1. Call to Order and Roll Call for Attendance

The meeting was called to order at 5:16 PM. Commissioners absent: Desgarennes, Gregory, Vigil, Mao, and Hoyt.

2. Approval of Agenda (Action Item)

Commissioner Marshall-Fricker motioned to approve the agenda, and Commission Andam seconded. Approved by vote of acclamation.

3. Approval of Minutes (Action Item)

A. April 16, 2018 (<u>Document A</u>)

Commissioner Amable motioned to approve the minutes and Commissioner Yu seconded. Approved by acclamation.

4. Public Comment on Items not on Agenda (Discussion Only)

A member of the public, Harper, who lives in district 4, gave public comment on the topic of motorized scooters. The constituent expressed support for them as a mode of transportation, and recommended the decrease in number of them as they appear throughout the City.

5. Legislation Referred from the Board of Supervisors (All Items to Follow Discussion and Possible Action)

No legislation referred from the Board of Supervisors.

6. Presentations (All Items to Follow Discussion and Possible Action)

A. Presentation on Open Space and Pedestrian Safety in District 6 Presenters: Alexa Drapiza, Youth Organizer; PJ Eugenio, Youth Coordinator, South of Market Community Action Network's (SOMCAN) Youth Organizing Home and Neighborhood Action (YOHANA) (Document B)



The presenters discussed their pedestrian and nigh safety campaign. Please refer to document B in the full packet for the presentation. There were no questions from commissioners.

 B. Presentation on Middle School Q Groups for LGBTQQ Youth Presenter: Jodi Schwartz, Executive Director of LYRIC (Document C)

This presentation expressed the need for Middle School QQ groups: support groups for trans and queer identified middle schoolers of color. They would like the support of the Youth Commission in calling on the Mayor and the Board of Supervisors to fund this initiative. They are asking for money to continue the groups in the five middle schools they are currently operating in, and also expand to three more schools. Further, the money will help pay one of the staff members, as the other staff member is paid for through the LYRIC fellowship money. The program currently serves 34 youth, some of whom only go to school to participate in this support group. The population of young people who this group supports, may experience a high rate of housing instability and truancy. Therefore, the group provides education on self-care, health relationships, and gender affirming resources. They differ from Gay Straight Alliances (GSAs) insofar as that GSAs bring community through events and celebrations, the Middle School QQ groups are a confidential support group that serve all students of color.

- Commission Marshall-Fricker asked if LYRIC has tried to secure private funding.
 Jodi Schwartz from LYRIC responded that they have exhausted all avenues for funding.
- Commissioner Andam asked about why these groups are needed, and how these groups differ from GSAs.
- Again, the presenters reiterated that these are support groups instead of social groups that engage in event planning. The middle school QQ group also assesses the needs of the young people they service, which may not be an explicit objective for GSAs.
- Commissioner Tam asked if LYRIC has worked with the San Francisco Unified School District to secure funding, and asked for clarification as to why DCYF did not fund this program.
- The presenters reported having spoken with SFUSD, and that their limited amount funding supports other programs. Also, that DCYF does support this program, and refers to the letter of support written by Maria Su, Director of DCYF. That department decided to fund BEACON programs and has funded all other components of LYRICs ask.
- Commissioner Amable asked if they had considered where the money would come from.
- The presenters responded that they did not have a definitive source.
- Commissioner Marshall-Fricker motioned to support this item, seconded by Commissioner Yu. Approved by a vote of acclamation with Commissioner Andam in the dissent.
- C. Presentation on Rank Choice Voting from Fair Vote California Presenter: Sean Dugar, Consultant This presentation was cancelled due to the presenter not showing up.

FAQ FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Q: How is **YELL** different from Summer Squad?

A: Summer Squad is our annual summer volunteer program for teens entering 8th to 12th grade. The time commitment is a minimum of 10 hours and can be completed in as little as a few weeks. The primary role of Summer Squad volunteers is to assist with our Summer Stride program.

YELL is a more engaged program for older teens, requiring a weekly commitment over ten weeks to work collaboratively with the Teen Librarian to assist with STEM programs and create and present a team project.

Q: What is the STEM program assistant component?

A: Teen and Youth Librarians will be leading STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) programs for teens and/or younger youth throughout the summer and YELL participants will assist with these programs. No experience is necessary, just a willingness to learn and to share fun STEM activities with youth.

Q: What is the **YELL** project?

A: Teens will actively identify group project ideas, select one, and work throughout the summer as a team to have the project finished and presented the by summer's end. YELL teens will also present their projects at the Teen Volunteer VIP party for all summer volunteers in August.

Q: How do you receive the \$500 scholarship?

A: Every participant who completes the requirements for YELL will be awarded a \$500 scholarship deposited into their ScholarShare529 account at the end of the summer.

Q: What are the dates of **YELL**?

A: Ten weekly meetings will take place between June 6th and August 18th. It is required that you are present for all (or almost all) of the meetings. Check in with the Teen Librarian at one of the six participating locations to find out when you'll need to be available.

Q: What are the requirements for being selected for YELL?

A: You must be going into 10th, 11th, or 12th grade next year. You must be able to make weekly meetings and commit 30-40 hours of your time. You should be enthusiastic about volunteering at the library this summer, and excited about working with youth and helping to make your community and library better for teens!

Q: How does a teen apply for YELL?

A: Contact one of the six participating locations and speak with the Teen Librarian there to learn more about required meeting dates and times. Fill out the application, get a parent/guardian's signature, and submit to your preferred location.

Q: Where can I learn more about **YELL**?

A: Contact the Teen Librarian at one of the six participating branches – Anza, Chinatown, Excelsior, Parkside, Richmond, and West Portal – to learn about the required meeting dates and times.
