4 5	WHEREAS, the San Francisco Police Commission passed new domestic violence protocols in					
6	Department General Order 6.09 in October 2014; and					
7	WHEREAS, the domestic violence protocols were the result of years of collaboration with					
8	domestic violence advocates and will strengthen approaches to responding to domestic violence in our					
9	City, but the policy left open concerns voiced by domestic violence and youth advocates regarding					
10	referrals to Child Protective Services in non-arrest domestic violence cases contained in paragraph G					
11	of the general order; and					
12	WHEREAS, the police department has a policy in place in DGO 7.04 concerning contacting					
13	Family and Children Services in cases of parental arrest wherein a child is left without the care of					
14	another parent; and					
15	WHEREAS, the terms of paragraph G in DGO 6.09 appear to leave open the possibility that					
16	officers would be required to contact FCS in some cases where a child is left in the care of a non-					
17	abusing parent, who may themselves be the survivor of abuse; and					
18	WHEREAS, the police department's goal of ensuring its officers have resources to connect					
19	children potentially exposed to trauma through proximity to domestic violence to support and services					
20	is commendable; and					
21	WHEREAS, the City invests in our Community Behavioral Health Service system of care in					
22	order to meet the needs of youth and families for mental health care and trauma support; and					
2324	WHEREAS, FCS works diligently to support families and provide referrals to resources in the					
25	CBHS system of care, but also maintains a mandate of assessing parental fitness; and					

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WHEREAS, CF	PS cases are	opened in a	mothers'	names,	even if she	is the s	urvivor,	and not
the perpetrator, of abu	se in the hous	sehold; and						

WHEREAS, domestic violence advocates have worked with law enforcement and human service systems for decades to develop best practices that generally advocate separating law enforcement responses to domestic violence from child welfare; and

WHEREAS, the child welfare system has been characterized by disparities affecting families of color, including disproportionate rates of referrals for investigation, as well as cases resulting in out-of-home placement; and

WHEREAS, San Francisco Family and Children Services conducts extensive training strongly prioritizes maintaining family unity, but the mistrust and stigma about CPS involvement may still persist and the fear of losing custody of their children can impact survivors' decisions about whether to contact law enforcement; and

WHEREAS, at the time of the vote on DGO 6.09 in October 2014, members of the police commission indicated the need to review the outcomes for paragraph G six months after implementation; now therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to urge the San Francisco Police Department and Human Services Agency Family and Children Services Division to enact clear data-collection and sharing capacities through the establishment of a MOU that includes provisions for collecting data on SFPD referrals to FCS including age, race, ethnicity, language, whether an arrest was made, and outcomes in FCS including services provided, cases accepted for investigation, placement, and family reunification; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of Supervisors to urge the San Francisco Police Commission to conduct regular, periodic six-month reviews of the outcomes of DGO 6.09 paragraph G to assess the policy for disproportionate impacts

1	on communities of color; and whether the intended outcomes of linking young people to needed
2	trauma services are being met; and be it finally
3	RESOLVED, that the San Francisco Youth Commission urges the Mayor and Board of
4	Supervisors to urge the San Francisco Police Department to recommit to implementing a
5	comprehensive officer training on working effectively with youth, including de-escalation skills.
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
