

Dear San Francisco Youth Commissioners:

Wild Equity Institute and a coalition of environmental groups request your support of the removal of the Sharp Park Golf Course redevelopment from the Environmental Impact Report for the Natural Areas Management Plan. On February 28, the Board of Supervisors will vote on the issue.

In 2006, *The Significant Natural Resource Areas Management Plan* (SNRAMP) by Recreation and Park was finalized after an extensive public comment process and included the map below to depict the proposed restoration of Sharp Park:




In May 2009, Environmental Impact Report scoping meetings were held for the 2006 SNRAMP with the Sharp Park portion of the plan depicted as above. Environmental groups, including Wild Equity Institute, approved of the 2006 SNRAMP. A *Scoping Report* acknowledged that a separate, ongoing study to redesign the Sharp Park golf course would be excluded:


### **EIR Recommendations**

Because redesigning or eliminating the Sharp Park Golf Course is a separate proposal being studied by SFRPD, it will not be included or evaluated as part of the proposed SNRAMP project analyzed in the EIR. Should changes to the Sharp Park Golf Course be proposed, they would undergo a separate regulatory review, including CEQA environmental review.

The SFRPD study, referenced in the Scoping Report, evaluated three (3) alternatives: an 18-hole redesign, scaling the course back to 9-holes, or eliminating the golf course altogether. The 18-hole redesign proposal is shown below:



In 2011 the Draft EIR for the SNRAMP was released. After no additional scoping meetings and criticism from independent scientists about the 18-hole redesign plan above, the original 2006 Sharp Park restoration had been replaced with the plan below, nearly identical to the 18-hole redesign. The EIR did *not* analyze the 9-hole or "no golf" plans created by SFRPD study.



Wild Equity Institute submitted comments to the Draft EIR and urged SFRPD to exclude the Sharp Park golf redevelopment from the SNRAMP, since a separate regulatory review was promised. Moreover, independent scientists and other environmental groups submitted comments to SFRPD criticizing the 18-hole course redesign as causing more harm to the endangered species than the other golf redesign proposals.

Yet in November 2016, the Final EIR for the SNRAMP was released for certification, with no correction to its scope for Sharp Park.

### What's needed:

- A separate, full CEQA regulatory review is needed for the Sharp Park Golf Course redevelopment, as promised in the 2009 *Scoping Report*.
- The full range of alternatives, including redesigning the course to 9-holes or eliminating the golf course entirely, should be considered in any future CEQA analysis.

### Why it's important:

- The City can rebuild trust in the public process for stewardship of natural areas.
- The Sharp Park Golf Course redevelopment cost is estimated to total \$6 to \$11 million. Eventual seawall repair costs will be \$8.5 million. And the Sharp Park Golf Course has experienced hundreds of thousands in operating losses each year. Millions will be spent funding cheap golf for Pacifica residents.
- Sharp Park golf course is sensitive habitat for the endangered San Francisco Garter Snake and California Red-legged frog.

Please urge the Board of Supervisors to excise the Sharp Park Golf Course redevelopment from the EIR. Our coalition is supportive of the original 2006 SNRAMP plan and the other elements of the SNRAMP. Therefore, excising the Sharp Park golf course redevelopment from the SNRAMP will allow the rest of the SNRAMP to move forward.







# New Plan for Sharp Park after no public hearing



2016 EIR plan for Sharp Park

- Boundary expanded to include golf course
- Proposes raising fairways and reconfiguring holes





California red-legged frog

- Create open water habitat in Laguna Salada & Horse Stable Pond by excavating approximately 60,000 cubic yards of sediment, encroaching plant species and decaying vegetation
- Create an upland refuge for snakes and frogs in the middle of Laguna Salada by converting approximately  $\frac{1}{2}$  an acre of wetlands to upland habitat
- Create about an acre of new wetlands along northern and western edge of lagoon to replace the wetlands that were converted to upland habitat
- Raise elevation to remove ephemeral breeding areas that are disconnected from the Laguna Salada. To encourage fross to denecit aggs in locations where the resulting tadpoles would not be stranded (i.e. away trongolf course greens), approximately 13 acres of the golf course would be modified to create upland habitat. Raise 10, 14, 15 & 18 fairways to reduce flooding and allow for improved drainage
- Improve connectivity between waterways by creating an upland and wetland nabitat confider between Horse Stable Pond and Laguna Salada. Hole 12 would be permanently closed and Holes 10 & 13 would be shortened.
- Recontour freshwater marsh wetland to create shallow water wetland habitat
- Restore coastal scrub/shrub grassland community
- Install post & rail fence around the lagoon





17	Resolved, That regardless of the actions of ICE or the executive brach, this commission stands
18	strong in its long-held beliefs, including the ambition and value of all youth, documented or
19	undocumented; and be it further
20	Resolved, That the City's youth will never back down on women's rights, and young women in
21	San Francisco will grow up to be role models for generations, portraying to those around them that
22	they can be and do anything; and, be it further
23	Resolved, That we stand by our LGBTQ brothers and sisters, including those innumerable
24	proud LGBTQQ+ youth who have come to San Francisco seeking a loving community; and be it
25	further

1	Resolved, That this commission will disavows the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, the
2	Religious Liberty Bill, and all other actions that would hinder the progress and wellbeing of LGBTQQ+
3	youth in this nation and City; and, be it further
4	Resolved, That this commission will stand by Muslim youth and their families and our nation's
5	founding principle of religious freedom; and be it further
6	Resolved, That We do not ban or disavow our youth nor their families for their faith, that no
7	matter your origin, you are always welcome within our City, and that refugees are wanted and valued
8	here; and, be it further
9	Resolved, That Black Lives Matter in San Francisco, and that the killing and brutality against
10	black people must never be normalized and the color of one's skin should never compromise young
11	people's safety; and be it further
12	Resolved, That the Youth Commission will continue to advocate for reforming our police
13	department to improve relationships between police and youth of color, ensuring that youth will be
14	treated with respect and care; and, be it further
15	Resolved, That we will stand up for our environment and its climate—we have been raised
16	being taught the best of science in our schooling systems and composting at early ages in San
17 18	Francisco, where youth understand the harm industrial and commercial materials can have on our
19	environment; and be it further
20	Resolved, That while the executive branch and climate-change deniers may not comprehend it,
21	the youth of San Francisco understand the true threat climate change has to our species and to future
22	generations, and we will continue our work advocating for a more green city and nation; and, be it
23	further
24	Resolved, That this commission will continue advocating for the MUNI and BART systems
25	many students rely on for our daily commutes, whether this administration follows through on its

1	platform to eliminate federal transit funding or not, and that we are already firmly committed to
2	expanding transit access through programs like Free MUNI for Youth and we will never stop fighting
3	for this and programs like it; and be it further
4	Resolved, that we are privileged to live in an economically strong region full of promise and
5	innovation, and that youth of this City will not be bullied or afraid of threats to revoke funding from the
6	programs and resources we access to thrive; and be it further
7	Resolved, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and all youth throughout this city and
8	county will remain dedicated to our values, and to advocating for a strong quality of life for all youth,
9	and that we recognize the manifold achievements and contributions of young people of diverse
10	backgrounds to the wellbeing of our City; and be it further
11	Resolved, That bigotry may have won an election, but it cannot and will not ever change the
12	solidarity amongst youth in San Francisco, and that our convictions will only strengthened by the acts
13	of this administration.
