3	Resolution urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to declare 2015 the Year of
4	Recognizing Homeless Youth and calling on the City to prioritize the provision of
5	housing, employment training, and services for the homeless youth population.
6	
7	WHEREAS, Mayor Edwin Lee in his State of the City Address outlined a directive on
8	homelessness for San Francisco in the coming year; <sup>1</sup> and
9	WHEREAS, under the Mayor's leadership, the City launched the new Navigation
10	Center that provides comprehensive services and programs for the adult homeless
11	population; <sup>2</sup> and
12	
13	WHEREAS, while the City's concern for the adult homeless population is
14	commendable, it has yet to specifically address the homeless youth of the city this year; and
15	WHEREAS, between 353,000 - 503,000 youth ages 12-24 are homeless on any given
16	day in the United States; <sup>3</sup> and
17	WHEREAS, only about 4,000 youth shelter beds are available across the country <sup>4</sup> ; and
18	WHEREAS, the city's, nation's, and world's most vulnerable homeless population are
19	the young people ages 24 and under, with a higher percentage of homeless youth reporting
20	domestic violence as the cause of their homelessness compared to the adult population; <sup>5</sup>

1	WHEREAS, 5,000 young people die every year while on the street because of illness,
2	assault, or suicide; <sup>6</sup> and
3	WHEREAS, states spend approximately \$5.7 billion each year to incarcerate youth for
4	a non-violent offense, such as homelessness;7 and
5	WHEREAS, 66 percent of surveyed youth reported they had been harassed by police
6	or law enforcement;8 and
7	WHEREAS, homeless youth reported having experienced homelessness a similar
8	number of times as the adult population despite their young age;9
9	WHEREAS, nearly half of the homeless youth surveyed reported they had been
10	homeless for one year or more; 10 and
11	WHEREAS, one in three youth are approached by an exploiter or recruited by a pimp
12	within the first 48 hours of being on the street; <sup>11</sup> and
13	WHEREAS, LGBT youth are disproportionately over-represented in the homeless
14	youth population, with as many as 40% of the nation's homeless youth being LGBT, while
15	between 5-10% of the overall youth population is LGBT <sup>12</sup> ; and
16	WHEREAS, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD)
17	has required public agencies and service providers to conduct a Point in Time count of the
18	homeless population in their cities during one of the last ten days of January every odd-
19	numbered year since 2005; and

1	WHEREAS, San Francisco was one of the first cities to begin homeless youth counts,
2	in 2007, as a separate population from the homeless adult count, 13 and
3	WHEREAS, HUD has only recently recognized that the homeless youth are a unique
4	population with specific needs, and began counting homeless youth in their Point in Time
5	count in 2013; <sup>14</sup> and
6	WHEREAS, 1,902 homeless children and transitional age youth (TAY) were counted i
7	San Francisco's 2013 Point-in-Time count, accounting for more than one-fourth of all
8	homeless individuals counted;15 and
9	WHEREAS, the San Francisco Unified School District employs a broader
10	definition of homelessness that includes youth living in shelters, single room occupancy
11	hotels, transitional housing, the streets, cars, doubled up, and other inadequate
12	accommodations in their own recordkeeping; <sup>16</sup> and
13	WHEREAS, SFUSD estimates that there were 2,357 homeless school-aged youth
14	enrolled in the district on January 24 <sup>th</sup> 2013, up from 2,200 in January 2011; <sup>17</sup> and
15	WHEREAS, according to the 2013 Homeless Point-in-Time Count Survey, 21 percent
16	of homeless youth reported they had traded sex, drugs, or both for a place to sleep; one in
17	ten homeless youth reported they had been the victim of sexual exploitation; more than one
18	in four homeless youth have been physically attacked or assaulted; and nearly half of youth
19	respondents reported they had been robbed or burglarized; 18 and
20	WHEREAS, nearly one in five youth surveyed reported using methamphetamines and
21	one in ten reported using heroin; <sup>19</sup> and
22

1	WHEREAS, a significant portion of the homeless youth population struggle with mental
2	health and substance abuse, as 41% report their mental health was "fair" or "poor" and 23%
3	report substance abuse as the primary cause of their homelessness;20 and
4	WHEREAS, homeless youth are in need of job and education support with 71% of
5	homeless youth being unemployed at the time of the survey, 25% not having completed high
6	school or obtained a GED, and 72% of homeless youth respondents wanting to further their
7	education; <sup>21</sup> and
8	WHEREAS, Larkin Street Youth Services (provider of educational, vocational, and
9	housing support, among other services, to homeless youth in San Francisco), reestablished
10	its Youth Advisory Board this year to serve as a voice for homeless youth in the city; and
11	WHEREAS, Larkin Street provided services to 3,450 youth between July 2012 and
12	July 2013, <sup>22</sup> suggesting the inaccurate representation of the 2013 Point-In-Time Count (which
13	found 1,902 homeless children and TAY); and
14	WHEREAS, over one third of Larkin Street youth have spent time in jail, and the odds
15	of becoming homeless within a year of release from incarceration is 1 in 11;23 and
16	WHEREAS, approximately two-thirds of Larkin Street youth report at intake
17	experiencing a serious mental health issue within the past 30 days; <sup>24</sup> and
18	WHEREAS, the homeless youth population is not homogenous and different people
19	have different needs, but what all homeless youth have in common is the need for shelter,
20	food, water, and clothing; and

2	lead and serve as policy advisors, youth commissioners, community advocates, and graduate
3	from intensive training programs like Year Up; <sup>25</sup> and
4	WHEREAS, Congress and the Obama Administration set a federal goal of ending
5	homelessness for youth, children, and families by 2020; <sup>26</sup> and
6	WHEREAS, ending youth homelessness in San Francisco is a strategic step towards
7	San Francisco's 10-Year Plan to Abolish Chronic Homelessness; now, therefore, be it
8	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth Advisory
9	Board of Larkin Street Youth Services urge the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to
10	declare 2015 the Year of Recognizing Homeless Youth, as this year marks the nation being
11	five years away from its goal of ending youth homelessness; and be it
12	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth
13	Advisory Board of urge the mayor and the Board of Supervisors to complete the 2015 TAY
14	Housing Plan, and establish a new TAY Housing Plan after the TAY Housing Assessment is
15	completed the summer of 2015; and
16	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth
17	Advisory Board urge the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to set aside funding in the
18	2015-16 budget for additional TAY housing, on-site counseling services, education and job
19	placement for homeless youth.
