Commissioner Perez is elected as the 2023-2024 Civic Engagement and Education Committee Vice Chair.

Interim Chair Barker Plummer passed the gavel to newly elected Chair Alioto-Pier.

#### b. Goal Setting

Commissioner Barker Plummer wants to lower the voting age to 16. Vice Chair Perez suggests that the Committee should also focus on voter education through events and social media. Joy (staff) suggests partnering with the Department of Elections to see what the Department is doing as well. Commissioner Barker Pummer, in the short-term, will be monitoring the situation with the SFUSD teachers' strike and see what actions the City and County can take, but not overstepping what the Student Advisory Council (SAC) is doing. Vice Chair Perez also wants to address sexual assault and harassment in schools. Commissioner Marroquin agrees with Vote16, but she also wants there to be education about voting rights. Additionally, she wants to advocate for career options after High School, life skill classes, and more college counseling. Commissioner Perez suggested that the Committee work with Breakthrough Summerbridge. The organization can do a presentation, or the Commission can also present a resolution of commendation to them.

Chair Alioto-Pier talks more about Vote16. She will have a presentation on the topic for the next meeting. Commissioner Barker Plummer will be doing an op-ed with the Bay Area Reporter and wants the Committee to provide feedback.

Chair Alioto-Pier wants Commissioners to bring questions to the next meeting, familiarize themselves with the Board of Supervisors, and bring in talking points so that the Committee can practice in the meetings to come. Joy (staff) clarifies what the Youth Commission has the right to do. Per the Commissioners' request, Joy (staff) gives a brief presentation on the Supervisors.

Commissioner Alioto-Pier gives a breakdown of the next meeting. Joy (staff) will bring in Director Esquivel Garcia next time. Commissioner Barker Plummer recommends discussing the BPPs next meeting.



Commissioner Alioto-Pier asks other Commissioners to bring in any non-voting members to further the efforts of CEEC.

# 2016 Run - Prop F

- Began with resolution from YC
  - FILE NO. RESOLUTION NO. 1819-AL-14 [Lower San Francisco's Legal Voting Age to 16 Years of Age]
- Lost with 48% of the vote, started at 36%
  - > 172,000 voted yes
- Supported by the entire school board and a lot of elected officials/prominent politicians in SF
- Generation Citizen big supporters



# 2020 Run - Prop G

- Unanimous Support from BOS and BOE, Speaker Pelosi, many others
- Sponsored by Board Pres Supervisor Yee
- Began by resolution from YC(this committee)
- Lost by 6k votes

# **Talking Points**

There are 4 main ones we go to

# 1. 16 YEAR OLD VOTING BUILDS LIFELONG VOTERS

## Research shows that:

- Voting is habitual. Once someone casts their first vote, they will continue voting
- The earlier someone starts voting, the more likely they are to be a lifelong voter

# 2. 16 IS A BETTER AGE TO BEGIN VOTING THAN AGE 18

- Age 18 is a year of transitions for most young people, making it a challenging time to register and establish first-time voting habits
- Currently, many delay beginning to vote until their late twenties or longer
- At age 16, young people are embedded in their communities of origin where they care about local issues, and have opportunities for discussions in their classrooms and families that support informed choices
- 16 and 17 year olds register and turn out at greater rates than older first-time voters. This has been seen in other countries that allow teens to vote (Norway, Germany, Argentina, the United Kingdom, Brazil, and Austria).

# 3. 16 & 17 YEAR OLD VOTING WOULD INCREASE DEMOCRATIC REPRESENTATION

- This will create a more representative democracy. Right now, the highest voter turnout rates are among white older adults and seniors.
- We need creative ways of making sure our elected leaders feel accountable to all of our communities. 16 & 17 year olds are community members.
- 16 & 17 year olds are affected by issues like who runs our schools, and decisions that are made about housing, transit and lots of other issues. We believe we deserve a voice.

# 4. 16 AND 17 YEAR OLDS ARE PREPARED TO VOTE

- Teens today have more access to knowledge and information and more outlets for debating social and political issues than ever before.
- Research shows that 16-year-olds' political knowledge is the same as 21-year-olds' and quite close to the average for all adults. Many 16 & 17 year olds are already taking government classes
- Researchers assert that 16 and 17 year olds have developed the intellectual maturity for measured, non-rushed, decision-making "ie, cold cognition," needed for making responsible voting choices.
- Many civic responsibilities accrue at age 16. 16-17 year olds can work without limitations on hours, pay taxes, drive cars, and other responsibilities.
