Potrero Yard Modernization Project

What is Potrero Yard?

- One of two Trolleybus yards that Muni has
- Serves over 102,000 passengers/day (pre covid)
- Division serves lines 5/5R, 6, 14, 22 and 30/30S
- Houses around 146 busses, all 93 XT60s (60 foot trolleys) and 53 XT40s (standard length)
- It is old. Very old.





Why does it need replacement/modernization?

Short answer: It's too old, and it can't serve the fleet anymore.

Long answer:

- Wasn't designed for busses, built in 1915 as a streetcar division
- Wasn't designed for low floor busses, mechanics are constrained by layout
- It's too small, can't accommodate expansion of fleet
- Isn't suited for battery bus conversion
- Seismic issues

Simply put, the agencies needs have progressed past the existing yard's capabilities



The Replacement Facility

- 3 floors for MTA ops
- Training Department
- Increased storage capacity (~215)
- Increased maintenance space
- Convertible to BEB ops
- All indoor, no outdoor components
- Modern, better bus lifts




The Unique Part - Housing

While the idea of housing above a transit facility isn't new, this would be the first time in SF we do this for real, and the first 1 building, split usage style facility

General Aims:

- Minimum 50 pct affordable (looking to go higher)
- Add to city's available stock in meaningful way
- Around 525-575 units total, 262-288 affordable
- Set aside units for individual groups
- Commercial uses w/ services to compliment building




Pitkin Yard in New York City, housing development on a deck over active subway yard, 2 others like it in NYCT Subway System

Ok, how do youth+TAY benefit?

Three main ways:

- 1. Better transit service.
- 2. Increased affordable housing stock w/ more supportive services.
- 3. New building a), provides sustainable transit options and b) will be more environmentally friendly, both help fight climate change.

The risk of a delay to the Potrero Project

We're racing against the clock.

- A delay here means temp space at MME+Marin remains for longer
 - Delays Presidio overhaul (Presidio fleet can't move yet)
 - Delays MME expansion (Plans call for MME to take the temp bus area for trains)
 - Delays fleet expansion (Can't fit more busses into here)
 - Delays battery conversion (Which makes the state mad)
 - Financial issues with the bond
 - Contractors would get antsy about fluid selection process
- What would a delay affect most? YOU!
- If Potrero is left alone in its current state, reliability plummets, your bus won't show up on time, or ever
- MTA will need to pull from other routes, affecting you and others
- Affordable units don't grow on trees, housing crisis will only get worse
- Climate Change will get worse, not better.
- Unlike other typical delays involving Muni, this one has to be avoided

Where the project is now:

- MTA released RFQ 8/21, due date was 11/3
- RFP in early 2021.
- Legislation that authorizes best value procurement process is hung up in BoS cmte, means that RFP selection could be delayed

Why YC taking action is important

Yes, supervisors do actually listen, but acting on it isn't certain

- Showcasing the benefits for youth
 - Public infrastructure like bus yards often slip under the radar. YC taking action to support this
 and possible future Building Progress Program projects helps change perspective and
 highlight how valuable and critical these projects are
- One of a kind project that intersects with HLU priorities
 - This kind of joint development MTA yard+housing could happen in the future, but a lot is in the air due to covid related budget issues.
- Helping keep the project on track
 - With the project possibly facing severe delays, the YC taking action to support the project helps keep the project in the minds of BoS and aids efforts to get the project started.

The Resolution and the Letter

Resolution:

- Is specific, focuses on the Legislation that BoS has
- Aims to be urgent, but not unnessisairly pushy
- Should be reusable for supporting future MTA projects that benefit youth and TAY
- Cites past actions that YC and HLU have taken in the specific issue areas that project intersects with

Letter:

- Is focused on the project as a whole
- Focuses in detail on the project's benefits for youth and TAY
- Aims to provide context to the resolution
- Helps to explain how the project fits into past and present HLU priorities
