

1 [Providing Fee Waivers for Eligible DACA Applicants]

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3 **Resolution Urging the Mayor, San Francisco Board of Supervisors and Office of Civic**  
4 **Engagement & Immigrant Affairs (OCEIA) to Provide Fee Waivers for Eligible San Francisco**  
5 **DACA Applicants**

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7 WHEREAS, on June 15, 2012 the Obama administration via the Department of Homeland  
8 Security announced the implementation of Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA), which  
9 began on August 15, 2012;<sup>1</sup> and

10 WHEREAS, on November 20, 2014, President Obama announced an Executive Action to  
11 protect unauthorized immigrants in the U.S. from deportation, expanding DACA and introducing a new  
12 program, Deferred Action for Parents (DAP); and

13 WHEREAS, DACA is a program that allows for the discretionary determination to defer removal  
14 action of an individual as an act of prosecutorial discretion in addition to providing potential eligibility  
15 for employment authorization for youth as of June 15, 2012;<sup>2</sup> and

16 WHEREAS, the DACA program offers “deferred action” to undocumented youth who were  
17 brought to the United States as children and who meet other specific requirements as indicated on the  
18 U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) website;<sup>3</sup> and

19 WHEREAS, according to the Public Policy Institute of California, roughly 30,000 of San  
20 Francisco’s 809,000 residents are undocumented immigrants,<sup>4</sup> and over 5,000 of San Francisco’s  
21 undocumented residents are youth ages 14-24;<sup>5</sup> and

1 WHEREAS, undocumented youth have historically faced barriers in accessing employment,  
2 scholarships, loans, state and federal services, and other opportunities; and

3 WHEREAS, the DACA program has been quite successful in providing employment and  
4 financial opportunities; for example, approximately 61% of DACA recipients surveyed have obtained a  
5 new job since receiving DACA, over 50% have opened their first bank account, and 38% have  
6 obtained their first credit card;<sup>6</sup> and

7 WHEREAS, in 2012 about 1.2 million immigrants were eligible for DACA, and only about  
8 600,000 have signed up so far; and

9 WHEREAS, of 539,774 DACA eligible youth in California, only 157,182 (29.1%) have applied  
10 for the program;<sup>7</sup> and

11 WHEREAS, immigrants who entered the U.S. before January 1, 2010, and who have at least  
12 one child who is a U.S. citizen or a green-card holder, are also protected under this executive order  
13 and may be eligible for DAP; and

14 WHEREAS, under the President's new plan, effective November 2014, DACA recipients must  
15 also renew their statuses and work authorization every three years;<sup>8</sup> and

16 WHEREAS, U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services charges an application fee of \$465 to  
17 apply and reapply, a \$380 fee for the I-765 Form and an additional \$85 in biometric service fees;<sup>9</sup> and

1 WHEREAS, the \$465 fee imposes a significant barrier to eligible applicants; for example,  
2 according to Migration Policy Institute's one year DACA mark study, 35% of eligible DACA applicants  
3 are under 100% of the Federal Poverty level, with 66% under 199% of the Federal Poverty level<sup>10</sup>; and

4 WHEREAS, 60.5% of all DACA applications received from August 2012 to July 2013 were in  
5 the months of August, September, October, and November (the first four months of the program) and  
6 were up for re-application this year,<sup>11</sup> increasing the need for financial aid at the beginning of the 2014-  
7 2015 fiscal year; and

8 WHEREAS, San Francisco is consistently ranked as one of the most expensive cities in the  
9 United States, currently second only to New York City;<sup>12</sup> and

10 WHEREAS, Pursuant to Chapter 12H.1 of the San Francisco Administrative Code, the City and  
11 County of San Francisco is a City and County of Refuge or Sanctuary City,<sup>13</sup> which prohibits City  
12 employees from helping Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) with immigration investigations  
13 or arrests unless such help is required by federal or state law or a warrant;<sup>14</sup> and

14 WHEREAS, As per Charter SEC. 4.124, the Youth Commission is committed to identifying and  
15 proposing solutions to meet the "unmet needs" of the youth population in San Francisco, and reducing  
16 financial barriers for undocumented youth applying for DACA is an unmet need; now, therefore be it

17 RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission commends Mayor Edwin Lee for  
18 taking timely action authorizing \$500,000 in new funding for the Office of Civic Engagement and

1 Immigrant Affairs (OCEIA) following President Barack Obama’s Executive Action to provide relief for  
2 undocumented immigrants; and be it further

3           RESOLVED, that San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and San Francisco Board  
4 of Supervisors to provide grants to San Francisco’s DACA applicants who face barriers paying any  
5 applicable application fee(s) in applying for the DACA program, especially youth ages 15-24 who are  
6 low-income; and be it further

7           RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission supports Mayor Lee’s commitment to  
8 fund the DreamSF Initiative through 2019, and urges the Mayor and the San Francisco Board of  
9 Supervisors to expand the number of slots on OCEIA’s DreamSF Fellowship program which offers  
10 DACA-approved youth the opportunity to serve the city’s immigrant communities through professional  
11 experience and training; and be it further

12           RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and San Francisco  
13 Board of Supervisors to work collaboratively with the Office of Civic Engagement & Immigrant Affairs  
14 (OCEIA) and San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) to outreach to DACA-eligible youth both  
15 encouraging them to (re)apply and notifying them of potential local application fee waiver(s).

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
