2	Resolution urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to launch a local San Francisco
3	Summer Jobs+ campaign by identifying private and public sector funds, securing private
4	sector job opportunities, and developing infrastructure to manage internships—as to increase
5	the summer employment opportunities for San Francisco's young people.
6	
7	WHEREAS, San Francisco's youth job rate is at its lowest in more than 60 years, with 33% of
8	the City's job seeking youth officially unemployed;1 and
9	WHEREAS, San Francisco's two largest internship programs, San Francisco YouthWorks and
10	the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education Program (MYEEP), turned away over 2,000 youth who
11	applied to work last summer; and
12	WHEREAS, San Francisco's Office of Economic and Workforce Development's summer youth
13	employment programs received 1,100 applications for 400 positions; and
14	WHEREAS, San Francisco Unified School District youth consistently prioritize employment
15	over any other policy need; ² and
16	WHEREAS, Nationwide there are 6.7 million transitionally aged youth disconnected from
17	education and work; ³ and
18	WHEREAS, Disconnected transitionally aged youth's burden costs the United States taxpayer
19	\$1.56 trillion, with an additional social burden valued at \$4.75 trillion; ⁴ and

1	WHEREAS, Many disconnected youth ages 16-24 are not represented in employment statistics
2	because the competitive current job market had dissuaded them from even searching for work; and
3	WHEREAS, Nationally summer unemployment is at its highest rate since 1948, with only 49%
4	of youth 16-24 employed in July—the busiest youth job month of the year; and
5	WHEREAS, Unemployment nation-wide is even greater among youth of color, with only 35% of
6	African American youth and 43% of Latino youth employed this July; and
7	WHEREAS, Being unemployed as a youth will significantly reduce one's earnings potential as
8	an adult; and
9	WHEREAS, Youth workforce development programs provide a springboard for future
10	employment opportunities; and
11	WHEREAS, During past Mayoral terms, San Francisco successfully created public-private
12	partnerships to provide summer youth workforce development programs; and
13	WHEREAS, Former Mayor Brown raised over \$1 million for subsidized youth employment
14	opportunities through local corporations partnering with the city in his Say Youth Employment for the
15	Summer (Say YES) campaign launched in May 2000; ⁵ and
16	WHEREAS, Former Mayor Newsom secured funding for over 120 youth jobs in his Mayor's
17	Vocational Program by making personal phone calls to local businesses in 2004;6 and
18	WHEREAS, New York Governor Andrew Cuomo recently launched the New York Youth Works
19	program—a statewide program to combat the high unemployment rates among inner city youth in
20

2	tax credits for businesses that hire unemployed and disadvantaged youth; ⁷ and
3	WHEREAS, On January 31, 2012, at the urging of the Youth Commission, the Board of
4	Supervisors adopted a resolution supporting the design of President Obama's Summer Jobs+ plan,
5	and stating that the Board of Supervisors will "work to develop a similar plan in San Francisco in order
6	to promote youth employment in San Francisco"; and
7	WHEREAS, The Japanese Community Youth Council (including MYEEP, YouthWorks, and
8	many other significant youth employment programs) has called for a SF Summer Jobs+ Campaign to
9	create new summer jobs for San Francisco's youth; and
10	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission, various youth service providers, youth
11	advocates, and young people support the City's commitment to launch a local San Francisco Summer
12	Jobs+ campaign; and
13	WHEREAS, The SF Summer Jobs+ Campaign would help to address the pressing, universally
14	acknowledged need for youth workforce development programs; now, therefore be it,
15	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Honorable Mayor and the
16	Board of Supervisors to mobilize a campaign to raise at least \$2.25 million in new funding from private
17	sector companies in San Francisco, as to subsidize summer internship opportunities in a diversity of
18	settings and; be it further,
19	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and the Board of
20	Supervisors to include the following as goals for the SF Summer Jobs+ Campaign: 400 new youth jobs
21	or internships in local companies, 400 additional subsidized youth jobs or internships funded by
22	contributions from local private sector companies, and 100 additional paid internships in City
23	government supported by public funding, and; be it further,
