Questions:

- Commissioner Barker Plummer: you both are from Lincoln HS and this is a part of a wider effort from CPA?
- Answer: Let's Create Change club is it's own club at Lincoln, same with CPA, and we have CBOs backing us.
- Commissioner Zhang: Your club has great values and is pushing for mental health. One point of concern is that it seems very designated to HS and especially public HS. On the YC we have private, college, and other levels of education. Could you make the connection to our demographic and how we could help?
- Answer: We are 1st planning to do this in HS as a pilot program, then expanding to colleges and middle schools. We are planning and are encouraging my colleagues here to start this in their own schools, so we can campaign for more mental health resources all around the city.
- Commissioner Zhang: can you share what an actual mental health resource would look like at a school?
- Answer: The current projects are done with wellness centers. Some things we are thinking of are presentations made for peers by peers - share it online and in person. We are working towards this in collaboration with wellness centers.
- Commissioner Nguyen: Can you talk more about the school wide government? How will people from different schools all work together if everyone experiences different things? Does each school have a rep?
- Answer: One idea is to bring students together to talk about their issues. We'll prioritize the biggest issues first and then tackle individual issues. Currently there aren't volunteers in each school.
- Commissioner Tanaka: I had a question: Are you working with the Wellness Initiative because this is solely in public schools, and you mentioned wanting to work with private schools too.
- Answer: We aren't a part of the wellness initiative, we just take some of their ideas and statistics. We would like to work with private schools, but right now we are focused on supporting and working with public schools.
- Commissioner Nguyen: How do you plan on researching the top issues when all schools are different?
- Answer: Good question. For me, I'm thinking about addressing the common issues first and then address other issues as they come, or work with other LCAPs.
- Commissioner Hum: my concern is that the clubs supporting this are schools like Lincoln or Lowell. How do you plan to engage Balboa, Mission, and even continuation schools?
- Answer: As of now, it is a pilot program at Lincoln. We know different schools have different structures, and we will work through that. We would like to work with Student Advisory Council to adapt to other structures from different schools
- Commissioner Love: Is this only a high school program, or will it be in middle schools? I think some are mature enough for this.



- Answer: This is definitely in our future plans. We think that they definitely need it in this tough time.
- Commissioner Catubig: I know this is a pilot program, but will you create the curriculum?
- Answer: yes we are creating curriculum with other student advisory boards and have different representatives during the town hall that they will teach in their own schools.

- Commissioner Zhang: I think it's a good initiative. To recap, they'd like the YC's support in reaching out to CBOs and spreading awareness for mental health support. I think it's evident that they are still in the beginning stages of this project, so that is something to keep in mind too.
- Commissioner Hum: I agree, it's in the beginning stages and its a great idea, but there needs to be more structure to do outreach. Right now, you all should focus on HS, because college is for more people. I commend you both for your work.

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RESOLUTION NO. 2022-AL-03

1 [Combatting Sexual Violence in Schools and Supporting Survivors of Sexual Harassment and
2 Assault]

3 **Resolution urging the City and County of San Francisco to address and reduce sexual**
4 **violence in schools and support survivors of sexual harassment and assault**

5
6 WHEREAS, In July 2020, the Youth Commission unanimously approved Resolution
7 No. 1920-AL-15, Urging the City and County of San Francisco to support Survivors of Sexual
8 Harassment and Assault; and

9
10 WHEREAS, In July 2020, the Youth Commission unanimously approved Resolution
11 No. 1920-AL-15, Urging the City and County of San Francisco to support Survivors of Sexual
12 Harassment and Assault; and

13 WHEREAS, Sexual violence is a social and cultural problem, rather than an individual
14 problem; and

15 WHEREAS, Systemic gender-inequality, toxic masculinity, and power imbalances
16 foster an environment that perpetuates and promotes violence; and

17
18 WHEREAS, That all institutions have a role, one that supports survivors and their
19 healing and builds a climate of accountability and culture free of sexual violence; and

20 WHEREAS, Recently, sexual harassment and assault allegations have been widely
21 shared by San Francisco Unified School District (SFUSD) students and other Bay Area
22 students via social media; and

23
24 WHEREAS, Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is a federal law that
25 prohibits sex discrimination in education, including K-12 schools; and

1 WHEREAS, SFUSD’s sexual harassment policy (State Education Code and Board
2 Policy 5166) states that “the Board prohibits sexual harassment of students by other students,
3 employees or other persons, at school or at school-sponsored or school-related activities;”
4 and

5 WHEREAS, The response of school administrators, SFUSD district staff, and police is
6 often inadequate and slow due to physical, legal, and bureaucratic barriers; and
7

8 WHEREAS, According to Rape, Abuse & Incest National Network (RAINN), the
9 nation’s largest anti-sexual violence organization, someone is sexually assaulted in America
10 every 73 seconds; and

11 WHEREAS, That according to the National Sexual Violence Resource Center, one in
12 three female victims of completed or attempted rape experienced it for the first time between
13 the ages of 11 and 17; and
14

15 WHEREAS, That according to the same source, one in four male victims of completed
16 or attempted rape first experienced it between the ages of 11 and 17; and

17 WHEREAS, Those aged 12-34 are at the highest risk of rape and sexual assault, as
18 the majority of sexual assault victims are under 30; and

19 WHEREAS, Females aged 16-19 are 4 times more likely than the general population to
20 be victims of rape or sexual assault; and
21

22 WHEREAS, 21 percent of transgender, genderqueer, and nonconforming (TGQN)
23 college students have been sexually assaulted, compared to 18 percent of cisgender females
24 and 4 percent of cisgender males; and
25

1 WHEREAS, Black, Indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) are disproportionately
2 victims of sexual assault, especially Native Americans, who are twice as likely to experience
3 rape or sexual assault than any other race; and

4 WHEREAS, According to a study conducted by the California Coalition Against Sexual
5 Assault (CCASA), in California, more than 86 percent of women (compared with 81 percent
6 nationally) and 53 percent of men (compared with 43 percent nationally) report having
7 experienced some form of sexual harassment and/or assault in their lifetime; and

8
9 WHEREAS, According to RAINN, the likelihood that a person suffers suicidal or
10 depressive thoughts increases after sexual violence, as 94 percent of women who are raped,
11 experience symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) two weeks after the rape, 33
12 percent of women who are raped contemplate suicide, and 13 percent of women who are
13 raped attempt suicide; and

14 WHEREAS, In partnership with more than 1,000 local sexual assault service providers,
15 RAINN operates a national sexual assault hotline (1-800-656-4673) that provides confidential
16 support from trained staff members, support in finding local health facilities that are trained to
17 care for survivors of sexual assault, and local resources that can assist survivors in the
18 healing and recovery process; and

19
20 WHEREAS, On May 6, 2020, U.S. Secretary of Education Betsy DeVos passed new
21 Title IX regulations, where college institutions must presume that all those accused of sexual
22 misconduct are innocent prior to the investigative process, which protects perpetrators of
23 sexual misconduct; and

1 WHEREAS, According to Inside Higher Ed, these new regulations set higher evidence
2 and cross-examination standards, which can retraumatize and prevent victims from reporting
3 sexual assault; and

4 WHEREAS, There are numerous community organizations in San Francisco that offer
5 emotional and legal support for sexual assault survivors, including LYRIC, Asian Pacific
6 Islander (API) Legal Outreach, and San Francisco Women Against Rape (SFWAR), all of
7 which have local programs and resources that support survivors; and
8

9 WHEREAS, These programs are not actively promoted in schools, so students are not
10 aware of or connected to these organizations and the resources available to them; and

11 WHEREAS, The San Francisco Board of Supervisors passed legislation in 2016 to
12 create the Safer Schools Sexual Assault Task Force, which met monthly from November 2016
13 to November 2017; and

14 WHEREAS, The Task Force met monthly to analyze state and federal laws regarding
15 campus sexual assault, recommend best practices for colleges and universities in San
16 Francisco to reduce sexual assault, and recommend steps that the City can take to reduce
17 sexual assault on college and university campuses; and
18

19 WHEREAS, The Safer Schools Sexual Assault Task Force Report and
20 Recommendations did not include any specific recommendations for reducing sexual assault
21 on elementary, middle school, and high school campuses; and

22 WHEREAS, The Task Force did not invite young people to provide input and feedback
23 on the report and recommendations; and
24
25

1 WHEREAS, In 2017, the United States Department of Justice conducted an audit of
2 the San Francisco Police Department (SFPD) and produced 272 reform recommendations,
3 none of which addressed the conditions in the department’s Special Victims Unit and its
4 treatment of rape survivors; and

5 WHEREAS, in 2013, ABC7 News reported that SFPD had found 753 untested rape kits
6 from 2003 to 2013, despite a law passed four years earlier by the Board of Supervisors
7 mandating that all rape kits be tested; and

8
9 WHEREAS, In 2004, the Youth Commission and the SFUSD Student Advisory Council
10 (SAC) hosted a community hearing with representatives of community-based organizations
11 and various government agencies to understand the current situation of sexual harassment
12 and assault in San Francisco schools; and

13 WHEREAS, In April 2005, the Youth Commission and SFUSD SAC produced the San
14 Francisco Youth Commission Report on Sexual Assault and Harassment in San Francisco
15 Schools, including information from the hearing, SFUSD student input, and recommendations
16 to City agencies; now, therefore, be it

17
18 RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission stands with all survivors of sexual
19 harassment and assault and condemns the actions of all perpetrators of sexual harassment
20 and assault; and, be it

21 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Department of
22 Children, Youth and their Families (DCYF) and the Department of Public Health (DPH), to
23 fund community-based organizations providing comprehensive and inclusive sex education
24 including information on healthy relationships and consent, trauma, and mental health
25 support, and reproductive health services, such as Huckleberry Youth Programs; and, be it

1 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends DCYF to increase
2 mental and physical health support at school sites by taking a trauma-informed approach to
3 documenting and healing; and, be it

4 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges DCYF to direct mental and
5 physical resources to youth who have experienced sexual violence through partnerships with
6 community organizations, youth centers, and social and wellness centers in schools—
7 especially during the documenting process to not re-traumatize the victim; and, be it

8
9 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges DCYF to utilize their
10 partnerships with community organizations, youth centers, and social and wellness centers in
11 schools to channel the services and resources from community organizations in San
12 Francisco that offer emotional and legal support for sexual assault survivors, including LYRIC,
13 Asian Pacific Islander (API) Legal Outreach, and San Francisco Women Against Rape
14 (SFWAR), all of which have local programs and resources that support survivors; and, be it

15 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges District Attorney Chesa
16 Boudin’s office and SFPD to test all rape kits and begin an investigation within 48 hours of
17 receiving them; and, be it

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19 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFPD to properly and
20 legally assist survivors in filing a police report, getting medical care, holding the perpetrator
21 accountable, and maintaining a survivor’s legal rights in a timely manner, without causing
22 increased trauma; and, be it

23 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFPD to have survivors
24 solely interact with experts trained in trauma-informed counseling, such as social workers and
25

1 domestic violence counselors, unless necessary under law, to ensure survivors do not endure
2 further trauma and gaslighting; and, be it

3 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFPD to prioritize and
4 validate youth voice when sharing incident(s) of sexual assault/harassment without
5 demanding physical violence; and, be it

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7 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the San Francisco
8 Department of Police Accountability to ensure SFPD supports all survivors of sexual
9 harassment and assault and follows all laws and regulations; and be it

10 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFUSD to follow the
11 recommendations of SFUSD SAC in their Title IX resolution; and, be it

12
13 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFUSD to adopt
14 mandatory trainings for youth, educators, and school site staff on the definitions of sexual
15 harassment and assault, reporting procedures, supporting students, and identifying and
16 preventing these crimes; and, be it

17 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Board of Education to
18 pass a resolution affirming survivor's rights and access to supportive resources when sexually
19 assaulted or harassed on an SFUSD campus and/or by an SFUSD student or employee; and,
20 be it

21 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission discourages SFPD from
22 increasing police presence at schools; and, be it

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1 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges SFUSD to increase
2 transparency and communication about the Title IX process and procedures for students; and,
3 be it

4 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends SFUSD and/or the
5 SAC host an updated community hearing with representatives of community-based
6 organizations and various government agencies to understand the current situation of sexual
7 harassment and assault in San Francisco schools; and, be it

8
9 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission urges the Board of Supervisors to
10 restart the Safer Schools Sexual Assault Task Force consisting of policymakers, volunteers,
11 experts, parents, stakeholders, and survivors, and expand its scope from Transitional-Aged
12 Youth, to include youth ages 10-18; and, be it

13 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends that the Safer
14 Schools Sexual Assault Task Force mentioned above make more specific and informed
15 recommendations to community organizations and policies on reducing sexual assault and
16 harassment and collect data on youth sexual violence in San Francisco, including sexual
17 assault on elementary, middle school, and high school campuses; and, be it

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19 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends that the Safer
20 Schools Sexual Assault Task Force mentioned above pays particular attention to the role and
21 implications of social media on sexual violence for students in grades 6-12; and, be it

22 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends that the Safer
23 Schools Sexual Assault Task Force mentioned above invite young people to provide input and
24 feedback on the report and recommendations and update the Safer Schools Sexual Assault
25 Task Force Report and Recommendations made in December 2017; and, be it

1 FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Youth Commission recommends SFUSD create a
2 similar task force/committee to analyze the current Title IX processes, recommend best
3 practices for schools in the City to reduce sexual assault/harassment, and hold school sites
4 accountable to their commitments (such as providing adequate resources for survivors,
5 keeping survivors safe, and investigating as fully as the survivor is comfortable with, taking
6 survivor’s experiences seriously, promptly assisting survivors, and frequently updating
7 survivors).
