1	[Declaring 2015 the Year of Recognizing Homeless Youth]
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3	Resolution urging the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to declare 2015 the Year of
4	Recognizing Homeless Youth and calling on the City to prioritize the provision of housing,
5	employment training, and services for the homeless youth population.
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7	WHEREAS, Mayor Edwin Lee in his State of the City Address outlined a directive on
8	homelessness for San Francisco in the coming year; ¹ and
9	WHEREAS, under the Mayor's leadership, the City launched the new Navigation Center that
10	provides comprehensive services and programs for the adult homeless population; ² and
11	
12	WHEREAS, while the City's concern for the adult homeless population is commendable, it has
13	yet to specifically address the homeless youth of the city this year; and
14	WHEREAS, between 353,000 - 503,000 youth ages 12-24 are homeless on any given day in
15	the United States; ³ and
16	WHEREAS, only about 4,000 youth shelter beds are available across the country ⁴ ; and
17	WHEREAS, the city's, nation's, and world's most vulnerable homeless population are the
18	young people ages 24 and under, with a higher percentage of homeless youth reporting domestic
19	violence as the cause of their homelessness compared to the adult population; ⁵ and;
20	WHEREAS, 5,000 young people die every year while on the street because of illness, assault,
21	or suicide; ⁶ and

1	WHEREAS, states spend approximately \$5.7 billion each year to incarcerate youth for a non-
2	violent offense, such as homelessness;7 and
3	WHEREAS, 66 percent of surveyed youth reported they had been harassed by police or law
4	enforcement;8 and
5	WHEREAS, homeless youth reported having experienced homelessness a similar number of
6	times as the adult population despite their young age;9
7	WHEREAS, nearly half of the homeless youth surveyed reported they had been homeless for
8	one year or more; ¹⁰ and
9	WHEREAS, one in three youth are approached by an exploiter or recruited by a pimp within the
10	first 48 hours of being on the street; ¹¹ and
11	WHEREAS, LGBT youth are disproportionately represented in the homeless youth population,
12	with as many as 40% of the nation's homeless youth being LGBT, while between 5-10% of the overall
13	youth population is LGBT ¹² ; and
14	WHEREAS, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has
15	required public agencies and service providers to conduct a Point in Time count of the homeless
16	population in their cities during one of the last ten days of January every odd-numbered year since
17	2005; and
18	WHEREAS, San Francisco was one of the first cities to begin homeless youth counts, in 2007,
19	as a separate population from the homeless adult count, 13 and

1	WHEREAS, HUD has only recently recognized that the homeless youth are a unique
2	population with specific needs, and began counting homeless youth in their Point in Time count in
3	2013; ¹⁴ and
4	WHEREAS, 1,902 homeless children and transitional age youth (TAY) were counted in San
5	Francisco's 2013 Point-in-Time count, accounting for more than one-fourth of all homeless individuals
6	counted;15 and
7	WHEREAS, the San Francisco Unified School District employs a broader definition of
8	homelessness that includes youth living in shelters, single room occupancy hotels, transitional
9	housing, the streets, cars, doubled up, and other inadequate accommodations in their own
10	recordkeeping;16 and
11	WHEREAS, SFUSD estimates that there were 2,357 homeless school-aged youth enrolled in
12	the district on January 24 th 2013, up from 2,200 in January 2011; ¹⁷ and
13	WHEREAS, according to the 2013 Homeless Point-in-Time Count Survey, 21 percent of
14	homeless youth reported they had traded sex, drugs, or both for a place to sleep; one in ten homeless
15	youth reported they had been the victim of sexual exploitation; more than one in four homeless youth
16	have been physically attacked or assaulted; and nearly half of youth respondents reported they had
17	been robbed or burglarized;18 and
18	WHEREAS, nearly one in five youth surveyed reported using methamphetamines and one in
19	ten reported using heroin;19 and
20	WHEREAS, a significant portion of the homeless youth population struggle with mental health
21	and substance abuse, as 41% report their mental health was "fair" or "poor" and 23% report substance
22	abuse as the primary cause of their homelessness;20 and

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1	WHEREAS, homeless youth are in need of job and education support with 71% of homeless
2	youth being unemployed at the time of the survey, 25% not having completed high school or obtained
3	a GED, and 72% of homeless youth respondents wanting to further their education; ²¹ and
4	WHEREAS, Larkin Street Youth Services (provider of educational, vocational, and housing
5	support, among other services, to homeless youth in San Francisco), reestablished its Youth Advisory
6	Board this year to serve as a voice for homeless youth in the city; and
7	WHEREAS, Larkin Street provided services to 3,450 youth between July 2012 and July 2013,22
8	which is a greater number than the 2013 Point-In-Time Count (which found 1,902 homeless children
9	and TAY); and
10	WHEREAS, over one third of Larkin Street youth have spent time in jail, and the odds of
11	becoming homeless within a year of release from incarceration is 1 in 11;23 and
12	WHEREAS, approximately two-thirds of Larkin Street youth report at intake experiencing a
13	serious mental health issue within the past 30 days; ²⁴ and
14	WHEREAS, the homeless youth population is not homogenous and different people have
15	different needs, but what all homeless youth have in common is the need for shelter, food, water, and
16	clothing; and
17	WHEREAS, when these common needs are addressed, these at-risk youth take the lead and
18	serve as policy advisors, youth commissioners, community advocates, and graduate from intensive
19	training programs like Year Up; ²⁵ and
20	WHEREAS, Congress and the Obama Administration set a federal goal of ending
21	homelessness for youth, children, and families by 2020; ²⁶ and

3	RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth Advisory Board of
4	Larkin Street Youth Services urge the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to declare 2015 the Year of
5	Recognizing Homeless Youth, as this year marks the nation being five years away from its goal of
6	ending youth homelessness; and be it
7	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the LSYS Youth
8	Advisory Board of urge the mayor and the Board of Supervisors to complete the 2015 TAY Housing
9	Plan, and establish a new TAY Housing goal after the TAY Housing Assessment is completed during
10	the summer of 2015; and
11	FURTHER RESOLVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission and the Youth Advisory
12	Board urge the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to set aside funding in the 2015-16 budget for
13	additional TAY housing, on-site counseling services, education and job placement for homeless youth.
