19	WHEREAS, The Youth Commission has supported, through its adoption of the
20	FY 2024-2025 and 2025-2026 Youth Commission Budget and Policy Priorities, trauma-
21	informed practices for lockdown drills; and therefore be it
22	MOVED, That the San Francisco Youth Commission supports Assembly Bill
23	1858: Trauma-informed best practices for active shooter drills, and be it

On behalf of the San Francisco Youth Commission, I am writing to support AB 1858 (Ward), which would require a standard process for active shooter drills in schools and require the State Department of Education to curate and share best practices for active shooter drills in schools.

The Youth Commission is a body of 17 youth from San Francisco between the ages of 12 and 23. Created by the voters under a 1995 amendment to the City Charter, the Commission is responsible for advising the Board of Supervisors and the Mayor on policies and laws related to young people. The Youth Commission is also charged with

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providing comment and recommendation on all proposed laws that would primarily

affect youth before the Board takes final action.

Alarming instances of poor judgment and traumatizing drills have put a light on the

unregulated structure of guidance that schools and local educational agencies have to

navigate when devising these types of drills. It has been observed that extreme versions

of these drills cause trauma for students and have questionable benefits in active

shooter situations. It is essential that active shooter drills serve the purpose of preparing

students and educators for emergencies, not create fear and trauma which can make

these drills ineffective.

AB 1858 would create a permissive and structured procedural guidance to be available

through the California Department of Education that is focused on preparedness, open

communication, and minimizing the trauma that currently is caused by school shooter

drills.

For these reasons, the San Francisco Youth Commission supports AB 1858.
