of Justice and shall be applicable to the person identified in the referencing statute. The agency or entity identified in the statute shall submit to the Department of Justice fingerprint images and related information required by the Department of Justice of the types of applicants identified in the referencing statute, for the purpose of obtaining information as to the existence and content of a record of state or federal convictions and state or federal arrests and also information as to the existence and content of a record of the state or federal arrests for which the Department of Justice establishes that the person is free on bail or on their own recognizance pending trial or appeal.
  - (2) If requested, the Department of Justice shall transmit fingerprint images and related information received pursuant to this section to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for the purpose of obtaining a federal criminal history information check. The Department of Justice shall review the information returned from the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and compile and disseminate a response or a fitness determination, as appropriate, to the agency or entity identified in the referencing statute.
  - (3) The Department of Justice shall provide a state- or federal-level response or a fitness determination, as appropriate, to the agency or entity identified in the referencing statute, pursuant to the identified subdivision.
  - (4) The agency or entity identified in the referencing statute shall request from the Department of Justice subsequent notification service, as provided pursuant to Section 11105.2, for persons described in the referencing statute.
  - (5) The Department of Justice shall charge a fee sufficient to cover the reasonable cost of processing the request described in this subdivision.
- (v) This section shall remain in effect only until January 1, 2023, and as of that date is repealed.

I responded to 2955 Jackson street to assist 3G11a, 3G3a Officers Filamor #213 and Ophir #1772 regarding a dispute. Per the direction of 3G104 Sgt Yin #1778, I was to relieve the listed Officers as they were nearing the end of their shift. Dispatch advised that the reportee was being followed by an unknown male who was accusing the reportee's dog of a dog bite. Upon my arrival, I was advised by Officers Filamor and Ophir that all information had been taken from both parties and that they were concluding the investigation. It should be noted that King American Medic 2 was at the scene prior to my arrival. It should be noted that while at the scene, one of the involved parties later identified as R3-Sergie Severinov, wanted to leave the scene.

I first spoke to Officer Filamor who told me the following. Officer Filamor said upon his arrival at the scene, R3-Sergei Severinov approached him on the driver side of his vehicle and started yelling. Officer Filamor said he was unsure what Severinov was saying at that time. Officer Filamor said upon interviewing R3-Severinov, he continued to be uncooperative and was irate. Officer Filamor said he then spoke to the other involved parties later identified as R1-Sally Bingham and R2-Ellen Adams. Officer Filamor said both R1-Bingham and R2-Adams said they were walking their dogs at the Alta Plaza park located at 2750 Clay street. R1-Bingham and R2-Adams said they were near the tennis courts when R1-Bingham's dog ran into one of the nearby tennis courts. R1-Bingham said R3-Severinov and his son, later identified as V4-Ivan Severinov, were playing with tennis balls inside of the listed tennis court when her dog retrieved one of the tennis balls inside. R1-Bingham said R3-Severinov picked up his son and started to accuse R1-Bingham that her dog bit his son. R1-Bingham said she was supervising her dog the whole time and that her dog never bit R3-Severinov's son. Officer Filamor said he noticed a small abrasion to the right elbow of V4-Severinov. Officer Filamor added that the mark was apparently not consistent with a dog bite.

Officer Ophir then told me the following. Officer Ophir said upon his arrival at the scene, he interviewed R1-Bingham and R2-Adams while Officer Filamor was talking to R3-Severinov. Officer Ophir said R1-Bingham and R2-Adams told him the same events which are listed above. Officer Ophir added that R1-Bingham witnessed R3-Severinov's son fall on the ground prior to being picked up by R3-Severinov. R1-Bingham and R2-Adams said believing that a dog bite did not accur, they left the area to walk home. R1-Bingham and R2-Adams said they decided to call for the police due to the fact that R3-continued to follow and yell at them. R1- Bingham admitted that her dog was off leash while at the park. Officer Ophir said due to the fact that R3-was uncooperative at the scene along with the fact that the above listed Officers did not witness the dog off the leash, R1-Bingham was not cited for the off leash violation. Officer Ophir added that R1-Bingham's dog appeared to be calm and friendly. Bingham's dog is a mixed terrier that weighs approximately 12-15 lbs.

Officer Ophir said he observed a small but noticible abrasion to V4-Severinov's elbow. Officer Ophir said he requested for paramedics to respond to the scene to evaluate V4-Severinov's abrasion. Upon the arrival of Medic 2, R3-Severinov refused all treatment to his son. Officer Ophir said that the abrasion was apparently not consistent with a dog bite, and that the abrasion may have occurred when V4-Severinov fell on the ground. Officer Ophir said he asked R3-Severinov if he would like to prepare a written statement. Officer Ophir said R3-Severinov was uncooperative and did not want to prepare a written statement. Officer Ophir said that R3-Severinov only wanted proof of vaccination of R1-Bingham's dog. Officer Ophir said R1-Bingham was able to provide vaccination papers along with a medalion, (medalion number 31643). Officer Ophir said the vaccinations were valid through 09-17-2010. Officer Ophir said he provided the information to R3-Severinov. Officer Ophir said he took E1-Photos of V4-Severinov, his right elbow, and of the dogs at the scene. All involved parties were issued SFPD105 forms at the scene. It should be noted that the Officers at the scene did not notice any alcohol consumption between the two parties involved.

Once at the Richmond station, Officer Ophir notified Officer Hegler of Animal Care and Control. Officer Ophir also called and advised R1-Bingham to quarantine her dog for 10 days. Officer Ophir booked the E1-diskette at Richmond station for evidence.

### NARRATIVE

On 05/19/2013 I responded to a call of a fight located on the USF Campus tennis courts. I was advised via my pic radio that the caller thought that someone was impersonating USF Police harassing him and approaching him in a threatening manner. I was in full uniform and in a marked police vehicle. I was advised by dispatch that Lt. Lee,# 1179 had arrived on scene. Dispatch advised me over the radio that the officers in question were real USF public safety officers in full uniform and not imposters.

I arrived and met with Lt. Lee and USF Public Safety Officer Evans # 103 and Bierke # 17. Ofc. Evans explained that a subject, identified as a white male in a white shirt and shorts, at the tennis courts was being verbally abusive after being asked to move his illegally parked vehicle and being asked leave the campus. The Campus is considered private property. Evans explained to Lt. Lee and myself that the individual was parked in a no parking, fire lane with appropriate signage. Evans calmly explained that the individual was still at the tennis court with his young daughter who was approximately 6-9 yrs old. Evans stated that the subject had made false accusations that they had pointed their guns at him. Evans stated that she did no such thing. Evans and her partner Bierke stated they have had a prior contact in which the same individual was verbally abusive and asked to leave the campus. Evans stated that the subject had the first name of Sergei which was consistent with the name of the caller who called dispatch claiming that people were impersonating campus public safety officers.

Lt. Lee and I approached the only adult male subject on the tennis courts. He was dressed in a white T-shirt with a tennis logo and blue shorts. A small female child was sitting on the sideline bench crying. Her crying appeared due to the actions of the male and not the actions of the public safety officers. Lt. Lee asked the individual his for his name and or identification. The individual did not say "hello police, I'm the one who called can you help me?" Instead, the white male identified by Sgt. Evans as Sergei, stated, "I do not recognize you authority and I do not have to give you my ID because the constitution of the United States says so." Lt. Lee stated to the individual that he is being detained and for the individual to provided the requested information. The white male, Sergei, refused. He stated that we were racists and that he did not have to leave and that the public safety was harassing him.

Evans provided me with the license plate to the vehicle that belonged to the individual. I asked dispatch to conduct a computer check on 5WAZ569 and to provide me with the registered owners information. Dispatch stated that the vehicle belonged to a Sergei Severinov who resides at 143 Pierce St. and at my request they ran the subject for warrants. Dispatch provided me with a DOB and CDL for (D-1) Severinov. Dispatch stated that the individual had no warrants.

I returned my attention to Severinov who was now red faced, spitting as he responded " you are all racists, am I being detained. I can be here because the campus has an agreement with the surrounding community and I can be here. Evans explained to me that the two neighboring community groups are allowed the privilege to use the courts but that they must abide by the rules. Evans stated that the address for Severinov, 143 Pierce, was not included in the community group area and if it was that Severinov's parking and abusive outbursts would revoke his pillage to the campus.

Lt. Lee asked Severinov to leave the area, he replied "I am still detained and I'm calling OCC right now and I want to talk to your Captain about this I'm suing you all." Severinov was red faced and shaking as he aggressively shouted at us. He shouted that he was "a friend of the mayor" and that he would be "calling him in the morning", that his "first, fourth and ninth civil rights were being being infringed" and that after he "sued us it would pay for his daughters college tuition". He repeatedly called the police station, OCC and what appeared to be dispatch in our presence. He stated "the city will pay, you'll see, they will pay me." At no time did he make any attempt to console the child as she cried. Evans explained that in the prior contact (May 5th 2013 at 0951 hrs)with Severinov, he was being verbally abusive to his 12 year old son while the child sat in the car. Evans stated that on that occasion Severinov had called the campus dispatch and provided his information.

I completed the SFPD 849 (B) PC form and attempted to verify the name and present it to Severinov. He refused to acknowledge my questions or raise his hands to accept the form. I explained that the form was an

acknowledgement that he had been detained and that he was free to leave. Severinov refused to take the form until the small child pleaded with him, "take it... just take it please, so we can go. Severinov left under his own power as a results of his daughters pleading. Severinov was never handcuffed during our contact. There is no video located in that area of the campus. There were no witnesses available to provide further information regarding the event. Ofc. Evans admonished Severinov that he was no longer welcome on the campus and that if he returns he will be cited for trespassing. At Co G I booked the (E-1)849 B PC release form and a copy.

Complaint regarding denial to disclose records and refusal to search for records and refusal to assist in search

by San Francisco Police Department (SFPD):

SOTF File No. 22014 scheduled for Sunshine Ordinance Task Force

hearing on December 7, 2022.

Members of the San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance Task Force:

My complaint 22014 is based on sections 67.21(b) and 67.21(c) of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and was heard by SOTF on Sept 7, 2022 and by Compliance and Amendments Committee on October 25, 2022

On the substance of the matter, SFPD has refused and continue to refuse to disclose records that I have requested and has refused to do a search of multiple police databases and email systems.

Also, they have refused to provide in provide a written statement as to the existence, quantity, form and nature of records relating to my requests for records. I have requested such written statement from SFPD on February 28, 2022 based on section 67.21(c).

The reason why SDPD refuses to disclose records is their base and vicious racism and hatred of immigrants. We —myself, my wife and out two kids- are an immigrant family in San Francisco, and have all been harassed, intimidated, insulted with racial slurs, abused and racially profiled by SFPD multiple times. We have filed multiple complaints about SFPD with San Francisco Office of Citizens Complaints and Department of Police Accountability over the years.

SFPD is known for its racism, anti-immigrant bigotry and biased policing. SFPD officers have authored multiple racists electronic communications

SFPD is headed by racist and anti-immigrant bigot Chief William Scott and its racists and bigoted anti-immigrant policies and practices are implemented, in particular, by racist and anti-immigrant bigots Lieutenant Riley, Lieutenant Frank Lee, Officers Philamor, Marcial, Ophir, Michael Murphy.

As many immigrants in this city, we live in constant fear of SFPD, and are subject to their never ending harassment.

Having been repeatedly victimized, searched, harassed, assaulted, racially profiled, discriminated, called racist names by SFPD, we want to know what records SFPD keeps on us on us and inspect the records of our interaction with SFPD, and we have the right to do so under California Public Records Law and San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance.

After three hearings at SOTF and Comittees, the latest on October 25, 2022, SFPD started sending emails which contained references to responsive records but without disclosure of such records and ``FAQ'' comments why release will take extra time and asking me to be patien.

Before Committee hearing on Oct 25 and after SOTF hearing, SFPD sent me 30 (THIRTY!) emails on one day, September 22, 2022, all referring to some incident reports, but NOT RELEASING a SINGLE REPORT.

After Sept 22, 2022, I have not received any communication from SFPF until November 22,2022.

On November 22, 2022, I received SEVEN emails from SFPD, only three of which contained responsive records in the form of incident reports.

The other four email received on Nov 22, 2002 contained references to responsive records but without disclosure and asking me to patient.

On November 23, 2022, I received ONE email from SFPD. It contained reference to responsive records but without disclosure and asking me to patient.

On November 29, 2022, I received FOUR email from SFPD, only one of which contained records, of which one record was responsive, one record was not responsive and contained no references either to me or my family (vehicle incident

There other emails that I received on Nov 29, 2022, contained reference to responsive records but without disclosure and asking me to patient.

report 08101144)

The delay and obfuscation that SFPD practices in these email and in this mater as a whole are illegal and represent a mockery of the law.

SFPD still refuses to search multiple databases and emails systems in its custody.

The reasons for such unlawful behavior by SFPD are clear: they are, first, SFPD bigotry and personal hatred towards us as immigrants and, second, SFPD covering its racism and wrongdoing by its members that those records are evidence of.

Specifically, incident report 090943909 (attached) describes that police officers Ophir, Filamor and Marcial investigated the biting of my son by a dog that belonged to a White American woman. Although that woman admitted that her dog was off leash, the officers refused to cite the said White American Woman blaming that on me being uncooperative. This is one example of SFPD covering up its wrongdoing by refusing to disclose the records and delaying their disclosure.

The other example of SFPD covering up its wrongdoing by delaying the disclosure of records is contained in incident report 130411193 (attached). This incident report describes that I have called SFPD after an employee of University of San Francisco (their ``public safety'' employee) pointed a gun at my seven year old daughter Vera and me. The incident report states that upon arrival the officer immediately exonerated the USF concluded that my report of USF employee pointing a gun at my daughter to be false. They arrived at this conclusion by talking to USF employee herself, but without talking to me and my daughter. The incident report says that I was then detained while my daughter was crying an ascribes my daughter crying to my behavior, without providing any reason for this conclusion. The report that mocks my skin color, repeatedly referring to my skin color as red. It then mocks my insistence on my civil rights and their protection.

In argumando, even taking my alleged comments in the report as true, the report does not provide any reasonable ground for my detention.

On the contrary, the report provides evidence of SFPD bias, selective policing, focus on skill color, and unlawful detention. Covering up SFPD wrongdoing is the reason why SFPD is trying to cover up the full release of responsive records.

To summarize, SFPD should be found in violation of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and of the SOTF resolution of September7, 2022. SFPD should be compelled to do a complete search for all responsive records, assist me in search by providing a detailed list and description of all records, exempt and non-exempt. and disclose all responsive records.

SFPD should be referred to District Attorney and California Attorney General for their persistent violation of San Francisco Sunshine Ordinance and California Public Records act in this matter.
