2	Resolution urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to include Youth
3	Involvement Plans when negotiating with new businesses coming to San Francisco, in order to
4	increase the number of employment opportunities for San Francisco's young people.
5	
6	WHEREAS, One third of all San Franciscan youth (16-24) are officially unemployed, and
7	actively searching for a job; and
8	WHEREAS, Youth in San Francisco consistently choose employment as their highest
9	priority need; ¹ and
10	WHEREAS, In the summer of 2011, over 2,000 San Francisco youth applied for only 435
11	youth employment slots in the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education Program (MYEEP), a youth
12	workforce program which has been providing 14 and 15 year olds with their first jobs since 1989; ² and
13	WHEREAS, Over 700 youth applied for just 200 openings to San Francisco
14	YouthWorks (SFYW), a youth workforce program which prepares 16 and 17 year old youth for
15	careers in the public sector by providing them with internships through City government; and
16	WHEREAS, The Summer Youth Employment Program (SYEP), a work experience
17	program providing youth ages 16-21 with summer internships, also received more than twice
18	the amount of applications than program spots this past year; and
19	WHEREAS, These San Francisco subsidized employment programs have limited
20	capacity due to limited budgets during this challenging economic climate; ³ and

1	WHEREAS, Youth employment offers multifaceted benefits including lowering dropout
2	rates, earning higher wages later in life, providing job skills, and saving money for college;4
3	and
4	WHEREAS, The limits of government-subsidized employment and the clear need for
5	youth employment for the success of society have been recognized by President Obama
6	through his Summer Jobs+ Plan; and
7	WHEREAS, San Francisco has unique benefits in the nation-wide struggle for
8	employment, including its recent attraction of new technology companies; and
9	WHEREAS, Technological skills are considered a vital asset in the new economy and
10	emphasized in Mayor Lee's job plan; 5 and
11	WHEREAS, San Francisco made a compromise by establishing the Central Market/Tenderloin
12	Payroll Tax Exclusion (CMTPTE), which exempts businesses located within the defined exclusion area
13	from additional payroll tax as they add jobs during any six years in an eight-year period, in large part to
14	keep the social networking company Twitter in the city and to continue to attract job opportunities for
15	San Franciscans; ⁶ and
16	WHEREAS, Mayor Lee's jobs plan "Roadmap to Good Jobs and Opportunity" emphasizes the
17	importance of apprenticeships, jobs, and internships for San Francisco youth in these new technology
18	companies; ⁶ and
19	WHEREAS, Specific plans are necessary to ensure San Francisco youth of all
20	backgrounds, including our LGBTQQ, disabled, formerly incarcerated, and undocumented

3	WHEREAS, A Youth Involvement plan could be added to any new payroll tax
4	exemptions or other compromises; and
5	WHEREAS, Such an inclusion would benefit businesses, the City, and San
6	Francisco's next generation; and
7	WHEREAS, Such a plan would strengthen public and private sector partnerships for
8	the benefit of youth in the community; now, therefore, be it
9	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges Mayor Lee and the
10	Board of Supervisors to include Youth Involvement Plans—containing increased opportunities
11	for youth employment—when negotiating with new businesses coming to San Francisco, and; let it be
12	further
13	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission encourages Youth Involvement Plans
14	for new businesses to include paid and unpaid internships, apprenticeships, or job training programs
15	for the city's youth, or the contribution of funds to San Francisco's youth employment programs as to
16	create a thriving workforce for the future of San Francisco.
