12	WHEREAS, On January 31, 2012, the Board of Supervisors adopted Resolution no.036-
13	12, sponsored by Supervisor Sean Elsbernd, "Supporting President Barack Obama's Summer Jobs+
14	Plan and Recommending the Development of a Similar Plan for Youth in San Francisco <sup>2</sup> ; and
15	WHEREAS, In February of 2012, Mayor Lee and the United Way of the Bay Area began to lay
16	the groundwork for San Francisco Summer Jobs+ in 2012 by convening a series of stakeholder
17	meetings with employers, providers, community members, and young people which resulted in a
18	report to the White House Council for Community Solutions <sup>3</sup> ; and
19	WHEREAS, Acknowledging the coming launch, youth employment service providers from the
20	San Francisco Youth Employment Coalition (SFYEC), and the Japanese Community Youth Council

1	(JCYC) expressed their goal to raise \$2.5 million for this program and ensure that the program
2	targeted disconnected, opportunity youth <sup>4</sup> ; and
3	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission passed resolution 1112-AL 10 adopted
4	March 19, 2012, urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to launch a local San Francisco
5	Summer Jobs+ campaign by identifying private and public sector funds, securing private sector job
6	opportunities, and developing infrastructure to manage internships; <sup>5</sup> and
7	WHEREAS, In the summer of 2011, over 2,000 San Francisco youth applied for only 435 youth
8	employment slots in the Mayor's Youth Employment and Education Program (MYEEP), a youth
9	workforce program, which has provided 14 and 15 year old youth with their first jobs since 1989; and
10	WHEREAS, SF Summer Jobs+ was envisioned as an innovative private-public partnership to
11	address the insufficient capacity of youth employment programs; and
12	WHEREAS, Mayor Lee announced the launch of Summer Jobs+ on Thursday, April 12, 2012
13	where local companies such as Salesforce.com, AT&T, Jamba Juice, Zynga, Bank of America, Wells
14	Fargo, and PG&E pledged to provide summer jobs or funding to subsidize opportunities, cementing
15	San Francisco's support for youth opportunity through employment <sup>6</sup> ; and
16	WHEREAS, On November 5 <sup>th</sup> , 2012, the San Francisco Youth Commission heard a report from
17	SF Summer Jobs+ organizers and youth service providers including the Mayor's Office, Department of
18	Children, Youth and their Families (DCYF), United Way of the Bay Area, and AfterCollege.com
19	regarding the success of the past summer and plans for the future; and

1	WHEREAS, According to United Way, SF Summer Jobs+ was successful in providing 5,206
2	internship and job opportunities in the private and public sector for youth <sup>7</sup> ; and
3	WHEREAS, 1,740 private sector job opportunities were created, with 39% of them permanent
4	placements <sup>8</sup> ; and
5	WHEREAS, the City & County of San Francisco invested over \$12 million through 30 city
6	departments to provide employment training opportunities for youth ages 14-249; and
7	WHEREAS, SF Summer Jobs+ served a diverse group of youth, with about 30% of participants
8	identifying as African Americans, about 29% identifying as Asian American, and 15% identifying as
9	Hispanic/Latino <sup>10</sup> ; and
10	WHEREAS, At various meetings, service providers urged the Youth Commission to continue to
11	work to provide opportunities for formerly incarcerated youth and disenfranchised youth; and
12	WHEREAS, Hydra Mendoza, the Mayor's Education Advisory, and Glenn Eagleson, the Senior
13	Planner and Policy Analyst of DCYF, expressed that other cities are looking toward San Francisco's
14	Summer Jobs+ program as a model <sup>11</sup> ; and
15	WHEREAS, Baltimore and Los Angeles have also continued their programs, called
16	respectively Hire 1 Youth <sup>12</sup> and Hire LA Youth <sup>13</sup> , that match private, government, and non-profit

18	WHEREAS, The Baltimore model particularly emphasizes as many companies as possible
