5	WHEREAS, Young people provide a unique perspective that can make all levels of
6	government more efficient and effective in addressing the needs of other youth and their families; and
7	WHEREAS, Young people have a large stake in shaping the next decade of reforms to
8	education, immigration, sustainability, and access to public services among other defining issues of
9	our time; and
0	WHEREAS, Based on a study from the Harvard Institute of Politics, only 29% of young people
1	between the ages of 18-29 believe that they have a say in what our government does, and only 20%
12	think that the country is headed in the right direction; ¹ and
13	WHEREAS, Although young people under the age of 18 comprise 24% of the United States of
14	population, youth remain underrepresented in the policy-making process especially at the regional and
15	federal levels; ² and
16	WHEREAS, The White House Council on Community Solutions, established by Executive
17	Order in December 2010 to convene the best resources of the public, private, non-profit and
8	philanthropic sectors in communities across the country and identify key attributes of solutions from
19	institutions working together on community problems, released a report in July 2012 recommending
20	that the federal government formally incorporate the input of young people in its decision-making by
21	creating a Presidential youth working group; ³ and

1	WHEREAS, There is an ongoing national campaign to establish a bi-partisan Presidential
2	Youth Council made up of 24 young Americans between 16 and 24 years old. This proposed
3	Presidential Youth Council would advise the President, his/her cabinet secretaries, and Congress on
4	the perspectives of young people and the development of youth policies; ⁴ and
5	WHEREAS, The model for a Presidential Youth Council is a proven approach for engaging
6	young people as there are approximately 400 active youth councils advising Mayors and Governors in
7	state and local governments across the United States; 5 and
8	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission has been cited as an example for the
9	Presidential Youth Council for youth voice in government, more specifically in our around expanding
10	youth access to public transportation with the implementation of the Free MUNI for Youth Pilot
11	Program; ⁶ and
12	WHEREAS, As with the federal government, at the regional level there are no formal
13	mechanisms to represent the interests of young people on policy matters that affect the nine Bay Area
14	counties; and
15	WHEREAS, Existing regional policy and decision-making bodies, such as the Metropolitan
16	Transportation Commission, provide the unique ability to address issues that transcend cities and
17	counties such as public health, regional transit, coastal preservation, etc; and

2	significant coordination and partnership between youth commission bodies throughout the Bay Area;

4	WHEREAS, Formalizing the partnership of Bay Area Youth Commissions through the
5	establishment of a Bay Area Youth Commission would enable youth to expand the scale of our policy
6	work, share strategies and best practices, and have a unified voice and impact on regional policy
7	issues affecting other youth; and
8	WHEREAS, The San Francisco Youth Commission has previously supported the efforts of
9	other localities around the country to better engage their youth in government. For example, on May
10	20 th , 2013 the full commission approved a memorandum of support of a campaign in New York State
11	to allow 16 and 17 year-olds to serve on neighborhood councils; now, therefore, be it
12	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission formally endorse the campaign to
13	establish a Presidential Youth Council; and be it further
14	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and the Board of
15	Supervisors to formally endorse the campaign to establish a Presidential Youth Council; and be it
16	finally
17	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and the Board of
18	Supervisors to support the creation of youth government advisory bodies at both the regional and
19	federal levels; and to provide the Youth Commission with strategic support in developing and
20	implementing a plan to establish an official Bay Area Youth Commission in collaboration with the other
21	eight Bay Area counties.
