Public Education Enrichment Fund (PEEF)

About PEEF (Proposition H)

In March of 2004, San Francisco voters approved the ballot initiative Proposition H. The passage of Proposition H established the Public Education Enrichment Fund (PEEF) as law within the City Charter, Section 16.123.1-10. The passage of Proposition H came at a time when district resources were diminished as funding at the state and federal level was decreasing.

PEEF provides critical funding to improve the quality of education for the youth of San Francisco and is shared by SFUSD San Francisco First Five:

- The first third of the total PEEF fund is allocated to San Francisco First Five for pre-school support.
- The second third supports sports, libraries, the arts and music (SLAM).
- The last third funds programs such as Wellness Centers, Student Support Professionals, Translation Services, and Peer Resources (Third-Third).

Sports (Physical Education & Athletics), Libraries, and Arts and Music (SLAM) programs

The funds allocated to SLAM programs are one third of the total PEEF allocation (one half of the SFUSD Allocation). The funds are restricted and cannot be used for any purpose other than for SLAM programs.

Other General Uses (Third-Third)

The funds allocated to Other General Uses programs are one third of the total PEEF allocation (one half of the SFUSD Allocation). The funds are discretionary and can be used for educational purposes.

2013-14 Budget

- \$25,465,500 in funding for Sports (Physical Education & Athletics), Libraries, and Arts and Music (SLAM) programs.
- \$25,465,500 in funding for Other General Uses (Third-Third) for ongoing programs in the areas of Learning Support Services, Academic Support, Family Support, Safe and Clean Schools, and General Infrastructure, Reserve Funds (to support school sites) and In-Kind Services.
