2 3	Resolution urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to declare 2015 the Year of
4	
5	Recognizing Homeless Youth and calling on the City to prioritize the provision of
6	housing, employment training, and services for the homeless youth population.
7 8	WHEREAS, Mayor Edwin Lee outlined a directive on homelessness for this upcoming year but has yet to specifically addressed the homeless youth of the city; <sup>1</sup> and
9	year but has yet to specifically addressed the nonleless youth of the city, and
	WHEREAS, between 353,000 - 503,000 youth ages 12-24 are homeless on any given
10	day in the United States; <sup>2</sup> and
11	WHEREAS, only about 4,000 youth shelter beds are available across the country <sup>3</sup> ; and
12	WHEREAS, the city's, nation's, and world's most vulnerable homeless population are
13	the young people ages 24 and under, with a higher percentage of homeless youth reporting
14	domestic violence as the cause of their homelessness compared to the adult population; <sup>4</sup>
15	and;
16	WHEREAS, 5,000 young people die every year while on the street because of illness,
17	assault, or suicide; <sup>5</sup> and
18	WHEREAS, states spend approximately \$5.7 billion each year to incarcerate youth for
19 20	a non-violent offense, such as homelessness; <sup>6</sup> and

1	WHEREAS, 66 percent of surveyed youth reported they had been harassed by police
2	or law enforcement; <sup>7</sup> and
3	WHEREAS, homeless youth reported having experienced homelessness a similar
4	number of times as the adult population despite their young age; <sup>8</sup>
5	WHEREAS, nearly half of the homeless youth surveyed reported they had been
6	homeless for one year or more; <sup>9</sup> and
7	WHEREAS, one in three youth are approached by an exploiter or recruited by a pimp
8	within the first 48 hours of being on the street; <sup>10</sup> and
9	WHEREAS, LGBT youth are disproportionately over-represented in the homeless
10	youth population, with as many as 40% of the nation's homeless youth being LGBT, while
11	between 5-10% of the overall youth population is LGBT <sup>11</sup> ; and
12	WHEREAS, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
13	has required public agencies and service providers to conduct a Point in Time count of the
14	homeless population in their cities during one of the last ten days of January every odd-
15	numbered year since 2005; and
16	WHEREAS, HUD has only recently recognized that the homeless youth are a unique
17	population with specific needs, and began counting homeless youth in their Point in Time
18	count in 2013; <sup>12</sup> and
19	WHEREAS, 1,902 homeless children and transitional age youth (TAY) were counted in
20	San Francisco's 2013 Point-in-Time count, accounting for more than one-fourth of all
21	homeless individuals counted; <sup>13</sup> and

1 WHEREAS, according to the 2013 Homeless Point-in-Time Count Survey, 21 percent 2 of homeless youth reported they had traded sex, drugs, or both for a place to sleep; one in 3 ten homeless youth reported they had been the victim of sexual exploitation; more than one 4 in four homeless youth have been physically attacked or assaulted; and nearly half of youth respondents reported they had been robbed or burglarized;<sup>14</sup> and 5

6 WHEREAS, nearly one in five youth surveyed reported using methamphetamines and one in ten reported using heroin;<sup>15</sup> and 7

8 WHEREAS, a significant portion of the homeless youth population struggle with mental 9 health and substance abuse, as 41% report their mental health was "fair" or "poor" and 23% report substance abuse as the primary cause of their homelessness;<sup>16</sup> and 10

11 WHEREAS, homeless youth are in need of job and education support with 71% of 12 homeless youth being unemployed at the time of the survey, 25% not having completed high 13 school or obtained a GED, and 72% of homeless youth respondents wanting to further their 14 education;<sup>17</sup> and

15 WHEREAS, Larkin Street Youth Services (provider of educational, vocational, and 16 housing support, among other services, to homeless youth in San Francisco), reestablished 17 its Youth Advisory Board this year to serve as a voice for homeless youth in the city; and 18 WHEREAS, Larkin Street provided services to 3,450 youth between July 2012 and July 2013.<sup>18</sup> suggesting the inaccurate representation of the 2013 Point-In-Time Count (which 19 20 found 1,902 homeless children and TAY); and

21 WHEREAS, over one third of Larkin Street youth have spent time in jail, and the odds of becoming homeless within a year of release from incarceration is 1 in 11;<sup>19</sup> and 22

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1 WHEREAS, approximately two-thirds of Larkin Street youth report at intake 2 experiencing a serious mental health issue within the past 30 days;<sup>20</sup> and 3 WHEREAS, the homeless youth population is not homogenous and different people 4 have different needs, but what all homeless youth have in common is the need for shelter, 5 food, water, and clothing; and 6 WHEREAS, Congress and the Obama Administration set a federal goal of ending 7 homelessness for youth, children, and families by 2020;<sup>21</sup> and 8 WHEREAS, ending youth homelessness in San Francisco is a strategic outset towards 9 ending chronic homelessness in the state, and country; now, therefore, be it 10 RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth Advisory 11 Board of Larkin Street Youth Services urge the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to 12 declare 2015 the Year of Recognizing Homeless Youth, as this year marks the nation being 13 five years away from its goal of ending youth homelessness; and be it 14 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth 15 Advisory Board urges the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to prioritize housing, on-site 16 counseling services, and education and job placement for homeless youth; and be 17 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth 18 Advisory Board urges the Mayor to release an Executive Directive to support the most 19 vulnerable population of the city's homeless people, our homeless children and youth. 20 21 22 23 24
